THE SAN JUAN COUNTRY.

INFORMATION FOR PARTIES WHO THINK OF GOING THERE.

[To the Editor of the Globe-Democrat.] PLANTERS' HOUSE, ST. LOUIS, March 14, 1876.—My letter in a recent number of the Globe-Democrat, in regard to the San Juan country, has called out so many letters of inquiry, and the demand for specific information is so universal, I ask space in your columns for a response to said inquiries.

In the first place, I have no doubt that the climate, soil, and grazing capacities of Southern Colorado, to the extreme western and southern boundary, are far superior to the Black Hills. I have never been in the Black Hills, but I have read all the official reports made, and I have seen and conversed with many intelligent men who have made a thorough exploration of all that region of country. Taking the most trustworthy accounts of both sections, and making all possible allowance for self-interest and local partiality, I am fully convinced that Southern Colorado is far the best country, not only in the feature referred to, but in mineral resources.

There is no place on the American continent where the climate is more even and agreeable than in San Luis Valley, and in all the large river valleys of the San Juan region. In the summer it is never extremely warm, and in winter it is rarely that the snow remains on the ground more than twenty-four hours. While the snow, a few miles up the mountains, is generally deep for six months in the year, the lower altitudes in the valleys support horses, sheep and cattle without hay or shelter in fine condition all winter. Timber is abundant in San Juan. Yellow pine, spruce and quaken aspen are the chief varieties. In all the important mining districts, as well as along all the streams adjacent to the agricultural and grazing sections, there will be no scarcity in fuel and good lumber for building purposes for many years to come. The Rio Grande, and all its chief tributaries far up in the mountains, abound in fish. I caught mountain trout last season within a few miles of the head of the Rio Grande, and also in the San Juan River, less than twenty miles from the summit of the water-shed between the Pacific and the Gulf of Mexico. The best mines are in the mountains near the head of the streams. Sometimes the veins come to the surface on the high peaks, but more frequently they crop out of the mountains and along the gulches which fall into the main streams. Those which are the most prominent are taken by the first prospectors, but as time goes on the "blind lodes" will be among the most valuable discoveries. There were several hundred men engaged in prospecting the country last year, and I do not know of any one who was industrious and persevering that did not locate one or more claims. The majority of which give the promise of having substantial market value as soon as they are properly developed. It is of course, true that all of these claims will not bring to their own-

ers a profitable return. But the popular idea among business men that mining is a "lottery," and that success is a mere chance, is not true thus far in San Juan. A good mine has as certain a value as good real estate in St. Louis. There are hundreds of this kind, being in true fissure veins and carrying high grade ore. In a quantity of cases they were discovered and are now owned by poor men. But they are rich, and time and work will bring to their owners a certain and satisfactory result. It will not be long before capital will be eager to invest in these wonderful deposits of gold and silver. Communication is now easy and cheap, compared with what it was ten years ago, and the railroads carry the heavy machinery necessary for reducing the ores to the very borders of the mining districts.

The San Juan mines afford an excellent opening for poor men. The field for successful prospecting and obtaining title to mining property is large. The Placer Mines, on the La Plata, will give employment to a large number of men at from \$3 to \$5 per day. The great number of stamp mills and smelting and reduction works that will go up this coming season will furnish work for all kinds of mechanics and laborers. Last year the price of labor of this kind was \$3.50 to \$4.50 per day. It will cost about the same to go from St. Louis to Pueblo as from St. Louis to Cheyenne, and it is not half as difficult, and will not cost half as much to get from Pueblo into the San Juan country as from Cheyenne to the Black Hills. A PETRIED WOMAN.

[From the Sarasota (Pa.) Republican.] Twenty-five years ago an old lady in Providence, Township, well known for her many excellent qualities, died and was buried in a private burying ground, back of Hyde Park, near the Continental Mines. The body was removed a short time ago, and it was found to present some singular features. From the skull to the pelvis or the hip bones, nothing remained but the bones, which were well preserved; from the pelvis to the feet the limbs were found to be perfectly petrified, having all the appearance of stone, both in weight and color. We offer no explanation to this singular phenomenon, but leave it to the physicians to determine why half of the body should be petrified and the other not.

THE SCENE OF LEE'S SURRENDER.

L. B. Ellis writes to the Alexandria Gazette: It has been stated that all interviews and arrangements in regard to the surrender of General Lee at Appomattox Court House, in 1865, took place in the house of Col. McLean, and not under an "apple" tree. This is (in part) a mistake. The last interview between Gen. Lee and the Federal officers previous to the surrender did take place under an apple tree, as follows: [I being an eye witness.] When the officers from Gen. Grant's headquarters came the last time to Gen. Lee, he was sitting on a seat made by placing the ends of two fence rails in the fork of an apple tree. When the officers rode up within seventy-five or a hundred yards of Gen.

Lee, they dismounted and approached him hat in hand. The General rose, when the military salute was exchanged. The officers then handed him a written paper, which he read and tore up, with his head hanging down as if in deep thought. He then called for his horse, and, attended by Col. W. H. Taylor and special Courier John, rode away in the direction of Appomattox Court House. He returned in about two hours, and told us he had surrendered; I was a courier on duty with him at the time.

A DOG'S LONG SWIM IN A WINTER SEA.

[From the Standard (Ct.) Advocate.] Visitors to Shippan Point must have become more or less familiar with the appearance of a very large white dog belonging to Mr. Studwell. Recently this noble beast swam from fishing Rock, on Shippan Point, to Vincent Island, a distance of about one mile, through a heavy sea. It was thought the dog had perished, as he could not be seen a good portion of the time, but he got to land all right, and without showing extraordinary fatigue. On a former occasion he accompanied a fishing party, and becoming offended at some unfriendly demonstration on the part of one of the passengers, he voluntarily left the boat when about a mile off Long Island and swam back to Shippan Point, a distance of nearly nine miles. This was a smooth sea, and in summer weather. His latest exploit was performed last week, when the water was very rough and cold.

PROCEEDINGS

At a meeting held in the City Hall, Saturday evening, March 18th, 1876, for the purpose of organizing and equipping a first-class militia company in the city of San Antonio.

Upon taking the chair Mr. Kineman returned his thanks for the compliment, and, in a few brief and well chosen remarks, explained: That, in his opinion, the city was large enough for two companies; that this one should not be organized in antagonism to the Alamo Rifles; and should, on all occasions, extend the right hand of fellowship to that corps; but, at the same time, there should exist a properly governed spirit of emulation between the two companies.

Upon the conclusion of his speech, Mr. Kineman announced that the election of officers was in order; and, upon motion, Mr. Henry Thompson was unanimously elected Captain of the Company.

The financial question was then discussed, and, upon mature deliberation, all action was laid over till next meeting.

The thanks of the company were then tendered his Honor Theo Anderson, City Recorder, and Captain Dobbin, City Marshal, for their courtesy in allowing the use of the hall, and the Secretary was directed to notify them of this act of the company.

The business of the meeting having been disposed of, remarks for the good of the company, were announced to be in order. Upon which Captain Thompson made a short address, to the effect: That he considered a first-class military organization a great promoter of morality in any community; and that, in his opinion, it was the duty of every young gentleman, whose other duties permit, to join such a corps. And he pledged himself that the exertion should be wanting on his part to make this the "crack corps" of Western Texas.
