### Home Gadgets And Antennas Can Kill You

COLLEGE STATION -- "Breaker one-nine" for a warning on CB radio base station antennas -- and other home gadgets. They pose a death threat -- by electrocution.

1,200 ELECTROCUTED

Almost 1,200 people died from 1975-1977 in the United States from accidental electrocution, says Claudia Kerbel, consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

Antennas for television and CB radio base stations were the number-one hazard, she adds.

ANTENNAS HIT POWER

LINES

Most deaths linked with antennas happened when the device hit an overhead power line as the victim put it up or took it down.

As result, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission now requires manufacturers and importers to include warning labels -- and insulation instructions -- with all outdoor television antennas and those for CB base stations.

They must do the same with masts or other devices intended to support these antennas.

HOME GADGETS CAN KILL

Other electrocutions involved hair-care equipment and other devices.

Hair dryers were a major culprit -- killing children who dropped a plugged-in hair dryer into a sink full of

water or into a bathtub while bathing.

Many appliances can kill when NOT turned on--only PLUGGED IN, Ms. Kerbel warns.

Never leave electrical appliances in the bathroom plugged in, she says.

Even better, do not use electrical appliances in the bathroom.

Industry has agreed to put stronger warnings and more visible markings on hair dryers to caution against their use in or near water.

Still other electric-shock accidents involved drills, saws, other electric power tools, ladders and electric garden equipment, she adds.

### Simple Form Is Devised For Estates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said he has authorized a simple declaration form for certain beneficiaries to use in lieu of an inheritance tax return for estates less than \$200,000.

Bullock said the declaration of no tax due from Class A beneficiaries will replace the additional step of filing a more complicated return and having the Comptroller's Office issue a no tax declaration.

A Class A beneficiary is defined as a person most closely related to the deceased person, including the surviving spouse, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. Sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, parents and grandparents of a deceased person are also included in the definition.

"The new form is an effort to cut down on the amount of paperwork for small estates on which no Texas inheritance taxes are due and make our inheritance tax division a little more efficient and responsive at the same time," Bullock said.

Estates which have a gross value of less than \$200,000 are exempt by law from state inheritance taxes for Class A beneficiaries. Beginning September 1, 1982, this figure will be increased to \$250,000, and to \$300,000 on September 1, 1985.

Preliminary estimates show that nearly 80 percent of the more than 50,000 inheritance tax returns sent to the Comptroller's Office each year could be handled with the one-page declaration of no tax due.

The new form is being made available in all county courthouses and through Texas attorneys.

It is also available from the Comptroller's Inheritance Tax Division as well as the Comptroller's field offices located throughout the state.

Inheritance taxes paid to the Comptroller during the last fiscal year amounted to \$77.9 million.

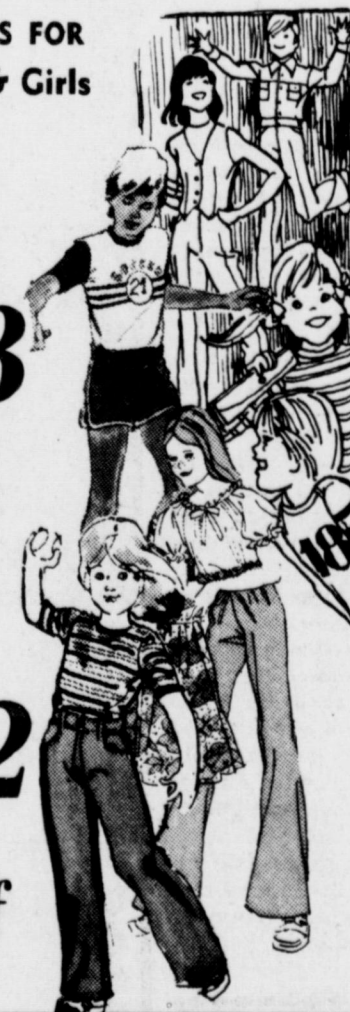

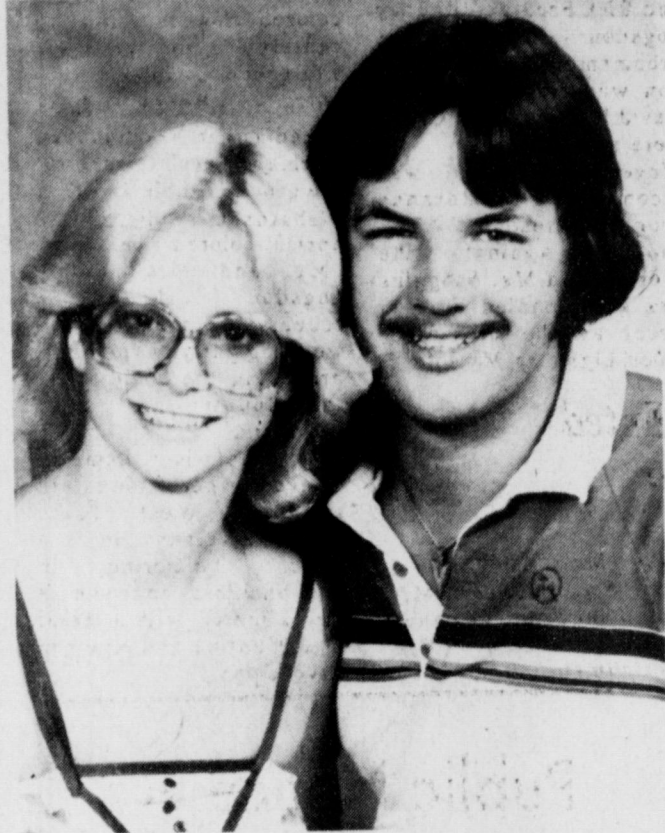

The Philippines, Thailand, Indonesia, Bangladesh and India all offer an aggressive U.S. cotton industry opportunities for increased sales, says Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Johnson along with five other industry representatives just returned from a three-week trip to these countries under the sponsorship of Cotton Council International and USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service. The group held conferences with textile mill executives, cotton importers, government officials and others in each country, emphasizing at every stop the availability and advantages of U.S. cotton.

Despite government bans on importation of new textile machinery in some countries, Johnson reports, the textile mills there are finding ways to expand, primarily with equipment they say was brought in before the restricting edicts took effect.

"Amazingly modern" is the term Johnson uses to describe the newer textile mills visited. "Living standards, modes of transportation and other aspects of life in these countries are far behind our own," he says, "but quite a bit of their textile industry is equipped with the best machinery money can buy."

This is one reason, over and above capacity expansion, Johnson believes chances for increased sales of High Plains type cotton are especially bright.

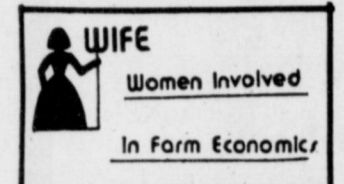
"Many of the end products being manufactured on this equipment can be made from shorter staple, lower quality cottons than are now being used, with no sacrifice of product quality."

If we prove this to them and show them the potential savings in raw material costs," he continues, "it's highly possible there would be some significant switching to West Texas cottons from the more expensive growths of other areas."

Asked about the prospects for furnishing this proof, Johnson said PCG does not now have the financing to do the job alone, but could and would be able to make some progress in that direction by working with other organizations, trade people and the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University.

As we at W.I.F.E. get further into Planning Preliminary Studies there are many sources of information. The county agents office has series of fact sheets they will send out free on request, and the Library can get several excellent books which were written since the 1976 Tax Reform Act, also many firms who handle income taxes are having estate tax clinics for their clients. Another important first step is to write for the federal estate tax form and estimate your worth and taxable estate now. You may be surprised. It is form 706 available from your Internal Revenue Service Office.

Estate planning is important for parents of young children as well as older person. The primary objectives are: (1) To insure that at death the property that has cost a life time of work will go to the desired individuals. (2) To allow the person who built up the estate to determine who shall handle the business affairs of the estate and (3) to plan the care of the children who are minors. If your will does not appoint a guardian the State of Texas will.

The estate planner will eventually need professional help. (1) A lawyer this may not be easy as lawyers specialize too, and one who keeps abreast of the laws (the 1976 Act has already been amended three times) is necessary. Also he should be a GOOD

estate planner. A visit should reveal something about his attitude on whether he thinks your heirs deserve your estate. His fee should be agreed upon at the first visit. If you need help selecting a lawyer ask your banker of the State Bar Assn. (2) An Accountant should be a C.P.A. familiar with estate and income tax returns. (3) A life insurance underwriter, most farm assets are in land or machinery and liquid assets will be needed at the time of settlement. (4) A bank trust officer may be needed. (5) A Farm Management consultant may be needed in some circumstances. (6) An Appraiser - a definite now value must be established

**SWIMMING LEADS WATER-FATALITY LIST**

Swimming in lakes in the Lubbock region leads the list of recorded water fatalities according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reports.

Over 49 water fatalities were reported during the past two years and 22 of the persons were swimming; seven were fishing; five fell into the water; and, four were in vehicles that went into the water.

The availability of water or high-use areas leads the way as the Canyon lakes in Lubbock claimed seven of the victims and swimming is not even allowed in the chain of lakes. Lake Meredith in the Texas Panhandle accounted for five of the victims and Lake Colorado City claimed three of the fatalities.

Water activities are very popular in northwest Texas and the P&WD suggests all participants do several things to protect themselves and others from becoming victims.

1. Learn to swim. If you can't master the complete technique, at least learn to tread water so you can yell or wave your arms for attention should you find yourself in difficulty.
2. Never swim alone. Even the best swimmer can become a distress victim due to fatigue, a muscle cramp or other unforeseen problem.
3. If you are a non-swimmer, always wear a life jacket (personal flotation device) when you are around water.
4. Never let a young child out of your sight around water. Glancing up occasionally while reading a book or talking to friends is not adequate supervision. Little ones can easily find themselves in water over their heads.

5. Don't depend on an inflatable device or allow a nonswimming child to do so. Such devices easily tip over and occasionally rupture, leaving the non-swimmer with no means of support.

6. Fence backyard pools and put locks on the entrances to keep young children out.

7. Swim, when possible, where trained lifeguards are on duty.

8. Always wear a life jacket when riding in a boat whether you can swim or not. The unconscious swimmer drowns as quickly as the non-swimmer.

The choices concerning water safety are yours, but as you make your decisions, remember they are truly LIFE OR DEATH decisions.

**FISHING FOR FLATHEADS**

**LUBBOCK** -- The flathead catfish is the largest freshwater fish in Texas and, according to Joe E. Toole, P&WD Biologist from Marshall, it remains an unfamiliar species to many anglers.

The flathead has many names from Opelousas in the eastern part of Texas to yellow cat in the west. The color pattern of flatheads varies greatly according to the turbidity of the water. In clear water, the adult is dark olive brown with a mottled appearance. In muddy water, flatheads exhibit yellow tones and are commonly called yellow cats.

Successful flathead fishermen know their feeding habits and locations in the lakes and rivers, but primarily, flathead fishing requires the correct type of tackle and bait. A few anglers land big flatheads such as the 76-pounder caught in Lake Murvaul on a lure and 20-pound test line. Flathead anglers using rod-and-reels prefer the heavier freshwater or light saltwater rigs.

Perhaps the most popular method of flathead fishing is using a trotline. A properly designed flathead trotline should consist of 6/0 or 8/0 O'Shaughnessy style hooks, doubled #15 nylon seine twine for drop lines and a strong braided or twisted nylon main line.

The techniques for setting a flathead trotline vary from a "loose" to a "tight" line. Toole prefers the tight line that sets the hook as the flathead sucks in the bait.

A flathead actually inhales its prey by forcing water through the gills and creating a strong suction action. As the prey is sucked into the fish's mouth on a "tight" line the hook will penetrate in the side of the mouth and exit somewhere in front of the eye as the catfish moves off.

Proper tension may be achieved on a line by using heavy weights. Old cast iron window weights are ideal, but any weight of eight to 12 pounds will suffice.

Flatheads feed on nearly all species that are available with sunfish and bullhead catfish and prime choice. Bait for flathead should be alive and set at the proper depth.

Flathead catfishermen should be careful when handling a "tight" trotline and big flatheads. Boats have been capsized and anglers hurt when they attempted to haul in a "green" or fresh flathead. Check area lakes for rules governing the use of trotlines and follow the rules as prescribed by the P&WD when putting your name, address and date trotline is set.

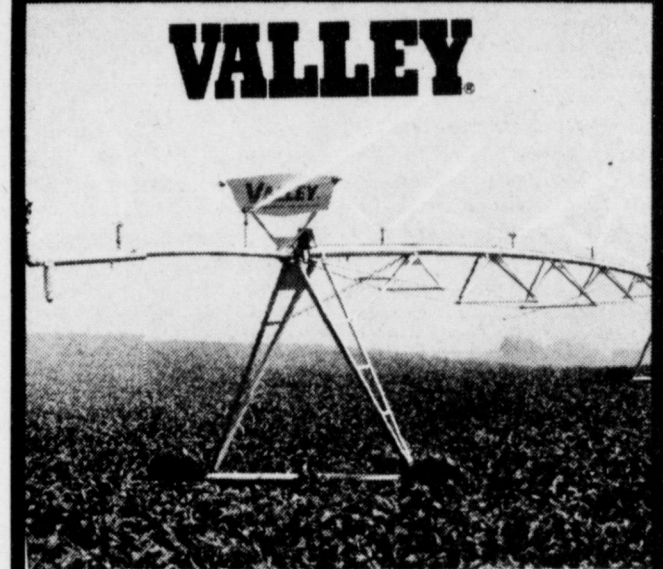

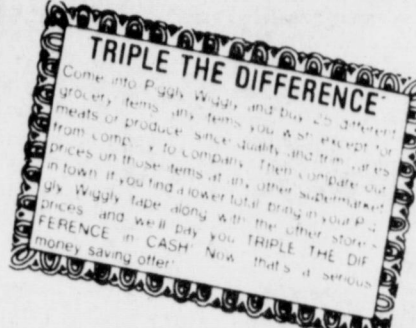
