BREMEN HAVEN EXPLOSION. Bremen, Dec. 19.—A dispatch says Empress Augusta has started a benevolent association composed of the ladies of Bremen, in aid of the survivors of the dynamite explosion.

Death of a Texas Hero.

Mr. Alexander Edgar, an ex-Galveston News, died at the residence of his son-in-law, Wright N. Anderson on Double Bayou, Brazoria county, on the 7th of December last, in the seventy-sixth year of his age.

He participated in the struggle for the independence of Texas, and was at the siege and capture of the Alamo by the Texans under Milam and Johnson, having been one of those who volunteered for this occasion when the attempt was considered too hazardous to be undertaken by Colonel, afterwards General, Edward Besson.

He was after the surrender, discharged, and returned to look after the safety of his family. In April, 1835, he settled on Galveston Island, near the present site of the Hospital, and has always claimed Galveston as his home, though remaining most of the time on Double Bayou with his children and grandchildren, to whom he was greatly attached, and who deeply feel his loss.

He was a good citizen, and devoted to the great State which he helped to redeem from the domination of wild beasts, Indians and Mexicans, ever dwelling with pride on the achievements and daring of his comrades in arms, and looking with pleasure on the wonderful progress and development of the country.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Assassinated Press Dispatches. DOMESTIC. AUSTIN.

Austin, Dec. 19.—Henry Sauer, aged 74, is dead. The epidemic is almost epidemic. One fatal case.

A delegation of citizens from Live Oak county visited Governor Coke this morning, asking for a military company to protect them from cattle raiders.

TYLER. Tyler, Texas, Dec. 19.—Yesterday the largest convention ever held in Smith county met in this city and unanimously endorsed Coke and Hubbard for Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

PHILADELPHIA. Philadelphia, Dec. 19.—The Congressional party, with the President and members of the Cabinet are being entertained by the Philadelphia Press Club. The President, with his family, are guests of G. W. Childs, Restaurateur.

NEW YORK. New York, Dec. 19.—The Brooklyn detectives have succeeded in collecting a strong chain of evidence around P. N. Rubenstein, accused of murdering the young Jewess in East New York.

HEALTH OF CHAS. O'CONNOR. New York, Dec. 19.—Chas. O'Connor is considered out of danger. He ate heartily, and his stomach has recovered its tone and functions.

SEVERE STABBING AFFRAY. Marshall, Texas, Dec. 19.—Chas. Schonhardt, a cigar maker, was seriously, if not fatally, stabbed here by a man named John Angel. Angel has the reputation of being a bad man, having killed a man here some four or five years ago.

Our Special Correspondent.

Dear Express—I arrived here tonight at 10 o'clock, at 12 o'clock, Friday, feeling unusually well, not as in the general expectation, "tired and worn out and ready for rest," but ready for business. Now, speaking of the Express, it may be that it got somewhat unpopular here and elsewhere, on account of the unfortunate administration of Aabacook, but since it has been known that its present management are not of the same stripe, and that nothing will be left undone to advance it to a permanent and popular newspaper, the people are again supporting it, even with more enthusiasm than before.

The new Constitution is all the talk here—discussing its merits and probable adoption, though all Medina County will cast her vote against it.
