WASH AND ENGLAND.

DAILY EXPRESS. NATIONAL CREDIT AND SELF-RESPECT.

The New York Herald gets matters badly mixed sometimes. Perhaps it thinks that reason and sense are too valuable to be indulged in every day, when it is just as easy to substitute cheap absurdity and nonsense. For example the Herald says: "One reason why we pay six per cent. for our money abroad is that we have fallen into a habit of universal plunder. We degrade ourselves, defame our country, trifle with our credit, call upon the world to see what rascals and knaves we are, and then marvel that the world should take us at our word and charge us more for money than nations without a half of our resources. We shall strengthen our credit when we protect our self-respect. The cart is here palpably before the horse. The evils in our national self-dignity which has stirred up just complaint at home, and produced distrust abroad. The blunders and misdeeds which have had swing in the administration of our public affairs, defaming our country and trifling with our credit, could wish nothing better than to join the people in a mutual admiration society which should ignore abuses, suppress scandals, confound impurity and purity, black and white, and extol the present condition of things as eminently worthy to be viewed with pride and satisfaction. Foreigners would never be imposed upon by such a performance. It would be too diaphanous. Our credit would be impaired rather than strengthened, as for our self-respect, it is not to be excited by any trick of hypocrisy. On the other hand, the courage to look unpleasant facts in the face, and the candor to confess that we are ashamed of the present condition of things, are well adapted to strengthen our credit by reassuring the world that however misgoverned, we are morally sound. The next step is to drive the blunders and misdeeds, great and small, from power and place. That done, our credit will be second to that of no other nation, and our self-respect will be established in the consciousness of having achieved a great and beneficent national reform.

HOW TO WIN, AND HOW NOT TO WIN.

"I want to win the approaching Presidential fight, and I know of nothing that Texas could do that would strengthen our Democratic brothers of the North more than to elect Hancock to the Senate. It would do more good towards retarding the Radical cry of our continued hate of Union men and the Federal government than all the speeches we could make in a century's time." This is the language of an able lawyer, an esteemed citizen, a thoughtful observer, and withal a native of the South and an ex-Confederate, residing in Eastern Texas. We concede, as we think every man divested of prepossessions must concede, that he correctly reads the signs of the times and does not aggregate the critical nature of the political situation. The Year has no personal preferences to urge for the United States Senate. It is only anxious that a fatal mistake shall not be made in the election of a Senator by the Texas Legislature. It hopes to see elected a sound, capable, useful and trustworthy man, whose ascension to the United States Senate will be a practical, embodied refutation of the whole argument upon which the leaders of the party in power are preparing to appeal to the country in the presidential canvass. Stripped of that argument—the argument that the opposition, North and South, is tainted with the secession theory and with "rebel" contumacy, and fraught with peril to the interests of the Union—the responsible authors and upholders of seven years of scandalous and baleful mal-administration would stand in the very nakedness of shame before a disgusted and indignant people. They would not have a fig-leaf to mitigate the exposure. They would not have the hardihood to go before the country on the merits of their rule. They would have no moral basis on which to maintain a party organization with adherents enlisted from the well-meaning masses of the people. There would soon be no administration party left. It would vanish from the scene, and its leaders would be crawling about in all directions seeking covertly from popular obloquy and the whips and shafts of a time of scorn. What can save them from such a doom? Nothing but folly, recklessness, in-sane infatuation on the part of men for whose words and acts the opposition would be held accountable. The proverb tells us truly that acts, whether wise or foolish, are louder than words. A blunder by the Texas Legislature in the election of a Senator, calculated to give color and a show of substance to the argument upon which the Mortons, the Blaines, the Conkings and the Boutwells desire to make their appeal to the country in the presidential canvass, would be a contribution of incalculable value to that detestable and pernicious faction. The tribe of actual or prospective corruptionists and speculators could afford to mortgage most of the dishonest fruits of another presidential term to pay for so effective an act of aid and

comfort. We can scarcely believe it within the possibilities of political madness or mischance that they can be accommodated. If the event, shall belie our hope, we have only to say that it will close the lid and shut up the coffin of the Democratic party, as far as the presidential canvass is concerned. How to win that fight must be clear to every healthy and unclouded man in the opposition. How not to win it is equally as clear.

A REVOLUTIONARY LEADER.—General Houston, the revolutionary leader in Texas, is thus described: He is about forty-four years of age, is six feet five inches in height, of very commanding presence and ailed blood. He took part in the revolution of last May, when Generals Bisco and Montplaisir were killed. He fought his way out of the city to his plantation at Flores, where he resided the greater part of the year. He was subsequently arrested and taken to the village of Fort Worth, where he and his party were detained. He was released from the hands of the United States Minister Bennett when he remained from May 31st to September 1st. He was then taken to the hands of the government and imprisoned for his treason, and he was sentenced to death. The refusal of Mr. Bennett to surrender him nearly caused complications with this country, but through the friendly aid of the Haytian Minister, Mr. President, it was agreed that General should be allowed to leave Hayti and go into banishment. This was done, and General went to Kingston, Jamaica. There, with other exiles, he remained about \$1,000,000, he plotted for the overthrow of the Dominican Government. Recently the Octavia was purchased with her cargo of arms. General was always a soldier, and in 1800 captured Fort San Felipe, the capital city, which caused the overthrow of Salnava, and he is generally looked upon as a brave and honest man. The government of the Dominican Republic has been accused of its disregard of the constitution of the country and its prostitution to Spain. Domague, it may be remembered, recently became a grandee of Spain and member of the Order of Isabella la Católica after his consent to banish all Cubans from Hayti. He is also accused of robbing the treasury.
