Fools had better cut this out and paste it in their hats. A couple of gypsies persuaded a Kokomo, Ind., farmer that \$100,000 in gold was buried on his farm. Instead of \$100,000 in gold it is a \$5,000 mortgage that this Kokomo farmer now wants to raise.

Editorial Chipp.

The saddest thing of all, is, premature joy. An Ohio politician who had run for office, and was sure he had been elected, after "settling up" the drinks for three days, learned that he was beaten by a majority of three.

The Arkansas house of representatives has passed a memorial to Congress asking that the cotton-tax be refunded. The gap of twenty-four miles from Brooktown to Paris, on the Texas Pacific railroad, will soon be closed.

The iron bridge over the Sabine river was completed about three weeks ago, by G. King & Co.

Judge Walker of Nacogdoches and Ferris of Waxahatchie are spoken of as candidates for judgeship in the Court of Appeals.

Delegates to the Galveston nominating convention will be passed over the Central railroad for one fare for the round trip, and over the International and Great Northern for one and one-half.

The following circular has been handed us for publication. Our Democratic friends will find it instructive as regards the manner of arranging for the different nominating conventions:

BASTROP, Nov. 23, 1875.  
In answer to letters received, by every mail, "and from all parts of the State, touching the calling of conventions for nominating senators and district judges, I have to advise each county to elect its delegates, for such purpose, as soon as may be practicable—so as to be in readiness to respond to the call of the member of the State Executive Committee for the district in which it may be comprised.

The reappointment of the State by the Constitutional Convention will offer three or more members of the Executive Committee, as at present constituted, to the same district.

Wherever this occurs it will be proper for such members to act in conjunction. Wherever there is a vacancy, if the fact is made known to me, I will immediately appoint some one to act until the State Convention provides another committee.

As soon as the status of the different senatorial and judicial districts is permanently established by the Constitutional Convention, information will be promptly given. Jos. D. SAYERS.

There are 1,270 prisoners in the Missouri penitentiary, and the number is steadily increasing at the rate of 100 a year. So say the Missouri papers.

The political victory in Wisconsin recently, is not much of a one-sided affair, after all. The Republicans elected the Governor and the Democrats the balance of the State ticket.

The official returns of the vote on the new constitution of Missouri foot up as follows: For the constitution 100,600; against it, 14,302; total vote, 104,902; majority for the constitution, 76,238. It went into effect on the 30th of November.

Lord Houghton.  
WHAT AN ENGLISH POET AND STATESMAN THINKS OF AMERICA AND HER FUTURE.

The speech made by Lord Houghton, in response to the toast of his health at the reception at the Lotus Club on Saturday night, is of much interest on account of the manner in which it deals with the relations between England and America.

After the applause which greeted his appearance had subsided, Lord Houghton said that he felt deeply gratified for the enthusiasm with which his name had been received and for this compliment which had been offered him, in addition to the special value of the present compliment. He knew that here had been received Mr. Froude, the most original of English historians, who had given round that room with brilliant eye, like that of a frightened horse, and who had for the last two years been employed in the important work of creating a new confederacy of British colonies. Here, too, Canon Kingsley had thrilled them with an urgent eloquence like a voice of departing genius; and here, too, had been received the promise of future English statesmanship in young Lord Rosebery. He felt himself, therefore, under the obligation of answering as clearly and powerfully as he could a question not of rare occurrence which he was conscious every one of his hearers was putting to him in his heart—"What do you think of our country?" As to another not infrequently form of interrogation, "Do you admire our constitution?" he would state with the utmost candor and the most careful consideration that he must ask their leave—to reserve his opinion. On the other question he had no difficulty. America was eminent for the beauty of her women. At this time of life he was no fair witness on that subject, but he would offer the more valuable testimony of his son, a young man of some talent and perception, of seventeen years of age, who had gone home with this expression on his lips and this impression on his heart. In this sense, therefore, he fully admired the youth of America, but he was not prepared to impute the country herself exactly in that aspect.

Americans were very fond of appealing to their youth. When anything went wrong or seemed incomplete, or disappointing, they said, "You should remember how young we are." Now, he was not prepared entirely to admit that pretension. In all that constitutes a nation, in the aggregation of thought, in the expansion of ideas, America had all the experience of the Europe from which she came, added to the interest and vivacity which she had gained from her transportation to a novel hemisphere. She had, indeed, that charm of middle life and that full, healthy beauty and mature intelligence which a great French novelist had impregnated in "La Femme de Quarante Ans," Balzac himself may have taken his notion from the old anecdote of a Frenchman giving to his son two counsels on his entry into the world—"Listen to the old men and make love to the women of forty."

This is the advice he would not repeat. Love your America with all the devotion she deserves, and do not disregard the words and thoughts of veteran Europe. He, however, was not about to show the petting of his son, or of his present position. But, as allusion had been made to him both as a poet and politician, it might not be unbecoming for him to say that he had done his best to reconcile whatever imaginative faculties he may have possessed to the practical business of the world and its political action. He had been for twenty-five years a member of the House of Commons, and afterwards of the other branch of the Legislature, and he believed that, taken as a whole, man's life suffered from a mixture of the real and the ideal. He knew he was addressing the Lotus Club, a society whose fundamental principle (if words mean anything) had been expressed in the melancholy verses of one of the latest and not least of American poets, Jacques Miller—

It seems to me that neither Earth  
Is weary from eternal toil  
And bringing forth by fretted soil  
In all the agonies of birth,  
Sit down sit down! So it were best  
That we should rest, that we should rest.

But somehow, or other he hardly thought that his present audience was quite so purely contemplative; quite so entirely free from all worldly interests and secular necessities as their monasticism would imply. And they were right. If they lived exclusively in a sphere of literature and art they would be living solely for themselves; but now they are mixing in daily life with other men, taking, leaving with their thoughts and objects the hard and heavy destiny of the common multitude of mankind. They were in truth an aristocracy quite as real as, and in their ultimate action, more powerful than, the Senators of Venice, the barons of England or the grandees of Spain. It was their mission to lead on this magnificent world, to give form and permanence to what would otherwise have been a fleeting development of material force, to give dignity to wealth and consolation to poverty, and to stifle the jealous passion of the older world at any possible expansion of the dominion of the new by making it coincident with the progressive development of man.

At the conclusion of his very eloquent address the noble Lord took his seat and was greeted with enthusiastic applause. Judging from the prevalent tone of the new York Herald editorials in regard to Spain and Mexico and their positions as regards their peace with the United States, if James Gordon Bennett is engaged at all, as some say he is, we are sure it is to his information.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Associated Press Dispatches.

DOMESTIC.

The Treasury will sell no gold in December.

Fernando Wood declines the further use of his name as a candidate for Speaker.

The President has not yet finished his message, but some portions, or all of it, will be read to the cabinet shortly.

Charles O'Connor is very ill. A report has been in circulation that he was dead, but it is now said to be untrue.

Surgeon Ebenezer Swift has been assigned to duty as Medical Director of the Department of the Gulf. Assistant Surgeon A. A. Yeomans has been ordered to duty on the Department of Texas.

Cardinal McCloskey delivered an address on the 28th, in St. Patrick's Cathedral, in Newark. It was his first address since he returned from Rome, and the congregation to hear him was very large. It was confined principally to a review of his visit to Rome, and was highly eulogistic of the character of Pope Pius IX.

New Orleans, Dec. 2.—The Bank of America has suspended. The Board of Directors have resolved to cease active operations and put the bank into liquidation at once.

FOREIGN.

London, Dec. 2.—The St. Petersburg Gales says the incessant raids into Russian territory prove the necessity of the occupation of the remainder of Khokand.

London, Dec. 2.—Intelligence from Toledo, Spain, says the authorities have closed the Protestant Church there and expelled the pastor and schoolmaster.

The election ordinance provides that a general election shall be held on the third Tuesday of next February, when the people of Texas will be called upon to accept or reject the new Constitution. If the Constitution is ratified, it will become the new organic law of Texas on the third Tuesday of April, 1876.

The State, district, county and precinct officers elected by the Constitution, will also be elected at this time. The Senators and Representatives to be elected will assemble at Austin on the day the new Constitution becomes the organic law of the State, which will be the third Tuesday of April, if ratified, and organize the Fifteenth Legislature.

MINNESOTA has been sending its Constitution. One of the amendments provides that any woman of twenty-one years of age and upward may vote in any election for choosing officers of schools, or in any measure relating to schools, or may be eligible to any office pertaining to the management of schools. Another amendment provides for the investment of the school fund in the United States and State bonds, the bonds of Minnesota issued previous to 1869 excepted, a curious confession by the people of that Republican Commonwealth, that they are not as honest as they believe their neighbors to be.

THREE VENERABLE LADIES—Mrs. J. J. Hamilton, who, with her family, went on a visit to relatives in Georgia, some weeks ago, returned last Wednesday morning, and has placed us under obligations for late papers. Mr. Hamilton's mother-in-law, accompanied him on his trip; she being seventy-two years of age. On the last inst. at Marietta, Ga., she met two of her sisters, whom she had not seen before in seventy-five years—she, Mrs. Willie Egger, sister of Mr. George B. Egger, aged eighty-four years and the other, Mrs. Elizabeth Christian, aged eighty years. This is an instance of rather remarkable longevity, when it is considered that the three sisters were all in good health when they met. Their earliest age is two hundred and thirty-six years.—The Democrat.

FURNITURE.
