CONGRESSIONAL.

Washington, March 23—Senate—A resolution was introduced by Senator Edmunds to-day proposing to substitute for article 13 of the constitution a new article of which the main features are she following: The electors to ballot in their respective States for President and Vice-President, as at present, but the list of voters must be sent to the presiding justices of the United States Supreme Court. The Sepreme Court, at a time and place to be used by law, is to publicly open all certificates, and count the votes, and the person having the greatest number of votes for President considered by the court to have been lawfully given and certified, shall be President, if such a number be a majority of the whole anumber of electors lawfully appointed. If no person has such a majority, the State of the vote shall be immediately certified to by the House of Representatives, which, from the persons having the highest number not exceeding three on the last of those voted for as Pres dent shall choose the President immediately by viva voce vote. The representation from each State to have one vote, if a majority of its delegation agree on one candidate, otherwise, the vote of such State shall not be connived. A quorum which is to consist of a member from two-thirds of the States shall be hecessary for a choice. The voting must continne till a President is CONGRESSIONAL, member from two-thirds of the States shall be beccessary for a choice. The voting must continue till a President is elected. In case the House fails to elect before the fourth of March next following, then the Vice-President shall not as President shall not be president shal ciected. In case the House rais to elect before the fourth of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President as in the case of the death or constitutional disability of the President. The person having the greatest number of electors I votes for Vice-President to be sounted and determined as above provided shall be Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors. If no person is thus elected the Senate is to choose a Vice-President by a majority of its whole membership finally. It is provided that no justice of the Supreme Court shall be eligible for election for President or Vice-President till the expiration of two years after he shall have ceased to hold office.
