We did not complain, howeverer, as we had been out twenty five days, the weather had been delightful all the time, we were extremely fortunate in this respect, and looked upon this disagreeable spell as but justly due us. Nothing demanding haste, we did not break camp natil nearly noon, when we took our departure for the Sabine, quite a large creek in the eastern part of Kimball county, which point was reached at 4:30 P. Mand here we camped nearly two days. The country over which we camped nearly two days. The country over which we had passed during the day was principally a grazing country, and an excellent one at that. There were smal surveys here and there, of tillable land, but they were few and far between, as were also the ranches, and this was perhaps the most isolated part of our trip. Near our camping spot on the Sabine there were, however, three ranches, two quite new, one of not so recent date, and from this point to our present camping place there were a number of settlements

The Sabine empties into the Llano river about five miles south of the old Fort Terret and road, and to that stream we determined to make an excursion on foot on the morrow, and arose early necordingly, hunting along the Sabiue on the way. There were plenty of ducks and some turkeys to be found In this locality and the day was not unpleasantly spent, although we walked from early morn till dark, over country as rough as the roughest; through cedar brakes, down ravines, up craggy blufts and over rocks and hills, autil well tired out, we returned to camp.

been located some years; and, although my power almost failed me, and my attempt must necessarily be a poor one, I will venture a description of said ranche and its occupants, as a fair sample of the society we have enjoyed to a great extent, since leaving home. Fortunate it is, indeed, that the Western part of the State has few inhabitants of this class as it has, for they are perectly worthless as citizens, and are a course to them-selves and the human race at large. Leaving Saline, we journeyed weatward about six miles when we left the road to the north, and drove down to the Llano river where we found a splendid camping spot, and here we pitched our test. The Llano river is quite broad and deep in places at this point, and we had excellent duck hunting. We also killed a number of Turkey's, of which the e are almost countless, numbers, close to camp, and we enjoyed our short stay in this locality not a little. We found a larger crop and of finer pecans near our camp at this point, than we have found elsewhere on our trip. The crop is unusally light this year, and there is in consequence a decided scarcity of the nut, which renders the finding of any quantity partially agreeable. Gathering enough to supply the party for several days we broke camp and moved still further up to the Liano, to John-ston's Fork, fifteen miles distant, crossing the stream for the last time near the mouth of the fork named for Gen. Joe. E Johnston, who laid out the Fort Terret road many years ago.

I find that my letter has already grown lengthy, and I am not near to Kerrville yet, so I will close for this time and finish the trip to that point in my next. C. E. F.

A Day for Caution.

If there ever was a time in the history of any country that carefulness in politic cal movements should be observed, that period has now come to the people of this country. Refugees from tyranny and appression, the early pioneers of America, in coming to this country sought to build up a government where all men should be free and equal. No prince or potentate, no centralized power, they hoped, should ever hold sway in this land. Church and State, in their very first principles being antagonistic, were divided and each given its particular sphere of action. Under these outlines, our people have fived and have grown to what they are. In about a century and a half they have waxed in wealth, enterprise and power, outvieing the greatest nations of modern or ancient Europe. As we have seen so successful as a nation under past systems of government, it seems to us that they are the systems which should be maintained for all time But in the growth of our population, there have come about circumstances which make the positions of the men who stand at the helm of our government to-day, more responsible than they ever were before. Questions of politics, questions of a religious nature, questions of social and commercial import, so difficult of solution as to require the utmost discretion to bear the ship of "tate safely through a sea of portending calam-

As has been intimated by a contemporary, it is a day when the prayer of every Catholic and Protestant in this country should be, "God forbid that any religious test should be set up in the next Presidential campaign." Already have some of the national leaders proposed to introduce questions of Church into the coming Presidential campaign, and if there is not an uprising throughout the country against such an issue, there is no telling what a condition of things may ensue.

THE CUBAN QUESTION.

They can be anthoritatively stated as these: There can be no doubt that the conditions existing in Cuba during the past six years have resulted in bringing about many and serious violations of the rights of American citizens, as gnaranteed under the provisions of the treaty of 1795. A Joint Commission of the two countries is now in session to adjust the claims arising out of these violations of treaty rights, together with other claims not connected therewish. It is the more rigid enforcement of these claims, and of the rights of our citizens exposed to infringement by forces that are particularly uncontrollable by the Spanish authorities, either in Madrid or Havens, on which bangs one point of the present discussion. The other is found in the readjustment that our diplomacy is seeking in the character and construction of 1796. The same provisions are found of 1788, but they have since been abrogated. They contain phrases under which the right of search has been claimed when either party to the treaty shall be bells gerent, authorizing its ships of war to stop merchant ships of the other party, visit them, and inspect their papers, if they are found "either sailing along the coast or on the high seas." Under them Spain, it is claimed, could search our merchant vessels if this republic accorded belligerent rights to the Republic of Cuba.
