When Queen Elizabeth was far advanced in life she ordered all pictures of hereelf, painted by artists who had not flattered her faded features, to be collected and burned, and in 1593 she issued a proclamation farbidding all persons, save "special comming artists," to draw her likeness. At last the Queen quarreled with his lispoiltely raithful looking glasses, and Ristoria thought ought not to allow the presence of a mirror in the final scene of her "Elizabeth," as it is an historica fuel that none were allowed in her presence during her last years. Cleopatrs, Lady Macbeth, and the nuch maligued, beautiful and noble Lucrecis Borgia had hair light and goldes. Leigh Hunt, who said many wise things concerning female beauty, dress, &c, and who regarded the lips as expressing distractor as fully as the eyes, declared that beauty was too often ascrificed to fashions. "The spirit of fashion is not beautiful bet willful, not graceful but fantastic, wo superior, but vulgar." Jersmy Taylor called woman "the precious percelain of human clay." Aytoun ears, "A pretty woman is doing woman's work in the world, making life ammurer by a look which tells of a large heart and all the gentleness of humanity." A amile, which speaks of heaven's compassionateness, is, after all, the apothesis of a pretty woman. Senses asid, "Virtue is more agreeable coming from a beautiful body." Beauty is sometimes called the "fatal gift," because of the miseries which pursue its chances in life. STANLEY AND THE ELEPHANTS.—Mr. Stanley's new letter from equaforial Africa, and his references to elephants and hippos, and the ivory market generally, make the new thoughts and facts which follow very pertinent at this time, and forthe reason that one great result of the Stanley openings to African commerce is the cheapening of all that class of goods made from ivory. In the scientific miscellary of the Galaxy we read that the tremendous warfare upon the elephant for the purpose of supplying Europe with trinkets and billiard balls may prove to be a national calamity to some parts of trinkets and billiard balls may prove to be a national calamity to some puris of Africa. In those districts where castis are destroyed by the Teetae fly, the elephant is the only animal which is available as a beast of barden, and its extermination, which is progressing eteadily, will be a severe blow to such districts. The war on this useful creature would be prosecuted much more vigorously were it not for the skill with which commercial frauds are perpetrated nowadays. Real ivory is varely used in the handles of umbrellas, causes and parasols, which are fitted with 'ivogy' that live in the legs of horses and cattle, and the demand for elephants' tasks is consequently kept down to certain purposes for which it has no ambstitute. It something can be found to replace ivory in the manufacture of billiard balls, the elephant on obtains a respite which may be as serviceable to his preservation as the discovery of petreleum has been to that of the whale.

GATHERING PRAGMENTS. - A Paris correspondent of the Philadelphia Press says:
"One of the novelties in economy that "One of the novelties in economy that France will show its at our approaching exhibition is a process of mann facturing from refuse particles of bread a variety of useful products. A gentleman, engaged for some years in this business, is said to have realised a fortne of 3,000,000 france. He has had an army of men women and children employed in collecting this waste bread from hotels, restaurants and private houses. For this five centimes or a penny a pound is paid. From the best and fresher scraps is made what is called crouts du poi, i. c. square or diamond shaped pieces for soups, which sell for fifteen centimes or three cents per pound. The crumbs are made into chapelure, which is used in sances and is dressing outlets and filets. These are sold at thirty centimes or aix cents per pound. ing outsets and filets. These are sold at thirty centimes or six cents per pound. Last of all the black and hard crusts are powdered into the "seir de pain," which is an excellect and popular dentrifies. This brings at wholesale fifty centimes or ten cents per pound. The material is all so cleaned and purified that the product is extensively used in the best culsines.

### The Judiciary.

Mr. Ballinger of Galveston, one of the ablest lawyers in the State, has made a report in the Convention from the Judiciary Committee which regites that the judicial power of the State shall be vested in one Supreme Court, district courts, county conrts, commissioners' courts, justices' courts, and such other courts as may be established by law. The Legislature may establish oriminal courts, but no such court shall be established in any city have ing less than 15,000 inhabitants. The Suprome court to consist of five justices, three to constitute a quorum. The State shall be divided into five districts, and a Supreme judge is to be elected from each district. The justices shall be thirty years of age, and have been a practicing lawyer or judge of a court of record for seven years, and have resided two years in his district. They shall hold office eight years, and shall receive a salary of \$4,000 perannum. They shall have appellate jurisdiction only, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. In criminal cases below the grade of felony, appeal shall be had from the courty court, unless within such time and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law. The Supreme Court can issue write of mandamus and alliother write necessary to enforce their jurisdiction. They shall sit from the tirst Monday in October until the last Saturday in June of every year, at the seat of government, and at not more than two other places in the State. They shall appoint a clerk at each place of holding court, said elerk to give bond, and be subjeet to removal by said court for good cause, entered on the records and certifiexte from the court, that they cannot dispose of pending business. The Legislature shall appoint a commission for the determit ation of all pending business.

The State shall be divides into indicial districts, which may be increased or diminished by the Legislature.
