**THE CONVENTION.**  
**THIRTY SECOND DAY.**  
AUSTIN, October 12, 1875.  
The Convention met at 9 A. M. Roll called; quorum present.  
Prayer by Rev. T. B. Lee.  
Mr. Weaver moved a reconsideration of the vote restricting debate to five minutes.

The motion was reconsidered, and the resolution limiting members to five minutes reconsidered.  
Mr. McCormick presented a resolution that the Convention adjourn on the fifteenth of November. Lost.  
The unfinished business was then resumed, being the pending amendment, offered by Mr. Waelder yesterday, to article . . . on education.  
Mr. Dohoney offered the following amendment to the amendment: "Provided, that the taxes raised under this provision shall be applied to the public schools in the county where they are collected."

Mr. Waelder so amended the amendment offered by him in regard to the number of dollars as a poll tax as to read "one dollar."  
The amendment of Mr. Dohoney was lost.  
Mr. Fleming made an able and eloquent speech in behalf of public free schools. He said that, as one of the young Democracy, he advocated a liberal system of free schools, and thought, if this was not done, the people of Texas would reject the Constitution. He said he had no sympathy with the nineteen old fogies who had voted here that the State had no right to vote a tax for the support of public free schools. They were far behind the spirit of the age. He looked on the majority report as a fraud—a stupendous fraud on the people. He was glad that his friend, Mr. McCormick, had read to this Convention the Democratic platform in regard to this matter. He had always looked on him as a consistent Democrat, and hoped that now, as he had gotten on the right track, he would stay there.

Mr. Barnett was opposed to going any further in the matter than giving one-tenth of one per cent. for the education of the indigent. This, he thought, was the sentiment of the Convention.  
Mr. Nugent said he had been opposed to the system under which we had been living, and looked on it as a fraud; but he was satisfied a good one could be made. He would not stand on this floor as a member, and say he was afraid to trust his people with the power to tax themselves whenever they saw proper.

Mr. Graves "went for" the "young Democracy" from the wild mountains of the Indian range. The war whoop of the wild "Comanche" did not at all scare or ruffle the nerves of the gentleman from Coryell. He (Mr. Graves) was one of those who signed the majority report as a compromise measure, believing it was the best that could be had at present. He cared not what denunciation was hurled against it.

Mr. Bruce said he was opposed to any system of public free schools, and had so stated in every speech made during the canvass, but, believing the majority report was the best compromise that could be effected, he would vote for it. He still claimed that the State had no right to control his child, or select the books it was to study.

Mr. Nunn moved that the report of the committee and pending amendments be referred to a select committee of seven.  
Mr. Sansom opposed the motion on the ground that the matter had been well argued, and the members could vote as intelligently now as at any other time. If it was referred, the whole matter would have to be gone over again.

Mr. Crawford made an eloquent appeal in behalf of free schools. He referred them to the various Constitutions of Texas, to all organic laws ever made for the State, to show that even when steeped in poverty, the statesmen of this country had ever made ample provision for the education of the children of Texas. He went back to the days when the noble Texans declared their independence, and from then on till now education had been one of the objects. Even in 1868, when the State was broken in fortune, broken in spirit, and all was laid waste and all was in ruins, then the Convention of 1868 made ample provision for the education of the children of Texas. He said that the Democratic Convention of 1872 had also made ample provision for the education of the children of Texas.
