Flies tamed to the Arts of Peace.

Signor Bertolotti, a venerable Italian, upwards of sixty, in connection with the flea, has established a European reputation. Yesterday he had his menagerie at 39 Union Square, and invited a select audience to witness his performance, which to-day is thrown open to the public. The exhibitor is a genial old man, with a voice modified by long intercourse, with his minute friends; his hand, though large, possesses an exquisite delicacy of touch and he bends over and fondles his singular pets as though he felt a real affection for them. In 1832 he began the training of fleas in England, and amassing a considerable fortune retired from professional life. Recently times have gone hard with him, and again he summons the fleas to his rescue. The professor's present troupe consists of 100 female fleas (male fleas are discarded as utterly intractable), which were brought from Canada, the professor making the delightful announcement that fleas are extremely scarce in the United States. The performance yesterday opened with a passage at arms between Don Quixote and Sancho Panza, two bloodthirsty fleas, that mounted tiny paper horses attached each others with spears. The tiny paper horses being stationary, no great damage was done to either one of the contestants, but the fleas really appeared actuated by deadly hatred and whirled the little spears about in a furious manner. Next an illustration of the immense strength of the creatures was given in the performance of an herculean feat, who, harnessed to a little gilt chariot, weighing just 1,200 times his own weight, drew the same about the table. As an agent of locomotion, however, the flea is not as much of a success as in some other particulars, for its legs, being centered in the immediate neighborhood of its head, there is an unavoidable slovenly appearance about the way in which it carries the remainder of its body; and besides, the natural gait of the flea is that of the angle kangaroo, and it can never be trained to assume a comely trot. However, the little creature shambled around with the chariot, and one of its fellow sat on the box, as dignified a driver as ever cracked a whip.

A wild flea was next produced, one that had never received any educational advantages. Its habit was still that of the creature who lives only to hop and bite, and a chain and ball attached to the hind leg told of its unfitted to associate unrestrained with its civilized brothers. The chain and ball were of gold, the former being just one inch in length and containing 400 links. On the same microscopic plan all the paraphernalia used was constructed; little hats and coats fitting with remarkable nicety. Other of these remarkable insects were made to turn cranks and hoist buckets.

But the chief feature of the entertainment was some two dozen fleas at a ball. At one end of the ball room was a complete orchestra, each flea holding its peculiar instrument in readiness for the dance. On the floor two couples were seen, and on a tin sofa another was engaged, at least so said the professor, in a very desperate flirtation. A music box was then set in motion, and at the first sound the little insects began their respective vocations, those on the floor whirling about in the dance and those in the orchestra working their legs, to which were attached the instruments, in a most enthusiastic manner. When the size of the flea is remembered the task of handling them at all will be appreciated. Fortunately they are as tough as porcupines, and can be unceremoniously picked up with little steel pincers without danger of hurting them. The average lifetime of a flea is about eight months, and as four months is required in subduing their spirits and altering their gait from a hop to a trot, it will be seen that the process is an endless one.

Of the 800 fleas in this collection about half are performers and have to be taken from their harness of threads once a day to be fed. Their fodder is nothing less than the blood of the professor, who permits the whole flock to browse on his left arm every morning.

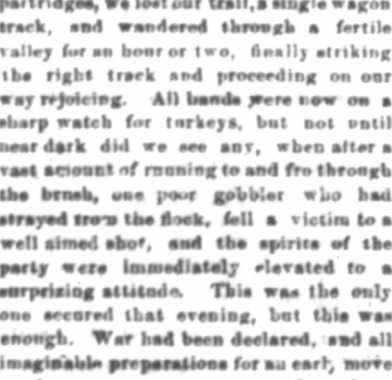

BREEDING.—Why farmers eat so little beef has, we confess, always been something we failed to understand. All these years of the year the cattle are generally in good condition, yet not one in five kills one beef annually. A yearling or a two year old heifer well fattened can be bought in the country at two cents per pound gross, can be butchered at 12 1/2 or 15 cents, and the exchange of diet that is indigestible and of killing them in the fall or early winter. There is, besides, the change of diet, and the economy of this system of feeding, the luxury of good beef, and the fine pie that follows as its corollary. Try more beef and less pork. *Journal of Agriculture and Farming.*

It is said that there are in existence one hoof of each of Napoleon's two favorite chargers. They have been polished and handsomely mounted in a snuff-box. One, in possession of the Household Brigade, London, bears on its gold lid the inscription: "Hoof of Mars, rare charger of Napoleon, ridden by him at Marengo, Austerlitz, Zna, Wagram, in the campaign of Russia, and lastly at Waterloo." On the inside of the lid is inscribed: "Presented April 6, by H. W. Argenson, Captain Grenadier Guards and Colonel to his brother-in-law, the Duke of Angoulême, in the month of the 18th of the following: "Mars was wounded in the near hip at Waterloo, when his great master was on him, in the hollow road, in advance of the French position. He had been frequently wounded before in other battles." The other hoof is in the possession of a Mrs. Douglas. On the cover of this box is written, "This is the hoof of Napoleon's horse, which was killed under him during the Egyptian campaign of 1798. From Captain W. Sleigh, late 100th Regiment, to Mr. Douglas, Hawick, 1817." *Spirit of the Times.*

HAWK.—To keep hawks from preying upon poultry, go to the tin shop and get a lot of the scraps tie them in bunches with a stout cord, hang them on poles so that they will dangle into sunshine. Hawks can not stand the glitter of the tin and will not come near. I hung but one small bunch and in a day or two my poultry yard this spring and we have not lost a chicken yet by the hawks, with which we used to be troubled very much.—Farmer.
