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

HOW INDIANS CURE MEAT AND DRESS SKINS.

When her husband has killed a buffalo the woman's work begins. She has to skin it, the meat to secure, and all to pack upon ponies or mules, and to carry to camp where the meat is cured. This is done by cutting it into thin sheets, and hanging it over poles in the hot sunshine, where it is soon dried thoroughly; then it is packed fresh in packages of about one hundred pounds each, and inclosed in a nice folding sack of thick buffalo skin, prepared especially for the purpose. This is not dressed down thin after being flensed, but well tanned, and of the full thickness of the skin; the hair side is lined with paint for the outside of the sack. This is cut like a huge envelope, so that the ends and sides will fold over whatever is put in them, and secured by strong buckskin rings. By being thick it retains its form, and is very useful for carrying other things besides meat and tallow. After the meat is taken care of the skin must be looked after. Those taken at this season of the year are mostly dressed for lodges. They are first stacked on a smooth spot of ground, and water put upon them, when they are ready for flensing. This consists in removing the flesh with an instrument made of a straight bar of iron, about a foot in length, flattened at one end and filed to an edge. This being grasped in the hand, and a succession of quick blows struck the meat, the skin is separated. The skin is then dried, after which the hair is removed in a dry place, and the skin reduced to the proper thickness by dressing down on the hair side. This is done with an instrument made by firmly tying a flat piece of steel, filed to a beveled edge at one end, and with the corners rounded, to a large prong of a deer's horn. This is so trimmed, in connection with the body of the horn as to form an elbow and is used a little as a carpenter uses his adze. The work is usually done in the cool of the morning. The brains of the animal, having been properly taken care of for the purpose, are now soaked and squeezed by the hand until reduced to a paste, and applied to both sides of the skin, which is afterward worked and rubbed until flexible. The preparation of robes is from water skins, and differs from the foregoing only in being dressed down on the flesh side, so as to leave the wool and hair upon the robe, and is more thoroughly worked and secured by means of a sharp gritted stone.

STATE NEWS.

Peach trees are in bloom in Parker county. Sherman is to have a new four-story brick store. Houston is beginning to make preparations for her annual fair. Walter Hill is the name of a new town lately laid off in Comanche county. The Northwest claims that the acreage of cultivated land in Clay county will be at least ten times what it was last year. The Arkansas Democrat says: Four passenger trains went out on Thursday, bearing seven hundred souls, bound for Texas. Rockwall county boasts a man who rivals the man who stole a mill. The Rockwall man stole about two hundred yards of his neighbors fence, and actually got away with it. A public call is made upon the merchants and other business men at Oakville to meet at the Court-house for the purpose of considering the necessity of totally abandoning the credit system. Mrs. Sullivan, a widow and mother of several children, one of which, a mere child, was residing with her in a house of ill-fame, suicided, through the agency of morphine in Denison, last week. A standing reward of one hundred dollars is offered for information which will lead to the arrest and conviction of any person who may unlawfully tamper with, cut or interfere with the United States Military Telegraph lines leading to the frontier post. Washington county is in a healthy financial condition. Thursday \$44,000 of county scrip, which has been redeemed and cancelled, was burnt. The new jail last built has been paid for in full, and there only remains a debt of \$15,000 against the county. Last Tuesday a party of five armed Mexicans stole twenty head of horses from L. A. Adams' ranch, near Laredo. They were pursued by the owner of the horses and a party of citizens, who came up with them in camp Friday morning at Laguna Coyote, and a fight ensued. One Mexican was killed and two taken prisoners, and the horses recaptured. A wild Texas at Waco, Friday evening, carrying more horses than was healthy, rode like a Comanche and bred off his price in the streets. The police got after him, but he charged his horse, they opened fire on him as he ran with their revolvers, but without hitting him. When one or two policemen were either hung or sent to the post.

tentary for shooting at people who ran from them to evade arrest, possibly the others in the habit will stop. Last week the Sheriff and a posse from Bee county went to Colonel Means' house, in San Patricio county, for the purpose of arresting the young Means, who had previously had some difficulty with parties in Bee county. Upon their arrival at the house the old gentlemen went to the door, when a volley was fired at him. He instantly expired, and the young Means, not being prepared for a fight, surrendered and gave bond. The Sheriff and party were then arrested for the killing of Means, and gave bond for their appearance at court which was then in session at San Patricio.

BRUTALITY AND OFFICIAL MURDER. New York, February 10.—A gentleman arrived in this city from Havana gives an account of the execution of seven persons which took place on the 29th ult., on a plantation in Cuba called El Santo Cristo. The plantation is owned by Francisco Gonzalez Brago, and is situated in Yuelta de Abajo, near Quibicon, jurisdiction of Befual. It seems a female slave assisted the advances of the overseer of the plantation, who then told such stories about the woman that her owner ordered her to be severely whipped. When the punishment was to be inflicted it was found that the woman would soon become a mother. Her fellow slaves hoped that she might escape, but she was whipped in a terrible manner. During the whipping her child was born, and the husband and six other slaves then plotted to kill their master in revenge for the brutality practiced upon their woman, but failing to find him at the appointed time, they killed the overseer. Arago, the owner, reported the killing to the Mayor as only the first step towards causing an insurrection among his slaves in favor of the fugitives, and that those engaged were the conspirators. After trial by court-martial, in which three were sentenced to be shot, another trial took place, and seven were condemned to death. The sentence was soon executed on Arago's plantation, the mother of the husband of the woman subjected to the bastinado being compelled to stand first in the line of slaves posted to witness the shooting.

MISSED A CAR.

This Carr wanted some medicine for his family the other night after 12 o'clock, and visited a drug store to obtain it. The drug store was closed, and he being the best signor, he went to the bell. "Missed a car!" inquired sleepily. "Who's there?" "Mr. Carr," responded the gentleman at the bell. "Missed a car! Well, what's that to me, confound you! Stop ringing that bell and go about your business, man!" Down went the window and the drug store was lost to sight. To the discomfited Mr. Carr was lost in amazement for a time, but finally seized the bell and rang it again frantically. The drug store's head appeared at the window again. "It's my wife awake this time. 'Who's there now?' 'Mr. Carr, I tell you!' 'Why d-n your impudence! Who care if you have! Out of that, quick! If you're drunk and have missed a car, it's your own lookout. Don't touch that bell again!' 'But, I tell you, you idiot, I'm Mr. Carr!' 'Oh Lord! Why didn't you say so before!' The window went down again and the druggist soon appeared at the door, to explain volubly that he'd supposed he'd been aroused by some drunken fellow who wanted sympathy. Possibly he gave Mr. Carr something to pacify him. Druggists keep pacifiers on draught.—St. Louis Republic.

—PUBLIC EDUCATION IN SAN ANTONIO.—We presume our public schools are now in as good, if not a better condition, than those of any other city in the State. The Mayor and City Council take special pride in their management, and have placed them at last on a solid basis, and have adopted and are enforcing systematic rules for their government. We owe the credit for the present excellent condition of the public schools of San Antonio, therefore, mainly to the city administration now in office.

—In giving us good free schools in which to educate the rising generation, a great end is accomplished towards, not only individual, but city, State, and even national benefit. An intelligent citizenship is of the greatest importance to the American Republic—here the common mind must be taught to think, and all who intend making good citizens out of themselves must study to understand the principles of a free government, the true sphere and responsibility of the elective franchise, and thus enable themselves to grapple with and triumph over the schemes of corrupt leaders. In Austria, the government is intended to be ruled by the intelligent

majority of its citizens, and if the masses are not educated up to a common standard of intelligence, the result must be their subjection to the will of a shrewd though corrupt minority, who are ever on the alert to take advantage of the ignorant for pecuniary benefit. The primary object of common school education, therefore, must be to train the individual mind to a proper course of thought, for intelligent thought is called for in requisition in every sphere in which circumstances may place the American citizen. We want no sectarianism or partiality in our public schools, for to be successful in their purpose, they must have first in view the glory and perpetuity of our Republic. Science, art, national history and geography, the essential principles of our government and its administration—these should be the studies for our children who attend the free schools—not sectarianism, in any of its multifarious branches, nor the dangerous principles of demagogues.

—We firmly confide in the discretion of the present city administration to steer the bark of public education. Being men of liberal religious and political ideas, they will be enabled, we trust, to free themselves from their official positions, to fix a judicious system of public education for San Antonio, that no subsequent contrary influences could injure its progress.

INTERESTING FROM KINGSBURY. Kingsbury, Texas, Feb. 14, 1876.

EDITORS EXPRESS: In your desire to deal fairly and impartially with both parties you allowed journalism to be taken advantage of by Mr. Stansell, by publishing his letter, which was nothing more or less than an advertisement of Mr. Scott's line, worth at a low rate. It is my intention to do so, solely to enlighten the manner in which Scott and his agents are in the habit of taking advantage of the public whenever an opportunity presents itself, in contrast to the fair dealing of the attachés of the Finucane line; and giving my views on the propriety of making any particular stage line a monopoly. But Mr. S. goes into contact with the superior advantages of the Scott line, their fine large American horses, experienced drivers, etc., and draws a contrast between that line and the Finucane line not very complimentary to the latter. Mr. Scott does not advertise in the EXPRESS. Mr. Finucane does, yet I did not presume to write an advertisement for the latter, or say anything about the facilities, the merits or demerits of either line. I must say that I do think the EXPRESS did not defend the interests of an advertiser, as in duty bound. Mr. Frank Stansell, who himself "Passenger Agent El Paso Stage Co." there is no doubt, has been employed by that company to buy up some line, and C. Bain & Company, F. C. Taylor, and Samuel T. Scott represent the interests of the defendant institution. The El Paso stage are now run by the Texas and California Stage Company under the management of E. G. Korman of St. Louis. Because Sam Scott was once employed by the El Paso Stage Company, and now says they did work out concisely and satisfactorily "stage" does not give him the right to adopt that company's name. I do not wish to be personal in my remarks, but I mean to lighten the public in regard to who the grandiloquent gossamer individual is, and what is his connection with Sam Scott's Line. Mr. S. is well known here and in Dallas, and has been connected with the railroad dining hall for something over a year. He was once in the employ of T. D. Finucane as assistant agent at this place. About a month ago he was employed by Scott's agent as assistant, in fact "man of all work" which position he now occupies, and his title of "Passenger Agent El Paso Stage Company" is doubtless still and remains. It is contended that he is doing among people here who are acquainted

with the Tom Ochiltree No. 2. He is his prototype, his modesty will not stand in the way of his prosperity. The Scott Line, which is supposed to be a rich and flourishing institution, does not pay its agents enough to pay board in a fifth class boarding house, and I suppose that they must be working for glory. The salaries of the three combined, Stancor, Ray and Stansell, does not amount to more than Finucane pays his Kingsbury agent alone. Probably that account for the latter being still a poor man while Scott is rich. Finucane does not believe in allowing his agents to work for nothing, and his agents have no desire for nothing, and I cannot appreciate the glory in working for a little forty mile stage line when there is no salary attached to it.

Mr. Stansell is not a believer in the "truth" of the good old adage, "what brevity is the soul of wit," and his newspaper correspondence is as full of "gas" as his conversation; he is like a soap bubble, all wind; prick it with a pin and it is gone. He is making notoriety as a man who has his name in print. I suppose he is satisfied.

If he expects to prove to the satisfaction of the traveling public that he is fair and honest, he must come from one end of a line and fill from the other, or 64 from San Antonio to Kingsbury and 65 from Kingsbury to San Antonio, he has undertaken a Herculean task, which, if he is to be as old as Methuselah, he will fall to accomplish.

There is a determined effort being made by Scott and the Texas Express Company to induce Mr. Pierce to run Finucane off the line. It was to expose that little game that I wrote what I did in my previous communication; I did not intend it for an advertisement of the Finucane line.
