THE PIRE PIEND ON THE BAMPAGE.

Charleston, S. C., March 26.— A fire broke out at 3 s. m. on the corner of King street and Rogers' alley. No water being in the neighborhood, and the win! blowing a gale from the southeast, the whele block, from Columbus to Line Street, on the cast and west side of King street,

on the east and west side of King street, was soon destroyed About seven o'clock the fire crossed Line street, sparks and timbers being carried by the gale three quarters of a mile up King street road. The houses of the farmers along that road were burned. Heart-rending scenes were witnessed, and, to add to the confusion, bands of negre robbers sacked every house to which they could gain an admission. Later in the morning Mayor Consistent took command and some order was restored. By 10 o'clock the fire was stopped. Hundreds of persons are homeless and penniless. The loss is at least \$500,000, and very little insurance is reparted. The boundaries of the burned district are on the couth by Columbus street and Rogers Alley; on the north by the race course; on the east by the South Carelina Railroad; and on the west by St Phillip and Perry streets.
