Only a limited number of farmers in California raise a variety of crops as is customary elsewhere. If a man raises wheat he doesn't raise anything else. He buys his fruit, butter, eggs, vegetables, etc. If he raises eggs his farm is a great bird yard—all eggs and nothing else. If he has a vineyard, that will be all that he has, but it will be a big one and no mistake. There is one in this country of 350 acres. If the farmer thinks his land best adapted to strawberries, he will cover it all over with them. I have a friend in this valley who has more than one hundred acres in strawberries. It requires eighty Chinamen to pick them when the crop is a full one, and he has the berries of his vine every month in the year. There are cases when this devotion of a farmer to a single crop is wise, but it is carried too far. If the farmer were smaller, and the farmers raised more of their own supplies, it would be better. Some one may be disposed to say, "Is California a good country for farmers?" I think it is. The man who can bring means enough to buy a farm and stock it, can make a good living and enjoy the best climate in the world. But whoever runs in debt for a farm, hoping to pay for it out of his crops, is in great danger of being eaten up by California interest. There is some government land in this State, but it is for the most part undesirable land, or in undesirable localities. The United States did not get California from the Indians, and have it all to sell out to prospectors, or to give to homesteaders. It was occupied by the Mexicans, and the best portions of it were held under grants from the Mexican Government. Most of these grants have been confirmed, and those who want land have to buy of the Mexican owners, or of those to whom they have sold it. Hence, as a rule land is high here. But with good cultivation it will pay a fair interest on its cost. From ranches which cost nine thousand dollars, the crops were sold for over three thousand dollars in 1874.

There will be saws, reapers, mowers, rakes, rollers, threshers, winnowers, and grinders; cutters of sodders and excellent roots, boilers and steamers for cooking food for live stock, and other implements by the thousand on exhibition. The sight of the whole will prove to be a lasting blessing to agriculturists in general, and the nation and the whole world at large.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Agricultural Report sent the Government the past year, \$46,700. North Carolina furnishes three-fourths of the sweet blackberry crop that is consumed in this country. A young lady of this city boasts of having a German Bible which is 103 years old. It is bound in red cloth, and is quite a curiosity. A vein of galena, twenty-seven feet thick, is said to have been recently struck in the Yosemite mine, in Utah. There are estimated to be about 350 foundries in the United States engaged in the manufacture of stoves and furnaces, using annually 500,000 tons of iron. Pennsylvania has 207 newspapers and periodicals, 78 being dailies. The aggregate yearly circulation of these publications is stated at \$735,520. This is the age of lockeyism. Last year the mean man in this country for money numbered 880, and the sum of stake amounted to \$330,000.

An orchard near Santa Barbara, California, contains 12,000 almond trees, 1000 English walnut trees, 6000 olive trees, 6000 eucalyptus and 6000 grape vines.

A. B. Winans, of Convis, near Battle Creek, Mich., has hauled down eleven acres of corn, 1,285 bushels, all but one hundred bushels of which was sound.

Nine jurors in a panel of twelve will be permitted to return a verdict, according to the new Constitution of Texas.

Not less than 100,000 bushels of grain will go forward by the American steamers from Philadelphia next week.

Mr. James Cale, of Posey county, Indiana, lately sold sixty head of Poland-China hogs, in one lot, that averaged 512 pounds net.

The butter shipments from St. Albans, Vt., during the year 1876, were about 3,698,150 pounds, nearly 200,000 pounds less than last year.

It is a decided mistake to suppose that plants are unhealthful in sleeping apartments or sitting rooms. Of course, if the flowers exhale a strong perfume—such as that of tuberoses, hyacinths and dahlias—they make the air too odorous to be desirable at night; but healthy, growing plants absorb the carbonic acid in the atmosphere and keep it pure and agreeable. They are, in fact, the best disinfectant that can be employed.

THE CORRECT WAY TO HANDLE SHEEP.

A Detroit gentleman walking behind two school children the other day heard the boy inquire: "Why do you shear the sheep?" "It shall be there," answered the girl, "when I may see well tell you that your legs are hopeless. Mamma is determined, father is not, and it isn't right for me to incur the expense of your legs. I can be a sister to you, but nothing more. Therefore you needn't buy any more gams." THE CORRECT WAY TO HANDLE SHEEP. There is a right way and a wrong way, a hard way and an easy way, an awkward way and a skillful way to catch and handle a sheep. A great many men will seize the sheep by the wool on the back, with both hands, and lift the animal clear from the ground by the wool only. Barbarous! Let some gentle grasp you by the hair of your head and lift you from the ground by the hair only! Would you not squiggle and squirm worse than the most sheep does when lifted by the wool? And would not there be a complaint of a sore head for a week or two if you do not believe in trying the experiment? We have slaughtered a great many sheep in years past, and when removing the parts of such sheep as handled by their wool, we never failed to observe that beneath the skin wherever the animal had been caught by the wool blood had settled. In many instances, the skin had been separated from the body so that inflammation was apparent. We have known porters of sheep to be so strict in regard to handling them, that they would order a helper from the premises if he were to catch a sheep by the wool on any part of the body. Some owners of sheep direct their helpers thus: "When about to catch a sheep, move carefully towards the one to be taken, until you are sufficiently near to spring quickly and seize the breast by the neck with both hands. Then pass one hand around the body, grasp the brisket, and lift the sheep clear from the ground. The wool must not be pulled. If the sheep is a heavy one, let one hand and wrist be put round the neck and the other pressed against the rump." We have always handled sheep in the way alluded to. We never grand the wool. Others seize the sheep by the hind leg, then throw one arm about the body and take hold of the brisket with one hand. But eyes with lamb should never be caught by the hind leg, unless they are handled with extreme care. When sheep are handled roughly, especially if the wool is pulled, the small bruises and injuries will render them more wild and unmanageable to handle.
