Correspondence from Kimball County.
CAMP ON JOHNSTON'S FORK,
November 13th, 1875.

Editor San Antonio Express:
One night spent on Henry Creek in Mason county was our first wet and cold one, and we were compelled to extemporize a tent with the wagon cover, which, together with a large and cheerful fire assisted largely in making the night bearable. We did not complain, however, as we had been out twenty-five days, the weather had been delightful all the time, we were extremely fortunate in this respect, and looked upon this disagreeable spell as but justly due us. Nothing demanding haste, we did not break camp until nearly noon, when we took our departure for the Sabine, quite a large creek in the eastern part of Kimball county, which point was reached at 4:30 P. M., and here we camped nearly two days. The country over which we camped during the day was principally a grazing country, and an excellent one at that. There were small surveys here and there, of fillable land, but they were few and far between, as were also the ranches, and this was perhaps the most isolated part of our trip. Near our camping spot on the Sabine there were, however, three ranches, two quite new, one of not so recent date, and from this point to our present camping place there were a number of settlements to be seen.

The Sabine empties into the Llano river about five miles south of the old Fort Terret and road, and to that stream we determined to make an excursion on foot on the morning, and arose early accordingly, hunting along the Sabine on the way. There were plenty of ducks and some turkeys to be found in this locality and the day was not unpleasantly spent, although we walked from early morn till dark, over country as rough as the roughest; through cedar brakes, down ravines, up craggy bluffs and over rocks and hills, until well tired out, we returned to camp.

The ranche nearest our camp, had been located some years; and, although my power almost failed me, and my attempt must necessarily be a poor one, I will venture a description of said ranche and its occupants, as a fair sample of the society we have enjoyed to a great extent, since leaving home. Situated near the bank of the creek in a small enclosure stood a log cabin about thirty by fifteen feet with open doors, leaky roof, no windows, and space between the logs through which a small elephant might crawl. There were two apartments in this cabin; one was kitchen, parlor, drawing room, workshop and bedroom for five of the eleven or eight children, while the other answered the combined purpose of bedroom for the father, mother and the six remaining youngsters, kennel for seven dogs of assorted size and color, and chicken roost; and, during bad weather afforded shelter also for a pet fawn, two goats and about a dozen—more or less—pet sheep to which the several children laid special claim. The door yard was inhabited during the day by the pigs, calves, chickens, dogs, cats and children, while the larger animals were actually compelled to put up with a corral which occupied a prominent place near the house. Not a sign of cultivation was to be seen in any direction; not a stalk of corn, wheat or cotton in the neighborhood; nothing to indicate vegetation but the natural growth of the country. While we were camped near this ranche, we happened to pass close by the house while the family were at dinner, and as we peered in the opening where the door should have been, we were amused at the size and character of the party surrounding the table. There were the father and mother, and the afore-mentioned eleven or eight children, (it was a question in my mind as to which had the dirtiest face); there were no less than a dozen chickens, seven pigs, two calves, the pet fawn, and four of the seven dogs eating alternately from the same table (the balance of the family, poor creatures, were compelled to wait until the second table). The bill of fare consisted of corn bread, smothered in ashes, jerked beef, fried as hard as a board, and the customary allowance of black coffee; on this the family lived,—on this they will die. They were of that class who are crowded

out by civilization, schools, newspapers, churches, refinement and intelligence, were unsolved problems of them. They were satisfied and happy; they know no other life, neither do they want to. As the country settles up, they will move on, and on, and on, even to the farthest corner of the earth, but that they will find a spot where there is naught to molest or make them afraid.

Fortunate it is, indeed, that the Western part of the State has few inhabitants of this class as it has, for they are perfectly worthless as citizens, and are a curse to themselves and the human race at large. There are many good citizens in all these Western counties, and as they become numerically, the class just described will grow less. Oil and water will not mix; neither will education and ignorance, and the time cannot be far distant when their class will be entirely crowded out by the advance guard of civilization, and these Western counties will be inhabited by a thrifty, intelligent, well-to-do citizens.

Leaving Saline, we journeyed westward about six miles when we left the road to the north, and drove down to the Llano river where we found a splendid camping spot, and here we pitched our tent. The Llano river is quite broad and deep in places at this point, and we had excellent duck hunting. We also killed a number of Turkeys, of which the male are almost countless, numbers, close to camp, and we enjoyed our short stay in this locality not a little. We found a larger crop and of finer pecans near our camp at this point, than we have found elsewhere on our trip. The crop is unusually light this year, and there is in consequence a decided scarcity of the nut, which renders the finding of any quantity partially agreeable. Gathering enough to supply the party for several days we broke camp and moved still further up to the Llano, to Johnston's Fork, fifteen miles distant, crossing the stream for the last time near the mouth of the fork named for Gen. Joe. E. Johnston, who laid out the Fort Terret road many years ago.

I find that my letter has already grown lengthy, and I am not near to Kerrville yet, so I will close for this time and finish the trip to that point in my next. C. E. F.

Powell's large steam saw mill and gin-house at Corsicana, was burned a few nights since.

A man seventy years old married a maiden of 27 in Williamson County, last week.

The grasshoppers are levying on the wheat crop in the neighborhood of Belton.

An old gentleman named Sparkman, while getting out of a street car at Dallas, Friday, fell, breaking his collar-bone and dislocating his shoulder.

Bell County claims to have raised 15,000 bales of cotton this year, 7,000 of which has found sale in Belton—the average price paid being 11 1/2 cents.

A Louisiana lightning rod man was up at Palestine not long ago, doing considerable work. He suddenly decamped, without settling his board bill and the wages of an employee, whose team he took off.

A fellow named Goodrich took a young lady named Hermon, whose father lives near Waxahatchie, to Dallas, last Wednesday, to marry her. Before the ceremony took place, however, he robbed her of \$400 she had and left, she getting home the best she could.

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A Day for Caution.

If there ever was a time in the history of any country that carelessness in political movements should be observed, that period has now come to the people of this country.

Refugees from tyranny and oppression, the early pioneers of America, in coming to this country sought to build up a government where all men should be free and equal.

No prince or potentate, no centralized power, they hoped, should ever hold sway in this land. Church and State, in their very first principles being antagonistic, were divided and each given its particular sphere of action.

Under these outlines, our people have lived and have grown to what they are. In about a century and a half they have waxed in wealth, enterprise and power, outvying the greatest nations of modern or ancient Europe.

As has been intimated by a contemporary, it is a day when the prayer of every Catholic and Protestant in this country should be, "God forbid that any religious test should be set up in the next Presidential campaign."

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We have hoped that this was a danger that would be avoided for the good of all, but we must confess that the signs of the times seem to indicate a bitter religious warfare.

General Tom Harrison, of Waco, was elected chairman, and said he came with no particular view to advocate, his object being to promote in some way the building of the Texas and Pacific Railroad.

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WAR PREPARATIONS.

Cincinnati, Nov. 24.—A New Orleans special says the monitor Canoe has been ordered to prepare for sea at a moment's notice.

Provisions and ammunitions have been sent aboard, and the officers and men are forbidden to come ashore.

It is said that Commodore Croper reports favorably of New Orleans as the base of operations in case of a difficulty with Spain.

Executive Mansion, Washington, November 25, 1875.

It is with profound sorrow that the President announces to the people of the United States the death of Vice-President Henry Wilson, who died in the capital of the nation on the 23d instant.

In testimony of respect for the distinguished citizen and faithful public servant, the various departments of the Government will be closed on the day of the funeral, and the Executive Mansion and all the executive departments in Washington will be draped with badges of mourning for twenty days.

The Secretary of War and Secretary of the Navy will issue orders that appropriate military and naval honors be rendered to the memory of one whose virtues and services will long be borne in recognition by a grateful nation.

U. S. GRANT. By the President. NATIONAL RAILROAD CONVENTION.

St. Louis, Nov. 25.—The Texas at the St. Louis Convention met at the Southern Hotel, and were called to order by ex-Governor Throckmorton.

For numbers and enthusiasm, this delegation is a whole convention in itself.

Governor Throckmorton said that while the general government, the people, and the commerce of all the States in the Union were interested in the Southern Pacific project, Texas had a greater interest than any other portion of the American nation.
