PROF. C. A. FORD, of Hillbourn, Mo., was found dead in Baltimore recently.

THOUSANDS of hogs are dying of Cholera in the States of Indiana, Missouri and Illinois.

THE People's Saving Bank of New York City has closed. The deposits were \$200,000.

THE funeral of Wm. B. Astor, of New York, took place yesterday, and was large, by attendance.

EX-GOV J. E. ENGLISH, of Connecticut, has been appointed Senator in place of Senator Ferry, deceased.

DEAD.—Judge R. R. Reese, probate Judge of Leavenworth county, and one of the founders of that city, died of consumption on the night of the 19th inst.

THE MAJORITY for the ratification of the new Constitution of Alabama, reaches near 60,000. Only four counties in the State gave majorities against it.

THE mail received by the last Austin stage was in a very bad condition. Many of the papers were so wet and crumpled that they were not readable.

THE entire session of the National Orange will probably last about three weeks. It is the most important occasion in the history of the Order, and will place it on a good basis for future prosperity.

THOUSANDS of acres in the Valley of Trent, England, will probably remain under water the entire winter, caused by the terrible floods which have lately visited that section. Thousands of people are thus rendered helpless and homeless.

SOME say that "Brick" Pomroy has failed with liabilities amounting to \$140,000. Brick says he has not failed, and is going to prove that he hasn't by suing those who so injured him in announcing his failure.

IN the State of Iowa, a committee appointed to investigate the management of the State Reform School, has just reported that the boys are brutally whipped and starved to death, and that the Superintendent has drawn from the State on his revenue vouchers \$1200 for the support of 115 entirely imaginary boys.

THE case of Brigham Young, held in custody by Marshal Maxwell for contempt, on the order of Judge Boreman, of October 29th, came before Chief Justice White on habeas corpus, on November 17th, who decided that the judgment of Judge Lowe of May 10th, discharging the prisoner for the alleged contempt of disobedience of the order of February 26th, by Judge McKee, requiring him to pay alimony to Ann Eliza, was final and conclusive, and that upon the adjournment of the court it became beyond the power of the court to set aside the decision of Judge Boreman, committing Brigham Young to prison, and that the same was fully and completely executed.

Mr. Wilson's successor.

The death of a Vice President, occurring at the critical time between two Congresses, brings up another of those interesting possibilities which are insufficiently provided for in the Constitution. On the death of the Vice President, the President of the Senate succeeds to his functions and duties. The last previous occasion of this kind was the death of Vice President King, chosen on the same ticket with President Pierce, in 1852. Senator Atchison, of Missouri, still living, who was President of the Senate at the time, was then recognized as the Vice President of the United States, with the right of succession to the Presidency in the event of President Pierce's death.

At the approaching first session of the new Congress, the Senate will have to choose a president—not a president pro tem—of its body, and he will become invested with the vice-presidential dignity and functions—with the right of succession to the highest office in the event of President Grant's death. But this officer cannot be chosen till the new Congress meets. Meantime there is neither vice-president nor president of the Senate; and thus both the first and second presumptive successors to the highest office are wanting. The right, therefore, falls to the third person in order—the speaker of the House; but here a similar difficulty occurs; there is no speaker of the House.

Mr. Blaine was Speaker of the House in the late Congress, but that Congress no longer exists; it is defunct, and all its officers with it. If, therefore, President Grant should die between now and the meeting of the new Congress in December, there would be neither Vice President, President of the Senate, nor Speaker of the House, to succeed him. The honor, therefore, would descend by the provisions of the law to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.—St. Louis Republic.

Caught at His Tricks.

A NEW MACHINE MAN COMES TO GRIEF. We learn from the Austin News that a short time since Mr. C. Highwood was acting as an agent of the Singer Manufacturing Company, at San Marcos. The company discovered that this agent had taken their property to Luling and was disposing of it. Orders were sent from the main office at Houston to Mr. Norval Wilson, the agent in Austin, to go at once to Luling and investigate the case. He left on receipt of orders, went to Luling, found that Highwood had disposed of the property he had taken to Luling, and had gone to Houston. Mr. Wilson at once apprized an officer at Houston, who captured Highwood as he was about to slip away for other parts. Highwood was returned to Caldwell county. Mr. Wilson saw that an examination was had, and has the satisfaction of knowing that he is under bond of \$500 to answer to the charge of embezzlement.

THE ALMOST unmarked, though not forgotten grave of Edgar Allan Poe, was unearthed in Baltimore a few days ago, to lay the foundation for the monument about to be erected by his admirers. He has been buried over twenty-six years. The coffin was found in a good state of preservation. The skeleton was also in an almost perfect condition, lying upon the long bony hands reposing one upon the other, as they had been arranged in death. The skull bore the greatest evidences of decay.

Mr. Poe was one of the most remarkable men the world ever saw. As a writer, he evinced the deepest feeling and a most profound mind. His writings are very few, but those few are precious jewels, sparkling brightly in the literary diadem. Besides having the world's affection, Edgar A. Poe was possessed of the finest Christian virtues.

Correspondence from Kerrville.

KERRVILLE, TEXAS, Nov. 15, 1855. Editor San Antonio Express:

At the crossing of the Llano river, near the mouth of Johnson's Fork, in Kimball county, the river runs very swift, affording excellent water power, which parties are talking of improving. A mill in this locality would, no doubt, be a paying institution, as it would supply a scope of country boundless in extent. From the river we proceeded up the creek a distance of about five miles, and here we pitched our camp, with plenty of wood, water and grass near, and good hunting all around. The valley of Johnson's Fork is certainly one of the most desirable it has been our pleasure to see since leaving home, and presents by far greater advantages than any spot heretofore mentioned in my correspondence. It runs South from the Llano river and is perhaps ten or twelve miles in length by from three-fourths of a mile to a mile in width, every foot of which is irrigable and well watered by the swift and clear running stream. It is shut in on the east and west by the high bluffs, forming the cañon, and the irrigable land extends back to the hills. The stream winds back and forth from one side of the cañon to the other, watering every acre of land, and giving also plenty of timber, the whole course of the

A Horrible Story

We have heard of a very distressing accident occurring in Jackson County, West Virginia. It was a house-raising. It was just at the time when the men were hitting a heavy log into its place. The father, who was holding one end of the log, casting his eyes towards the little fellows, one of whom had the ax raised to sever the neck of his brother, let go of the log to save the boy and it fell, killing six men, two instantly, the others dying a few hours. The ax fell before the father could reach the scene, saving the neck of the son. This was seven persons hurled into eternity in a twinkling. — *Midland News.*
