JUDGE CHAMBERS.

Judge William Chambers, who was nominated for Governor by the Republican State Convention at Houston, is a nephew of the late General Thomas Jefferson Chambers, whose name is prominent in the history of Texas. Judge Chambers himself inherits the high talents and chivalrous tone, that characterized his uncle. He is a manly, courageous and cultivated gentleman, a fine lawyer, an excellent Judge, and has an unimpeachable record.

He has been the Judge of the First Judicial District of the State, which includes his own county of Chambers, which was named after General Chambers. Being one of the appointees of Governor Davis, and also having some personal enmities, that except was made to have him removed from office, and it was hoped that, through party prejudice, a Democratic Legislature would "address" him out to short order. But he appeared before the Legislature and plead his own case without the aid of counsel, in an ever-whelmingly powerful and convincing manner that the case of his opponents had "not a leg to stand upon." To the everlasting honor of that Democratic Legislature he was unanimously acquitted.

In the last Congressional canvass he ran against Hon. John H. Reagan, beat him in his own county, pushed him hard generally, and had he had longer time for the canvass, would have probably beaten him. Judge Chambers, though opposed to secession, and a Union man, was a Confederate soldier. When the war closed, he was a Captain in the regiment commanded by the writer of this article. Although, as independent journalists, we do not take stock in the race between the two States tickets, but do justice to the character of the men on both sides, we can heartily say that Judge Chambers is worthy, in life, character, intellect and acquirements of any office within the gift of the people of Texas. We speak of him not merely from our own knowledge of him as a public man, but from the intimate personal knowledge of long acquaintance and close friendship.

Mr. BLAIR is willing to grant amnesty to every ex-Confederate except Jeff Davis. His mistake is, that as a matter of reconciliation between the North and the South, it would have been wiser to grant amnesty to Mr. Davis, and refuse it to the rest of the 750,000 who are under disabilities. Amnesty to all other Southern men means the removal of difficulties in the way of their personal interests, more than anything else; amnesty to Mr. Davis, the one only representative man of the whole South, since General Lee's death, means political reconciliation between the two sections of the Union. The refusal of amnesty to Mr. Davis, nullifies the conciliatory effect of all past amnesty. It leaves the "bloody chasm" unbridged, and as wide as ever.

Mr. BLAIR has killed the Republican party in the South as dead as a herring. Even the colored Republican members of the House had the sense and courage to vote against the dictator to Jeff Davis. He is a man of the highest caliber, one of the most eloquent and powerful speakers in that State, white or black, voted against the extension of Mr. Davis from the Absentee bill.

No CONFEDERATE SOLDIER, SEAMAN or how earnest a Republican he may be, will ever vote for Blair for President, nor for any other Republican leader who has voted, or may vote, to exclude Jeff Davis from the benefits of the proposed amnesty bill. The Confederate soldier who would vote for those who seek to brand the whole Confederate army with the stigma of shame and dishonor by branding their old chief in the forehead, especially such a chief as Mr. Davis, would prefer himself a dented and self-dishonored man.

DEATH OF COL. JAS. O. FUGA—It is with the deepest pain that we announce the death of Col. Fuga, of Tex., and the intelligence of which has just reached us. We learn that he was buried recently at Baton Rouge, but we have not been apprised of the precise date of his death. We regret that we have not at our command in the hurry of the moment the data necessary to give a more extended account of our departed friend, who has been called from earth in the prime of his great powers.

Col. Fuga was a distinguished conservative leader, and his public views were always characterized by moderation, liberality and far-sighted sagacity. As a jurist his reputation was scarcely inferior to that of any other member of the Louisiana bar. Although originally opposed to secession, he took an active part upon the Confederate side in the late war, and was severely wounded while leading his regiment at the battle of Shiloh. He was, in a word, a remarkable and an admirable man in many relations of life. A faithful friend, an accomplished advocate, and a devoted patriot, the State could ill afford to spare him.

Mr. John P. Pratt is engaged upon the grand task of collecting together the poems of George D. Pratt, which he will shortly publish, together with a biographical sketch. This is a labor of love on the part of Mr. Pratt, who won his literary fame in the service of the great American journalist, and he brings to the undertaking the devotion of a friend, the appreciation of a poet, the impartiality of a critic and that literary ability which contributes to embody in attractive form the memory of a man whom it would be a national disgrace to forget.

It will be questionable whether in after years Mr. Pratt will be regarded in the individuality of poet, editor or wit, but as a combination of the three; and we see from the advance sheet before us that Mr. Pratt has appreciated this fact. But as the present work is more particularly devoted to Pratt as the poet, we gladly improve the opportunity of adorning our Christmas number with a few of the lines from the versatile pen of the gifted and lamented writer.
