THE EMPRESS OF INDIA.

DISEAEL'S WONDERFUL PROPHETIC DREAM OF DESTINY—ENGLAND TO BE OVERPOWERED BY GERMAN AND ENGLISH POWER TO BE ESTABLISHED IN INDIA—CALCUTTA TO TRANSCEND LONDON IN GRANDEUR.

Some years ago a distinguished Englishman, whose name I must withhold, was traveling in Palestine, where he chance to meet the venerable Sir Moses Montefiore on one of his frequent visits to the sacred soil that owes him so much. Sir Moses made the question John the Baptist and another they traveled for some weeks. One Sunday night, lying under a tent pitched on the seashore near Jaffa, Mr. Disraeli said to the venerable old man: "One starless night, lying under a tent pitched on the seashore near Jaffa, Mr. Disraeli?" The Queen asked, "I hope you have no unworthy proposition—But, do you know how venerable the crown is wear?" "Madam," replied he, "I did not say save your kingdom, for that is already lost; I said your Empire. At least, when you are gone, I shall be left alone."—Wonderful why the brilliant novelist had virtually given up his literary career with all its splendid promises, which after all his splendid successes, to essay the difficult and thorny path of politics.

After a pause Sir Moses said substantially as follows: "Pray tell me what, make you go into Palestine, most poor, powerless, notwithstanding so many mortifying failures, in aspiring to the leadership you have won. You had a success of one sort, yet you risked it to win a success of another sort far less agreeable. I can't understand it, but perhaps that is because I am a benighted Jew. You, who are a Christian, must enlighten me."

"He laughed. "Because we are both Hebrews," he said, "I believe I can afford to tell you; but you must not publish my secret, for people would not believe you, had they would laugh at me; and in this country where the people think themselves so thick-skinned, it is better to be laughed at. I became a politician from motives of patriotism, and I owe the awakening of my patriotic impulse to a dream. Hear me before you laugh."

A week before I speak of my dream. You have noticed how Spanish like us Portuguese, have quarreled over the land and moved to a wider country. The love of the universal progress, and the other you look into it the more invariably you will find it to be. Action, heroic action, follows the sun's path inevitably, and the maxims of human energies rise and fall in their diurnal arm. I wish you to note this law, I discovered it early: I have pernicious omit deeply, and presently you will see the application of it."

"You, Sir Moses-like myself, have seen his and done his in Portugal. We love that valiant little kingdom, and rejoice in its independence. You know what consider to be, by long odds, the most heroic and most dramatic event in modern history? It occurred on the 27th 28th of November, 1807; the scene was Lisbon; the spot, that very point from which those like Gulliver embarked three centuries before to discover a new continent. Jane, was within a day's march of Lisbon; all resistance was broken; the Prince Regent had surrendered his arms, but his henchmen Braganza's blood was still warm, and submit to the orders of the King of Portugal was Portugal. The King, a stout, bold, healthy, and strong man, and his family, were embarked, and started to the tropics, and sailed away to India."

"It was a bold and heroic act, but note the prudence and the sagacity of it. What where the goals to control events so far out runs precedent and cold calculation. Portugal was preserved, augmented, rehabilitated through that heroic embarkation. If the Regent had stayed not only the House of Braganza but the Kingdom of Portugal also would have been extinguished. There are the strokes which show the force and tenacity of statesmanship. There is an ingenuity in politics as in all things else, and in perilous times comes most work out the results of the State."

"How come to my dream. I know the first resolved to be somebody, and would not be only a solicitor or a barrister. Yet I did not think of politics, for I had no notion that I could speak, or, even if I could succeed in doing that, that a person was open to me in the line of position. But one night, after my first success as a novelist, and when I was a good deal sought after, and pretty well flagged out with model demands, I went home late, went to bed tired, and had a dream."

"I dreamed that I was Prime Minister of England to a time of overwhelming disaster. I dreamed that another great conqueror like Napoleon had arisen, and overran Europe, had defeated our fleets had invaded England and destroyed all our British. London was in his hands, his army was advancing in three columns toward the west, and

his foot held the English Channel and was sailing towards St. George Channel. The Queen was at Edinburgh, and we still had an army at Derby, a fleet in the Irish Sea, and an immense body of unarmed vessels in harbor from Mersey to the Clyde.

I attempted to live up to the orders of the moment, spending and equipment of all those vessels. Then I rushed to the Queen. "Madam," said I, "I have the honor to announce to you that England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales will become the prime regent remained and became Emperor after the revolution of 1822. He abdicated in 1831 in favor of his son, the present Emperor, who was then only five years old, and returning to Portugal, drove, out his usurping brother, Dom Miguel, and enjoyed a short-lived reign. Dom Pedro II was declared of age at fourteen, by act of the Brazilian Legislature, and was crowned July 18, 1841. His reign has been an era of continued progress and prosperity for a country that had previously been distracted by the quarrels of faction, and frequently torn by civil war. The nation has made great advance in the path of civilization and of material development. Population has increased, schools have been established, railroads built, system of country explored and settled, and lines of steam communication established upon the great interior rivers as well as between the sea ports and the United States and Europe. In a word, a race, once sparingly peopled by mixed and lawless races, has been converted into a compact and powerful nation. This result is due, in great part, to the firm and wise rule of the Emperor. Among all the reigning sovereigns of the world, he is beyond doubt, the most learned, cultured, and liberal-minded.

Dom Pedro was married when seventeen years of age to Theresa Christina Maria, daughter of Francis I, King of the two Sicilies. They had two children, the Princess Isabella and Leopoldina. The former acts as regent during the absence of her father. From this country, the Emperor will go to Europe, where he will remain for over a year.

In order the better to do honor to one Centennial anniversary, his Majesty has ordered the Brazilian corvette *Nicetaria*, Capt. Correia Azevedo, to proceed to our waters. She will arrive at New York before the 20th of April, and after the landing of the Emperor will proceed to Philadelphia, where she will probably remain until after the month of July.
