A NEW AMERICAN CONFED-

ERATION.

The Panama Star states that the

government of Guatemala has, in a

ircular, submitted to the other

States proposed the following as

bases on which to found the new

confederation of Central America:

1. That the five Republics should

maintain their independence and

the integrity of Central American

territory.

2. That they should also preserve

the democratic form of government

and its corresponding liberal insti-

tutions.

3. That peace ought to be main-

tained between the five Republics,

and in the event of internal disputes

peace means should be established

for the settlement of them.

4. The diplomatic and consular

representation abroad ought to be

uniform.

5. That the five Republics should

unite whenever any of them has

a claim against a foreign power.

6. That they ought also to unite

in making contracts for steamship

lines and telegraphs, for the pur-

chase of coast guard ships, and for

any other enterprise of mutual

utility.

7. That the five Republics ought

to be united by roads and tele-

graphs.

8. A postal convention ought to

be held to facilitate all kinds of

correspondence in a way that would

be safe and inexpensive.

9. International rights ought to

be uniform and treaties with for-

eign nations equalized.

10. That in the five Republics the

same civil, penal, commercial, and

custom house laws ought to rule for

exports, imports, and weights and

measures.

11. That public instruction should

be organized in the same manner

in all of them, and aiding each

other in the matter of text-books,

etc., etc.

12. The literary and professional

titles be recognized in all the five

Republics without any other re-

quirements than the proofs of their

authenticity.

13. That the sons of these repub-

lics in any one of them have the

rights of citizenship; and

14. That the extradition of crim-

inals include a greater number of

criminals than that established in

treaties with foreign nations.

A Word of Advice
