## Convict Eloquence.

SPEECH OF COL. JOHN A. JOYCE BEFORE SENTENCE TO THE PENITENTIARY.

One of the most remarkable and touching speeches we have read in many a day is that of Col. Joyce before the Court at Jefferson City, Missouri, just before sentence to the Penitentiary for three years and a half, and to pay a fine of \$3,000. We reproduce it as striking curiosity in its line. Eloquence and courage he undoubtedly has, guilty or not guilty. He had refused to fight his case any longer before the court, and demanded sentence. He said:

I was indicted for failure to report in writing certain alleged knowledge and information of certain fraudulent transactions of petrified perjurers. The jury found me guilty on the counts, but as a matter of fact the collusion was as false as the evidence. I agree that it had the appearance to the jury of a failure of duty. We know, however, that things are not always what they seem. I simply declare upon my honor as a man, and my allegiance as an American citizen, here in the presence of this honorable court, to the whole world, and facing my God, that

I AM ABSOLUTELY INNOCENT of the charges trumped up against me by pretended friends and viper enemies. It has not been shown in evidence, or even intimated by anybody, that I ever received a single cent in any form of the revenue. Then, where is the motive that induced me to withhold the information I did make a report in writing to Supervisor McDonald, and Commissioner Douglas. The report, it is alleged, was not in full; neither was the information in my possession full or complete, as the facts were out of my district and

THE THEORY I REPORTED was in Missouri. The District Attorney of the United States, in his concluding speech, introduced my copy-book, showing the transmitted letter to Supervisor McDonald as something fraudulent. My lawyers or myself had no opportunity to explain the letter in evidence, which could have been done to the utmost satisfaction of everybody concerned Your Honor, from the beginning of the case to the end, extended me the kindest consideration and fairest ruling. For this I thank you in the name of the people and in the name of justice. I stand here to-day strong and bold in conscious innocence. My heart is actuated by

THAT NOBLE IMPULSE that nerved Winkelreid when he opened a breach for the liberty of his country, or by that lofty courage that inspired Sir Walter Raleigh at the block. Like Raleigh, I may have puffed smoke through the window at the execution of some official Essex, but I never yet trampled upon the royal robes of the Virgin Queen. For myself, I have no fear of any punishment on earth, yet in behalf of my past good character, this being the first suspicion of guilt that ever

DARKENED MY LIFE, and in consideration of the support I owe my wife and children, I ask that magnanimity at this bar of justice that would be reasonably claimed by yourself under like circumstances. A few short years will sepulchre the living of to-day with the dead of yesterday, and the celestial sunlight of to-morrow will bring us all to the bar of Omnipotence, when the Judge, jury, lawyer and client will meet upon the level of eternity and part upon the square of final judgment. Then all hearts shall be laid bare, and truth will rise in splendid triumph.

THE FLOOD OF INNOCENCE flows free and untrifled through the life channels of this frame, and the artificial lusts that surround the victims of crime find no lodgment in my heart. When I look back to the field of battle, where I fought and bled for my country in the hour of terrible trial, I wonder whether patriotism was but a name, and gratitude of nations a mockery and shame, to lure the brave to destruction. My simple sin is that of omission, and for it I suffer the deepest humiliation, while the glorious services and recollections of the past are buried in the grave of forgetfulness.

IS THIS JUST? This ephemeral era of reform has

risen like the rush of a mighty flood and sped onwards to the gulf of punishment. The good and the bad suffer alike. The stream is full of driftwood and dead timber, while many young oaks and tall sycamores on the banks are loosened from their firm foundation, and dashed into the river of destruction. But the rain falls lightly on the mountains, the sun shines warmly on the plains, and the flood even now is settling into its former bed, where the crystal waters shall again reflect the green foliage.

THE OAK AND SYCAMORE, and the gentle breezes and birds of spring shall make merry music in the cathedral aisles of a generous nation. The prison walls that hemmed in Galileo, Columbus, Tasso and Napoleon did not measure the minds of the men. It is true their bodies suffered some torture, but the proud spirit that rose in their hearts leaped the bounds of clay, and soared away into the illimitable regions of science, poetry and war, making them monarchs of the hour and masters of eternity. Hamble as I am in the walks of life, my soul is inspired by

THEIR ILLUSTRIOUS EXAMPLE, and it shall be my future endeavor to show the world that although I may suffer for a time the penalty of perjured testimony, yet, like a mountain crag, I shall breast the pelting storm and lift my head clear and bold to the coming sunshine of truth and redemption. I have done. The speaker was deeply affected during the delivery of his oration. He was listened to with marked attention.

AT THE CLOSE of his speech, Judge Krekel proceeded to sentence him, in substance saying he had no doubt as to his guilt, and regretted that it was not otherwise. After some remarks, brief, pointed and earnest, he pronounced the sentence to be imprisonment for three and a half years in the Missouri Penitentiary, and assessed a fine of 3,000.

A COURT OF APPEALS, intermediate between the District Courts and the Supreme Court, is being discussed in the Convention. If established, this Court is to be composed of all the District Judges in the District over which it has jurisdiction.

COMMISSIONERS' COURT.—Mr. Brown offered the following as an additional section: "Each organized county in the State now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people into precincts, not less than four, and not more than eight."

Who is to be the Speaker?

The most important event in the political history of the country, now that the State elections are over, is the election of a Speaker of the House of Representatives in the next Congress.

Mr. Wood is the best qualified for Speaker of all the gentlemen named—has more personal and political firmness, and more experience, coolness, dignity and grace.

Mr. Cox has been fourteen years a member of the House, and has fine qualifications for the position, with the exception of his small stature and free manners.

Mr. Kerr is the only Democratic member of the House from the West who has the experience and ability necessary for the office of Speaker.

The Statesman Desperate.

The desperation of the Statesman over the fortunate defeat of the disfranchisement of poor men in the Convention still continues. It is aggravated by the defeat of the Statesman's ticket in the recent city election at Austin.

The following from the last issue of our contemporary is bad, very bad—bad in journalistic ethics, bad in politics, bad in influence, bad in policy.

The editors of the Statesman, it is alleged, proposed to buy the Radical vote in the recent municipal election. Have you not been saying for a week past that we approved the conduct of the Missisippians who have bribed voters and bullied voters and used money and muscle and associated traps and self-respect, all for the honor and dignity of the State, and all for the purpose of excluding negroes and investing good men with office.

THE PLAY is now agitated of tacking a list of amendments to the new Constitution, and letting the people vote on them at the same time they vote on the main document.
