May not another place in Texas, but she does not, Austin, even, beats us; most of the towns of the Colorado do. We have lost, to reduce the proportion of consumers to an energetic producer, and this will become the cheapest vegetable market in the State.

The Masses—San Antonio has been supplied this fall and winter with almost every necessity, and many luxuries, at very reasonable prices. At present, however, there is a falling off.

Guns are scarce, and in good demand at \$1 per barrel.

Farms have almost stopped coming in, although many more are expected before winter is over. The crop this year was an unusually large one, and many thousands of bushels have been shipped from this point. They are now worth from \$2.75 to \$3 per bushel, according to size.

Hides, dry, sound and heavy, are worth from 10 to 20 cents per pound; seconds, 10 cents; hips 8 to 8; damaged, 5. Our hide market is nothing like to what it was two years ago, many cattle having now removed from the country. Still, the trade is considered paying to the dealers.

Wool has ceased coming in, the season being past, and the trade will not be re-

turn until next spring.

It is a very important item in the interests of San Antonio, and in the general country around us, because, indeed, the business will largely increase. The wool interest is destined to take the lead of all other interests in Western Texas. Texas wool has been greatly improved of late years, but still they are not considered the best grade. But a few years will develop what is being done by sheep raisers in the way of introducing blooded stock into their herds.
