OUR FIRST.

He wasn't a ferocious-looking man, and evidently only came to remonstrate in a kindly manner. Lemme get out and we'll call it square," and he made a break for the door, overturned a chair and made such a racket that the dog went for him again. He flew along the passage, with the dog clinging to his coat-tail, and just at the landing, while his head was turned to beat the animal off, he fell over a box of type that the expressionist had left standing there, and the next he knew he had crumpled on every step of those two flights of stairs creaked into the sidewalk. As he picked himself up he looked as if he had been shot out of a balloon, and walked on by a St. Patrick's day procession. He not only has not stopped his paper, but has sent a quarter in advance—through the mail.—Morris Herold.

In San Francisco trade dollars are being practically driven out of circulation on account of the discount on them, retail dealers refuse to accept them for over ninety cents. Halfers are also refuse in sums exceeding legal tender, and have been at nearly as great discount until within a day or two, when the practical demonizing of trade dollars has caused halfers to appreciate slightly.

Sir Stamford de Bredelle, in his old age, after a life of great activity in Cabinet politics, turned himself toward religious subjects, and wrote a not very brilliant but pious book, Guizot, after his long political career, gave us a book of religious meditations, very mild and pious. Thurlow Wood, in his old age, attends the Moody and Sankey meetings regularly. Will he give us a book.

Dr. Fayer's opinion is that, if systematic returns were kept, the annual number of deaths of snake bites (exclusive of all doubtful cases) in India would be found to exceed twenty thousand. A larger proportion of women, it seems, are bitten than men, showing that the women of the working classes in India are busier than their lords in the fields and other places where snakes are to be met with.

The Brazilian frigate Neotroly arrived at Sandy Hook and came to anchor at quarantine. She will return the salute offered to the Emperor Dom Pedro, when he arrives on the Helvetius. That vessel is now about due. The Brazilian minister and the Brazilian committee to the Centennial Exhibition will go down the bay in a steamer to meet the Emperor and take him off and bring him up to Twenty-third street. Secretaries Fish, Taft and Robinson and Admiral Rowan are expected to meet tonight to arrange for meeting the Emperor. The Collector or Surveyor of the port will also go down to meet his Majesty.

The Memphis Ledger says: "Last Saturday, between Pope and Corland, on the Mississippi and Tennessee Railroad, an old man named Wash Howard was found murdered near the bridge. Howard was on his way to Texas to his relatives, being without money and was making the journey on foot. A worthless man named Frank Taylor was arrested on suspicion of being the murderer, and admitted having killed the old man with a club, because he refused to give him a chew of tobacco."

A. T. STEWART.

DEATH OF THE GREAT MERCHANT PRINCE—HIS PROSPEROUS CAREER.

Alexander Turney Stewart, the eminent merchant of New York, died at his home in that city yesterday. He was born in Ireland, near the city of Belfast, in 1803, of Scotch-Irish parentage. During his infancy he lost both father and mother, and received a home from his maternal grandfather, by whom he was educated. He was an attentive student, and took his degree at Trinity College, Dublin, before reaching his majority. About this time his grandfather died, and upon a member of the Society of Friends being appointed his guardian, he obtained letters of introduction from him to leading merchants of that persuasion in New York, and left Ireland for the new world. Upon landing in New York, Mr. Stewart adopted the profession of a teacher which he followed for some time. But it did not suit the active mind of the young man, who aspired to merchant life, and in a few years he formed a partnership with a merchant of his own age and embarked in earnest on the great sea of metropolitan business. The connection was not of long duration, and while not yet thirty years of age, Mr. Stewart found himself the sole manager of a fast-increasing concern. At this juncture the spirit of the man was undaunted. He did not hesitate to take all the responsibilities of the position; he crossed the ocean to Ireland, selected a fresh stock of goods, came back to New York and opened, in a fresh and imposing manner, on his new career. So rapid was his advance in business, so closely did he watch every avenue by which sales were effected and profits made, that in a few years A. T. Stewart was ranked among the leading merchants of New York and his fortune counted in seven figures.

HIS GREAT BUSINESS.

His first place of business was in Broadway, near Warren, whence he removed in 1848, to Broadway and Chamber street, where he built the marble dry-goods palace, as it was then called, which is now devoted to the wholesale trade. Anticipating the up-town march of trade, he next leased the ground at Broadway and Tenth street, where he built the largest store of the kind in the world. His business was varied, embracing that of retailer, importer and manufacturer, and in all these branches he employed an immense capital and large numbers of hands of both sexes. In his store could be found choice goods from England, France and Germany, while at the same time he managed, almost to a monopoly, large lines of American goods. In the Tenth street store alone there were two thousand employees, and distributions for running expenses are over \$1,000,000 per annum. Fifty million dollars' worth of goods have been sold in the wholesale and retail departments in one year, and other transfers made which required both capital and energy. This was a vast business to oversee and manage, and yet Mr. Stewart was the directing head of the whole establishment. His hours of labor were from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M., and during that time he examined all the heads of the departments and gained a clear insight into the day's business. It was by such close attention to details that Mr. Stewart was able to handle a large business and amass a fortune such as few merchants have enjoyed in this country.

OUTSIDE ENTERPRISES.

Besides his mercantile ventures, Mr. Stewart was engaged in a number of other enterprises of a heavy character. He owned a large hotel at Saratoga, he built up a city on Long Island, and also owned valuable mill properties near Fishkill, where it was his intention to erect manufacturing of the most imposing description. His aggregate wealth is estimated at \$100,000,000. Having enormous means at command Mr. Stewart was liberable when occasion demanded. He succeeded the Irish during the famine of 1847; he sent \$10,000 in 1862 to the distressed operatives of Lancashire; he contributed in a princely manner to the fund for the relief of the sufferers by the great fire of Chicago, and at various other times opened his purse to the call of humanity and benevolence. In the midst of an unusual busy life, Mr. Stewart found time to cultivate a love for the fine arts, and his gallery is one of the largest in the country. His latest acquisition was Meissonier's "1807," for which he just paid \$60,000 in gold. General Grant, at his inauguration, tendered Mr. Stewart the position of Secretary of the Treasury, but he could not accept it on account of the law which barred an importer from filling the place. He was a plain, earnest business man, but to his friends he had a warm side, and they were not forgotten to sunshine or shade. Mr. Stewart married many years ago a Miss Ulrich, of New York, but he had no children.

HIS PERSONAL APPEARANCE.

From a well-written sketch printed in New York World, a week or two ago, we take this personal description: Among the many pretentious residences in New York the pile of white marble on the northwest corner of Fifth avenue and Thirty-fourth street, which invariably elicits the question, "Who lives there?" from strangers and others who see it for the first time, is the most pretentious. Should you chance that way any morning about 9.30 o'clock you will see a pleasant-faced, rosy-cheeked, smooth-shaven, carefully-dressed gentleman of medium height, lithe figure and apparently of middle age, come briskly down the steps and jump into a coupe standing in front of the door, which whisks away with him. Sometimes, on exceptionally fine days, he will spare the time for a constitutional, and walk rapidly down the avenue at a gait which few men of 73—or that is his age, though he looks twenty years younger—would attempt to imitate. This is A. T. Stewart, known at home and abroad as "the great dry goods merchant."

MR. STEWART'S WEALTH.

In regard to Mr. Stewart's wealth the World writer says: "During a successful business career of over fifty years Mr. Stewart has been a constant buyer of real estate in this city, his holdings of real property being only surpassed by those of the Astor family. Previous to the death of the late William B. Astor, in the fall of 1875, A. T. Stewart was the second largest holder of New York city property. Since the division of Mr. Astor's estate among his children, but principally between his two sons, John Jacob and William, many have thought that A. T. Stewart has been promoted to the first rank in the list of New York city real estate owners. We are not of that opinion. It is generally understood, the bulk of the Astor property was left to the oldest son of the late William B. Astor, the present John Jacob Astor is undoubtedly at the present writing the largest real estate owner in this city. We will not undertake to give the current rumors concerning Mr. Stewart's vast wealth. Suffice it to say that Cornelius Vanderbilt's wealth is estimated at from \$75,000,000 to \$80,000,000, and Mr. Stewart is said to be the richest man of the two. We very much doubt if there are ten other men in the world who can match him in wealth."
