THE MAUSOLEUM OF KING AKBAR - THE WOLF-BOY.

[Abr. (India) Cor. of the Troy Times.] We drive five miles out to Secundia, where is the grand mausoleum of King Akbar. This tomb is an immense structure built of sandstone; its interior ornaments are strikingly beautiful; its grounds and the edifice are about the same in area and proportions as are those of the Taj; but, while there is a resemblance to the latter in general outline and design of the building, it does not compare with it in architectural sublimity. The sarcophagus of Akbar in the vaulted hall is reached by long, descending stairways, and only from the opening is light admitted. The cenotaph is a plain one, as are also the tombs of his daughter and sister in another section of the great building. On the summit of the mausoleum, surrounded by marble screens of wonderful workmanship, is a second tomb, consisting of a single block of finely sculptured marble, upon which appears the ninety-nine names of God in raised Arabic characters. The garden surrounding the mausoleum is a charming feature of the place, filled with orange, banana, mango, plum, and peepal trees, with a profusion of tropical flowers. The lofty gateway, the splendid avenue leading to the edifice, the tanks, and fountains, and other ornamentations now going to decay, what in their time have been truly magnificent, and even now there are features preserved, that shadow forth great ability of design and elegance of workmanship. This tomb is said to have cost \$7,500,000, equivalent to full three times that amount, as money has since appreciated. The tomb of Akbar's wife, Begum Maire, is near by on the opposite side of the avenue. It is an immense two-storied building; the ground floor contains not less than forty chambers. The plain marble sarcophagus has no inscription upon it. From this it is inferred that Begum Maire was a Christian, for she had professed the Mohammedan faith, but a woman would have appeared on the cenotaph. She was a Portuguese lady, and is said to have influenced the King to adopt the policy of toleration he is known to have pursued towards Christians. The great tomb building is now occupied as an orphanage of the church mission.

Here we saw among the inmates a person known as the "wolf boy." He is now about twenty years of age. The wolf-boy was taken away from a wolf-captured in a wolf den at Bilandahar, about eighty miles from here, in the interior, twelve years ago. He was then fully eight years old, and was found in company with the wolf and walking upon all fours, and the animal evidently recognized and protected him as one of her own progeny. No doubt the boy had been stolen and carried off by the wolf when an infant, and was fed, cared for, and brought up in the wolfish way by his adopted mother. The boy is named "Saturday," that being the day he was rescued from the wild animal's den. At first raw meat was the food he most relished; he was quite wild and intractable. Gradually he was tamed, taught to walk properly, and subjected to other necessary usages of human civilized life. But beyond the expression of a very few words, language could not be imparted to him. He is evidently half-idiotic, although he understands commands addressed to him, and makes known his own wants by simple ejaculations and signs. He makes his advances to strangers, and enjoys attention paid to him. He has by no means an unpleasant face, and there is not a mark of the beast about him except in the scar prints of his mother wolf, which he points out upon his cheek. The case is a curious one, and attracted not a little attention at the time throughout the world. It was then supposed that he possessed capacity for improvement and education, but the efforts of years to teach him have met with very little success.

BEARS IN IDAHO.

[From the Idaho City World.] More of these animals have been seen this fall than any other previous season known to the oldest settlers. They are easily approached and do not seem to fear man in the least—not even so much as many bears. The short wild berry crop in the mountains this fall drives them into the valleys for food, and they are a great source of annoyance to the settlers in the partiality shown by them for hogs and young calves. While on our natural history we will mention that Gen Martin tells of a bear rarely seen in the mountains, which old hunters call the bald-face bear. It appears to be allied to the grizzly species and grows to a tremendous size. The track of one seen about the Payette Lakes, not long since, measured sixteen inches across. An open handed slap in the face from a varmint slinging a hipper of that size would be well calculated to soften the wax in a man's ear. The deer species also were never more numerous than this fall. They are seen in large droves almost everywhere in the mountains, and amateur sportsmen as well as old hunters can kill all they want in a short time.

LETTER FROM WASHINGTON.

TEXAS DELEGATION—THE SENATORSHIP—HON. JOHN HANCOCK—HIS INFLUENCE—FEARS OF NORTHERN DEMOCRATS.

[Occasional Correspondence of the News.] WASHINGTON, March 26, 1870. The Texas delegation are fully alive to the interest of our State in all matters that pertain to its welfare. The State of Texas may well be satisfied with her Congressmen, and the influence which they exert here is creditable to them and honorable to the State. It is believed that Congress will put a quietus upon this Texas from Mexican banditti by authorizing the President to direct the pursuit of bandits into Mexico, for the purpose of capturing stolen property and punishing the robbers. It will hardly be necessary to exercise this power, if conferred, as the promulgation of such orders will effectually put an end to raids. If, however, such should not be the effect of Congressional action, the infliction of punishment upon the robbers and those who sustain and abet them will not have to be often repeated to secure quiet on the border. Our representatives are daily impressing their views upon their fellow members. If Mexico is unwilling to restrain these outlaws, it is the duty of this government to fight; and if Mexico is too feeble or impotent to do so, she ought not object to the exercise of the law of self-preservation on our part.

THE TEXAS SENATORSHIP. The Senatorial election in Texas is much talked about here. The peculiar situation of national politics and the present State of political sentiment North and South give interest to the subject outside of the few Texans who are at Washington. Our members seemed disappointed to assume anything like a partisan attitude, on the subject, each regarding it more proper to reserve the subject to those at home whose duty and right it is to make the selection.

All the probable candidates are well known, and the political caste and bias of each seem to be fully understood by all prominent politicians at the capital. Since the meeting of Congress much has been done elaborately or unwittingly, which has tended to fire up and intensify the war feelings of the North. It is a fact existing now to inquire, as the fact exists. Northern Democrats are very much disheartened and despondent, and those who are endeavoring to hold on to what we have gained, and to shape the canvass for the future, tremble at every step of progress, for fear that the impression at the North of the unkindness of Southern sentiment, as exhibited in imprudent passionate speeches here, and from the hasty and ill-natured editorials in the Southern journals, will be confirmed by continual acts and declarations, which evince no conservatism, no appreciation of a re-established government and no retrospect of the past, but such as grope among the cinders and debris of war. The truth had as well be told now, as heretofore, that unless the present and prevailing opinion at the North on this subject can be removed, there is no hope of a Democratic triumph. Hence, every Southern paper which finds its way here, all publish discussions of candidates, and others, and all the elections between Democrats are looked to with much solicitude by both parties; on the one hand to find fault with the fire-breathing at the North, on the other hand to find means to lull re-inflamed passion, and allay unjust apprehensions.

JUDGE HANCOCK'S VIEWS.

I had a long interview with Judge Hancock, and talked freely with him on the subject of the Senatorial election. It was pleased to note his entire frankness and disposition to treat the matter from a practical stand-point. While grateful to many for kind expressions and offer of support, he felt pained at the disposition manifested by some to oversteer and defeat him because of his fidelity to the Union. He had never been of those who believed that Southern men who espoused the cause of the Confederacy had committed treason. On the contrary, he regarded the war as precipitated, and fought upon an honest difference in regard to the theory of this government, and while he appreciated honesty of purpose to those who arrayed themselves against the government, he deprecated the uncharitable arraignment of those who, from motives equally as honest and patriotic, stood by it. After the war was over he believed that the Southern people honestly accepted the results, and were willing to unite with the patriotic in every section to build up and restore the wasted resources of the country. He laid aside his private business, spurned the overtures of oppressors of a subjugated people, and placed himself squarely across the track of oppressors, and sought by every means within his power to temper the ill which fanaticism, madness and interested partisanship provided for the South. He had made his first canvass for Congress under the most forbidding circum-

stances. Many of those who now cry out against him urged him to enter the canvass and assist in resisting the policy which threatened permanently to prescribe intelligence at the South, in the interest of loyalty to the government. He had been in Congress five years, and he was satisfied with his record. While there, doubtless, had been mistakes made, he was conscious of no intent to do wrong. He had the satisfaction of knowing that he had contributed largely to the policy which removed disabilities from the people of the South, restored State governments to the keeping of the people, which is building up the waste places, and which he had regarded as inaugurating an era of fraternal feeling throughout the country. Every member of Congress from Texas of the present delegation, except Mr. Hamilton, was prescribed and debarred from holding office at the same time he entered Congress; and every candidate for the Senate and nearly every State officer in Texas now was under the ban of proscription then, and unable to hold office. While his unwearied exertions to bring about the removal of all disabilities did not entitle him to immunity from opposition for the office of Senator, they were sufficient to exempt him from the deprecation and unmerited arraignment of his motives as a Union man. Said Mr. Hancock: If now the policy of the South is changed; if, after the people are relieved from disability, and her State governments in the main remitted where they belong, to the people; where of us at the South who contributed to these results are to be proscribed, denounced and abused because we stood by the Union, the sooner it is known the better."

INFLUENCE OF JUDGE HANCOCK. Your correspondent was glad to note the great influence of Judge Hancock among the entire representative men at Washington. He is a hard worker, eminently conservative and just, and is acknowledged on all sides to be a fitting type of a restored government and restoration of good feeling. His election to the Senate would have halted throughout the North and everywhere in the South, as a contradiction to the supposed bitter animosities at the South against those who stood by the Union.

It is an undeniable fact among Northern Democrats that there is a feeling of fear that in the South there is a growing sentiment of hostility to men who were not in favor of secession, however staunch and resolute they may have been since the war in defense of the rights of the people and the States and of every principle of democracy. The expression in many of our papers in Texas that Hancock is not a representative, and similar expressions in other Southern papers toward men who have occupied his position, kindles and arouses this suspicion, and causes serious apprehension that such position assumed by the South would greatly endanger, if it did not result disastrously, to the Democratic party in the pending Presidential election. Such a result would be to remit the South to a political inferiority for many weary years to come. Surely he was a representative man at the close of the war, when he so nobly and generously stood by the interests of our humiliated people.

Certainly he was a representative of Texas feeling when he united with other unopposed men of the State in opposition to the expected and disgraceful reconstruction acts. He bated not his breath during that long period of darkness, after the removal of the State officers, and the rule of the people of Texas by the iron rod of Griffin and Reynolds. During those days of darkness some who are now called representative men opened not their mouths. It was thought then that such as Hancock should go to the front. None can deny that when the trouble arose with Davis about Gov. Coke's succession, in Texas, at Washington, throughout the land, he was regarded as a true representative of the people of our State. He is not less so now, and Texas has never seen a time when the public welfare more imperiously demanded that he should be recognized.
