Section four provides that no religious test shall ever be required for office, except the belief in the existence of a Supreme Being.

Mr. Moore moved to strike out that portion requiring any one, as a qualification for office, to believe in the existence of a Supreme Being. Lost.

Section three provides that no man or set of men shall be entitled to excusive, separate public emoluments, but in consideration of public services.

Mr. Flournoy moved to strike out "but in consideration of public mervices.' Lost.

Mr. Ferris offered to amend section one by asserting "Texas is a free and independent State, subject only to the Constitution of the United States." Adopted

Mr. Norvell moved to amend section five by inserting "provided that no atheist shall be a competent witness." Laid on the table.

Mr. DeMorse offered the following as a substitute for section one: "Texas is one of the free and independent States of the United States of America, holding that independence in confirmity with the Constitution of the United States, and that the maintenance of free institutions and the most enduring support of the Federal Union, depend upon the measurement of the States of the St Constitution of the United States, pend upon the preservation of the right of local self-government in all the States comprising that Union." Lost.

Section six asserts that no human authority can interfere with any ones religious belief.

Mr. Holt offered to amend as follows: "Provided nothing in this section shall be so construed as to prohibit the Legislature from passing laws preventing ordinary work on Sunday."
