

Sheep in West rn Texas. The Pleasanton Stock Journal says that

all that is needed to start a sheep ranch is, two jack-asses, two Moxican boys, one Mexican man, one sack of frijo les (Mexican beaus,) some coffee and a few extras, 1500 owes, and 20 to 30 backs, and a gan

The Mexican ewes, if bought in August, will cost \$1 50 to 1 65. The bucks are governed in price according to the grade. A Mexican boy will cost \$8 to 10 a month and the man about \$22 a month; jack asses \$ '5 each; the frijoles 3c a pound; alsogether for the first year, about \$35:0. No returns will be realized until spring, when shearing time comes. The ewes will yield from 21 to 21 pounds of wool, which will bring about 24c per pound, and then come the lambs which will double the herd if properly taken care of. A man then has from his investment of \$3500, 3000 sheep and upwards of \$900 from the sale of the wool. The next fall the shearing from the lambs will bring about one pound, and from the ewes one and one half pounds, which will again cause him to to realize over \$900, which will give himthat year \$1,800 in each from his woot, and a bord of 3,000 sheep. The male lambs will generally be about one half.

The second spring the old ewes will have lambs, and from one-third to one half of the first lambs will breed. By calculation it will be seen how rapid the increase will be. Some of the largest sheep saisers own from 5,000 to 190,000 others have from 20,000 to 30,000, and some from 10,000 to 20,000. All are not it one flock; generally about 3,000 are kept The owners generally live in towns or "settlements," and the sheep are given to charge to the "how" herder. The expenses are so light that a person owning 30,000 sheep, ten flocks, would have an come of \$18 000 from the wood alone, independent of the increase. The expenses are in proportion about as we give them for a flock of 1,500 head.
