### MANAGEMENT OF WINDOW PLANTS.

The Horticulturist quotes the remark of J. E. Feast, of Baltimore, on the management of house plants, of which the following are the leading plants: Place the plants as near the glass as practicable, to get plenty of light. Windows facing the South are best. Judicious watering is the most important requisite. In winter keep the plants, not then growing, rather dry. Increase the moisture in spring, with the increase of the sun's power, and the advancement in growth. In summer water plentifully; decrease as cool weather approaches. Never water a plant without it is dry, and then water thoroughly, so that the soil may get wet through. Empty refuse water from the saucers, give plenty of air on every fine day and avoid draughts. Screen the plants from the dry air and dust of the room by a curtain or inside window. Syringe whenever dust is deposited.

### ANNUAL BEARING APPLE TREES.

It is well known, doubtless, that the apple, as a rule, bears most abundantly every other year. Consequently we are likely to have a feast one year and a famine the next, of this almost indispensable fruit. It is also well known that the Tulphocken, Grimes' Golden and many other varieties bear every year. Would not the fact that they bear every year make them more desirable for the orchard, other things being equal?

The Illinois State Board of Agriculture is in receipt of a package of fifty varieties of seeds of exotic plants from the Australian Department of Agriculture. Hereafter, regular exchanges will be made with that country.

K. Wormly, of Mendota, is buying poultry to send East alive for the holidays. He already has 3,000 geese and many many thousand turkeys and chickens. He will run a special train when his fowls are all gathered in.

Cass county, Iowa, has quails in abundance, but the foolish hunters are shooting them in great numbers. Better save the quails and let them kill the insects.

A Mr. Barnham, of Peoria, Ill., has recently purchased 9,000 acres of land in Allen county Kansas, for the purpose of making a stock farm.

One-quarter of a mile of the prismatic railroad at Hempstead has been laid, and the engine Sam Houston is at work on construction.

## THE CONVENTS N.

### SIXTY-SIXTH DAY.

AUSTIN, November 20, 1875.

The Judicial Apportionment Committee reported. Harris is with Montgomery again. The committee had first put Harris and Galveston together, but Galveston appeared before the committee with strong representations, and had Galveston made a separate district. Harris has had no one here to represent her except the delegates elected.

The General Apportionment Article passed finally by a vote of 51 to 11.

The Judiciary Article, slightly amended, was passed by a vote of 48 to 30.

The Article on Spanish Land Titles was taken up, and provoked some discussion.

The Article on Counties and County Lands was taken up on its second reading.

### Evening Session.

The article on Spanish land titles was engrossed. An effort to suspend the rules and pass to a third reading failed.

Johnson, of Collin, offered a resolution extending time to all railroads until the adjournment of the next Legislature.

DeMorse offered an amendment requiring the ordinance to be submitted to the people of the State before it will have effect. This last was last reconsidered and lost, and the ordinance passed by a vote of 48 to 26.

This is considered a triumph for the Texas Pacific Railroad. Some of the North Texas that have opposed railroads, as shown by railroad article, voted for the ordinance.

### Night Session.

A motion to take up the general provisions article out of order was lost. County and county lands, on second reading, was amended so as to prevent any new counties being created with less area than seven hundred square miles. The article was engrossed, rules suspended, and put on its third reading. It will pass.

### A Chief's Disgrace.

Fortunately there were not many people in the Court-house this morning, to witness the grief and shame of George Buel, the old and respected Chief of the Mohawk tribe of the Six Nations, at the conviction of his only child of horse-stealing. The chief appeared deeply affected, and stood by his son in the dock, as if he would fain defend him from the officers of the law. His son offered several times to speak to him, but the proud old chief maintained a dignified silence, and refused even to notice his son, although he stood close to him. He seemed to feel his position keenly, and his face and eyes showed evidence of weeping. When he was put in the witness-box, the Judge asked him if he would disinherit or treat his son differently on account of his crime. The chief remained silent for several seconds; he hung his head, his bosom heaved, and it was evident that in his heart a father's affection was struggling with a father's honor for the mastery. Finally he looked up, and with a glance full of meaning at his son, he replied: "I love my own blood." When the sentence of six months in the Central Prison was passed upon the boy the chief advanced, whispered something to his son, and then, with his wife, moved out of court.

Having a large flat box, in a cool cellar, free from frost, last winter, it was planted full of cabbages, as thick as they could be placed, in about six inches depth of earth. They thrive so well that the experiment will be repeated this year. This is less trouble than burying in the ground, and they are accessible for use when wanted during the winter, which is a great convenience.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat, stating the robbery of the stage between Corpus Christi and Brownsville, says, "charge it to the Jameses or Youngers." All right, we have nothing here to tempt the Joyce, McDonalds, and others, like the St. Louis "crooked whisky."

The Prince of Wales shook the Khedive warmly by the hand when he was received by that monarch at Cairo. They are old friends, the Prince having enjoyed the Oriental hospitality of Egypt no less than three times.

A GREAT many old English Crimean officers thought that, considering the fact that England has friendly relations with Russia; the holding of the Halaklava banquet was not in good taste. Is there any of these feelings among Federal and Confederate officers in our country?

Mr. Ballinger of Galveston has done himself great honor by trying to have the new Constitution voted on at a special election, and not have it mixed up with the election of state and county officers. He truly said that it was "the" only honest way. But he was noted down by 52 to 14. Let the people enquire for the eyes and noses on this vote.

A SPECIAL to the Chicago Times says that a woman, with a boy resembling the lost Charlie Ross, has been found at Thomaston, Conn. The father was notified, and sent a photograph of the lost boy, which corresponded with the boy just found. It is believed that the long lost little Charlie has been found at last. We hope so, at least.

UPON the call of the Superintendent of Schools for Illinois, a large number of prominent educators met at Chicago last week and made arrangements to represent the educational interests of this State at the Centennial, voting to raise \$10,000 for the purpose. What will Texas represent in the way of education?

THE St. Louis Globe-Democrat, speaking of Colonel Greaves, once the editor of the Democrat before its consolidation with the Globe, says that "he is as thievish as a dog, as mischievous as a monkey, and as cowardly as a sheep." It says also that if he had been editing a newspaper some eighteen centuries since, he would have stolen the manuscript of the Sermon on the Mount and suppressed it, in the interest of Pontius Pilate, for a dollar. The wit of such abuse absolutely neutralizes its offensiveness.

REV. R. H. TALLAFERRO.—The death by suicide of this well known and eminent clergyman of the Baptist Church has shocked the whole State. We have known him for twenty years and can bear testimony, which we do with and pleasure, to the honesty and devotion with which he held his religious convictions and maintained his Christian life, and to the patient fidelity of his labors in the cause of mankind. He was a man of fine talents and of great acquirements, an earnest preacher and a ready and forcible writer. He must have literally worn out his nervous system by too arduous and long protracted labor. But now, the language of the poet, quoted Longfellow: "The fever called living conquered at last, he lies in peace, his memory."

TEXAS AND PACIFIC RAILROAD.

An immense and well organized movement is being made all over the country in behalf of the Texas and Pacific railroad. It is at work in the Constitutional Convention, seeking to secure longer time to complete the work required by its charter in this State. For several days past a large concourse of its supporters has been in session at Memphis, composed of delegates from Ohio, Tennessee, Arkansas, Missouri, Mississippi, Louisiana, Alabama, and South Carolina. Jefferson Davis, Gov. McGiffin, Judge McClure of Arkansas, G. A. Henry of Tennessee, and other prominent gentlemen, participated. And at the present moment, a vast railroad convention is being held at St. Louis, in which the Texas and Pacific railroad will occupy much time and attention. The following extracts from the preamble and resolutions brought forward at the Memphis Convention will show the objects aimed at: "The National Government, furnished the money to construct the railway connecting the country of the Pacific with the northern portion of the Union, which railroad was useful and beneficial to the whole Union; and peculiarly and in a large degree exclusively beneficial to the States of the North, and having the tendency existing alone to the prejudice of the interests of the States of the South. The people of the North were unable, without Government aid, to construct the Northern railway, much less are the Southern people able now, or so far as the distant future can be foreseen, will they be able without Government aid to construct a railway with the necessary connections, which shall link their destinies and interests more closely with the country on the Pacific coast, as well as with the whole country of the Union. Resolved, That we ask the Congress of the United States to grant the credit of the National Union to aid to accomplish the construction of the Texas and Pacific Railway from its eastern terminus at Shreveport, in Louisiana, to the coast of the Pacific, at San Diego, or other suitable places on that coast; and also to aid and accomplish the construction of such railways as will connect the eastern terminus with the city of Memphis and Vicksburg and New Orleans.

Mason County. The letter published in Tuesday's Express from Mason County revealed a fearful state of affairs there. Our correspondents, after earnest efforts, could not satisfy himself that he had got at the truth of the matter, and therefore did not attempt to describe the origin and progress of the bloody feud. He gave the substance of Judge Martin's charge to the Grand Jury. Since then, as we find by an Austin letter to the Houston Telegraph, the Grand Jury have reported to the Judge that it is impossible for them to do anything with the matter, and ask to be discharged. They ask that the Governor send a commissioner to investigate the whole matter. The whole population of the country is ranged on the two sides in this war, and the Grand Jury, hence, the difficulty in the way of the court. The county and its people should be taken care of by the State Government or it will become a bloody wilderness. Martial law and military occupation should be the first remedies and then have matters investigated according to law, the troops serving all processes. The State is already disgraced by affairs in DeWitt and Mason.

THE NEW CONSTITUTION.

Form of Its Submission to the People.

Austin, Nov. 24.—Mr. Stockdale submitted a report that his committee had considered the subject of the "ordinance to provide for submitting the Constitution to a vote of the people," and reported a substitute therefor. Said substitute is as follows: "That this Constitution shall be submitted to the people at an election to be held on the second day of March, 1876. Those favoring the Constitution shall vote 'For the Constitution,' and those opposed to the same, shall vote 'Against the Constitution,' if a majority vote. For the Constitution, the Governor shall, within five days next preceding the return day, issue his proclamation, declaring the fact, and then the Constitution shall become, and therefore be, the organic and fundamental law of the State; but if it is rejected, then the new Constitution will have no effect. At the same time, there shall be a general election held for all State, district, county, and precinct officers, created and made elective under the new Constitution." Mr. Reagan moved to amend by striking out "March," in regard to time of holding the election, and insert "third Tuesday in February," and strike out "first Tuesday in May" in regard to the time of the Legislature meeting, and insert "third Tuesday in April." Adopted.

A dispatch received at Headquarters last evening says that Captain McNelly re-crossed the Rio Grande a few days ago but has now returned. The Captain at present is at Ringgold, while his company is at Edinburg, about thirty miles distant from Ringgold.

The authorities at Camargo have promised to deliver up a part (we presume they have sold some of them) of the stolen cattle, and the thieves, it is reported.

It is also reported that some four hundred head of cattle, in two herds, have been driven into Mexico since the 17th inst. Captain McNelly seems to be pursuing an independent course; he evidently is doing all in his power to stop the incursions of these Mexican thieves, and is winning the praise of the people for his energy and bravery he is displaying to accomplish such a purpose.

FALSE RUMOR.—Somebody, anxious to create a sensation, reported, this morning, that the Avenue block in Austin was burned last night. The news spread like wild-fire, street-corner congregations began to assemble and discuss the matter, insurance agents to bluster and stir around in the interest of their different companies, while the "local" of the Express ran at a break-neck speed to the telegraph office to get the news for an extra. How chagrined were we when we found out we had been sold.

Let the people look out for such a turn, shortly—it will be cold and blustering when it does come.
