Madam Tietjens recently refused \$5,000 for five songs at the Golden Drawing of the Louisiana State lottery, December 27.

The oldest lady in California, probably, Dona Eulalia Perez Guillen, who is now supposed to be above 140 years of age, has recently moved to the San Jose Valley, near Pomona, for her health. It is thought that the Pomona climate will enable her to live to a good old age.

It is said that the late William B. Astor, in his will, leaves the bulk of his property to his two sons, and not to his eldest son, as previously reported. His daughters are amply provided for in the testament.

Prof. Tice predicts that the weather will be warmer from the 15th of this month to the 18th and then cold again. About the 25 it will be warm and about the 30th cold, very cold, until January 6th; then warmer for a few days followed by cold weather till about the close of the month. The month of February will be very boisterous, generally warm, but short spells of intensely cold weather.

Ullman has created somewhat of a sensation by refusing to let his son sing at Bordeaux because the civic and military authorities insist that they shall be permitted to exercise the privilege of occupying boxes without paying for them.

Henry C. Watson, editor of Watson's Art Journal, died in New York on the 2nd inst. This gentleman was a fine musician, and his whole life was spent in advancing the interests of his art.

Seth Green, the noted fish culturist and sportsman, that the most effective hook in fly fishing is made from a strong needle, annealed bent and tempered, and consequently without a hook. He asserts that only in this way can a really sharp hook be obtained, that tension of the rod is amply sufficient to keep such a hook in its place, and that a very gentle stroke will fix the hook point in the mouth of the fish.

One of the gentlemen who has been active in making war on the Postmaster-General has come to grief. Gen. Bart, of Boston, has been boasting that Mr. Jewell was going out chiefly because he did not treat Gen. Bart with respect. The President became disgusted, and sent word to Mr. Bart that if he did not resign immediately he would be removed.

Vanderbilt University at Nashville, Tenn., now has 200 students in its medical department, 150 in the literary department, 30 in the theological department, and 20 in the law department.

An ancient Damascus blade was recently found in the trunk of an old oak tree in Owen County, Ind., by a farmer who had heard of the tradition that such a sword was hidden in the neighborhood. He turned the sword into a corn-cutter but was loath to present it to the State. The sword bears the date of 1640, and is supposed to have been placed in the tree during some of the French Indian wars. A portion of an inscription is visible, which is supposed to be the old Spanish legend: *No sei segunt sin razon, ni sei segunt sin honor—do not draw me without reason; do not sheath me without honor.*

"Hurry back from church, for I want to hear what the preacher says about Jesus," said Matthias Smith, of Kittanning, Pa., to his wife as she left the house for church on Sunday morning last. THE CENTENNIAL ORATOR.—The vexed question of the Centennial orator was settled yesterday by the selection of William M. Evarts, of New York, with Longfellow as poet and a grandson of Richard Henry Lee as reader of the Declaration of Independence. Of the wisdom of the last two appointments there

can be little question. There is a special fitness in selecting one whose grandfather was originally appointed to frame the immortal Declaration of 1776—and who doubtless would have done so but for his unavoidable absence—to read the charter of our liberties given us by the fathers of the Republic a century ago. There will be music, also, in blending the voice of the ex-Confederate with the shouts that will go up in the name of a free and united country on the grandest occasion of our history, and it will heal the lingering wounds of sectional estrangement, for none should survive that day. Longfellow will most happily weave in song the bright lessons and promises of a century of free government. Evarts is one of our most finished and sparkling and logical of legal orators, but whether he can command the inspiration that must grace the orator who is to speak for forty millions of people who have solved the problem of self-government, is the doubt that will hang over his name until his work shall have been done.—Philadelphia Times.

AN ANECDOTE OF KATE FIELD.
Recently I was told the following creditable story concerning your London correspondent, Kate Field. Several years ago when she was in London she met a young man who is now a noted artist, but who at that time was in the most straitened circumstances. The story as told by the young man was to this effect: Without work and utterly discouraged he contemplated suicide. Fortunately, before giving way to despair, he called upon Miss Field and found her surrounded by a brilliant circle. He feels certain that Miss Field and the sympathy she had shown him, encouraged her to commission him to paint the portrait of a distinguished author. The artist says that he told her he dare not undertake a portrait, as that was not his forte. She insisted he should try, and before he left pressed quite a sum of money upon him as a first instalment. The portrait was painted and never called for, but he says he was paid for it all the same, and feels sure that it was only a delicate way which Miss Field adopted to relieve his penury. Of course suicide was abandoned as a bad investment, and he now resides in Italy and is famous and rich.—Washington Correspondent Louisville Courier Journal.

The Next Stockraisers' Meeting

We have recently had several conversations with some of the leading stockmen of Western Texas, and especially with Mr. J. T. Queberry, of Pleasanton, the President of the Stockraisers' Association. We find that there is a general and earnest desire that there shall be a meeting of the Association at an early day as practicable, and that there shall be a full attendance.

The President of the Association, therefore, ought to call a meeting at an early day as is compatible with securing full attendance of stockmen. The stockmen should all attend, if practicable, and the stock business of Western Texas, which is the greatest source of its wealth and prosperity, should be placed on a sound business basis, and be hereafter managed on a sound and fair business principle.

The Stockraisers' Association should reorganize fully. They should resolutely put down all practices injurious to their interests and to the reputation of the stockmen of the West. They should unite to enforce the laws and to suppress the bad and lawless men who have intimidated themselves into the stock business and profited by their bad practices.

The real stockmen of Western Texas are good men and gentlemen, and all they need to succeed in making the business what it ought to be is unity, fraternity and organization. In order to show the character of our stockmen we mention some of the names of those who are known to us, and who are known to the public, as being men of good character and high standing in the community.

DEAR EXPRESS: I arrived in this city Saturday at 7 p.m., getting up at the Kendall House, which is kept by J. G. O'Grady. Mr. O'Grady takes as much pleasure in my success so well in making the guests comfortable and feel like they were at home. I can not but mention him first, as I am delighted with Bexar and its surrounding country, and my opinion is that Bexar is the best city in the city could not have been selected. Bexar is situated on the Ohio creek, the town being built on both sides of the stream. The creek all around a perfectly graded, the hills forming a complete chain, affording a slight so beautiful, that it reminds one of some imaginary Fairyland. There is a gradual elevation from the river, a person leaves San Antonio and goes to Bexar, making Bexar at least 500 feet higher than the Alamo City.

Bexar is said to be a very healthy locality, especially for those afflicted with lung diseases. And it is reasonable that it should be, for a place so elevated, that its inhabitants breathe only the pure, life-involving atmosphere, cannot be anything else but healthy. The population of Bexar is estimated at 500, mostly Germans. They have all grown wealthy and independent, and are being very poor when they were here. Farming seems to be a very profitable vocation, and lands bring good prices, from \$1 25 to \$5 an acre. I was out for one-third of the day, and found that even in the driest season the rate from 20 to 25 bushels of wheat a good season they make about 20 bushels to the acre. Farming is the business here.

After dinner, yesterday, I walked to the main part of the town, which is on the west side of the river, and called upon the agent of the Express at this place, Mr. H. G. Froebel. After I told him who I was, and my business, he introduced me to the office, and he was not many minutes before we were perusing the paper columns of the Express, after which I had the pleasure in procuring some names of subscribers. They are all very anxious to get the Express, and the success is a good news, and their support is a sufficient proof of their confidence in it. It will continue to be so. I am doing first-rate. J. L. M.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 15. News from Brownsville is to the effect that a Republican convention held for Matamoros, Morgan, of the Government party, and Fierce, of the Central party, being the contestants considerable fighting was had, four persons being killed and many wounded. Morgan and Fierce both being among the wounded.

More trouble is anticipated, and soldiers are marching on the streets. This election has an important bearing on the gubernatorial election in February. There has been no cattle stealing in the last fortnight.

The Texas and Pacific comes out with a severe tirade against Capt. McNelly, claiming that the government should demand indemnity for lives lost, &c.

We do so with great pleasure. Mr. Reed would make an excellent Alderman, if he will spare enough time for the work required of the position, and we believe he will do so, as he takes great interest in the welfare and advancement of the city.

There are a number of gentlemen in the city who are connected with the organization of the Knights of the Golden Circle in other cities, and would favor the institution of that Order here. Our Mardi Gras celebrations could thus be made much more attractive in the future than they have been in the past.

The BAZAR and Screen—The Children's Bazar, with a supper, given by the Ladies' Aid Society of the Episcopal Church last evening at the Literary Hall, was not so well attended as was expected or should have been. The ladies of that Church have done very much of the hard

work to build up the magnificent cathedral which now adorns Travis square, and it is through their energy that it is mainly to prosper in the future. The proceeds of the entertainment last evening, and the dance and supper to-night, will be expended in putting an enclosure around St. Mark's cathedral, and are of very meritorious character, deserving the fullest patronage. We still cling to the hope that a greater part of the required sum will be realized from these entertainments.

Although the attendance last night was rather slim, all enjoyed themselves very much, and the preparations which were made under the management of the excellent ladies of the Episcopal Church, were all that could be wished for to please.

THE FUNERAL of H. MacCormack yesterday was a very large one. The deceased had many friends, and they made a duty to attend. He was buried with full military honors by the Alamo Rifles, of which Company he was Second Lieutenant and Drill-Master. The ceremonies throughout were exceedingly impressive. The funeral march played by the Military Band, with the deadened sound of muffled drums; the Riflemen with arms reversed and heads bowed low in grief, the touching ceremonies and the wailing of the bereaved wife at the grave of the dead, touched the tender chords of even the strongest hearts of men, and brought forth tears of sorrow and regret.

Mr. MacCormack's place can hardly be filled by the Company, which deeply mourns his loss, and San Antonio loses a good and dutiful citizen, a man of fine mind and very extended information.

ALMOST A DUCKING—Last evening, three of our citizens, while indulging in a boat-ride, had a narrow escape from an immersion in the San Antonio river. Gliding down with the stream, they were being most approved, as it is less arduous, and not so trying to the muscles, they concluded to pass under the mill-bridge which is rather a hazardous undertaking. On approaching within some thirty yards of the bridge, they were seized by the current, which is particularly swift at that point, and a slight panic seized the party. They immediately headed for a landing, and struck the left side of the causeway of the bridge, when the three occupants of the boat managed to scramble to terra firma. The skiff, however, gracefully over, passed under the bridge and grounded safely in the bathing pond, when the party had the pleasure of wading into the water, righting and bailing her, before they could proceed on their homeward journey. The excitement of shooting the mill-bridge, is deferred sine die.

It is a very easy thing to be polite, and conduct yourself in a gentlemanly manner, provided you are gifted with common sense. We have always held that the perfect gentlemen and ladies were those who had good possession of their brains, and deported themselves according to the respectable dictates of their minds. But there are many people in this world who have had a pepper control of their senses, and these people seldom know when to behave or how to behave, and this feeling does not belong to courtesy alone, but to the high as well as the low. The most common cause of etiquette are often displayed among those who assume the lead in style, fashion, etc., as well as they are by persons whom these look down upon from their pedestals of pride and self-esteem. We will therefore invite attention to twenty of the most impolite acts that a person can be guilty of, and ask how many times during the day does the reader break the rules of etiquette by committing one or another, or perhaps, a majority of the following offenses:

1. Loud and boisterous laughing. 2. Reading when others are talking. 3. Reading aloud in company without being asked. 4. Talking when others are reading. 5. Spiriting about the house, smoking or chewing. 6. Cutting finger-nails in company. 7. Leaving church before worship is closed. 8. Whispering or laughing in the house of God. 9. Gazing sidly at strangers. 10. Leaving a stranger without a seat. 11. A want of respect and reverence for seniors. 12. Correcting older persons than yourself, especially parents. 13. Receiving a present without an expression of gratitude. 14. Making yourself the hero of your own story. 15. Laughing at the mistakes of others. 16. Joking others in company. 17. Commencing to talk before another has finished speaking. 18. Commencing to eat as soon as you get to the table. 19. Making remarks upon other people's dress. 20. Not listening to what any one is saying in company.

Now, we dare say, there is not a reader of the Express who does not know better than to do one of these impolite things, and when such an offense is committed, the person guilty of it must be smitten by his conscience with the knowledge that he has done something disgraceful or disrespectful to another. But perverted human nature is very prone to act in a careless way, and bring on habits that are highly repulsive to respectable people. It is very poor manners for a gentleman to take the inside of the pavement when he meets a lady; so to refuse to raise an umbrella, should he come in contact with anyone on a rainy day, etc.

If all were polite and gentlemanly to those whom they meet in conversation as well as general action, society would become greatly elevated. Love and esteem would prevail on every hand. There would be no necessity for laws to protect the peace of the community, for there would be no broils or disorders. The members of the family of man should live in peace and harmony one with another, study to please and satisfy their fellows, and treat all as kinsmen, rather than beings among whom there exists a grudge to keep up a constant strife or hatred. It is an easy thing to be a gentleman, and much more pleasure is obtained in acting properly than improperly. Common sense people—those who really lead civilization—judge their fellows by their manners, and it is good manners that draw persons together and make friends of them, while bad manners widen the breach of friendship and contaminate those who practice them and the society into which they come.

An essential to politeness is a proper speaking of the English language. Such gross errors as using taken for took, written for wrote, and for got, besides numerous other, and slang expressions, should be avoided. Does society realize that her good name is almost wholly at stake upon good manners, and an intelligent use of the tongue?

E. Fisher. It was determined to give a grand ball and have a public debate during the month of January, and the proper committees to attend to the getting up of these entertainments were appointed.
