CHANGES IN REVENUE TAX BILL ACCEPTED

REPUBLICAN AGREEMENT NOW OPENS THE WAY FOR A SPEEDY ENACTMENT.

Washington.—The way has been pened for speedier enactment of the evenue bill in the Senate with the acceptance by leaders of changes de-nanded by the agricultural or agra-

The changes will radically alter the all from the form in which it was resented to the Senate by the Fi-nance Committee. The Senators from farming States have obtained virtually everything for which they asked, and have again demonstrated the power of the group in the Senate and its ability successfully to oppose the will of the established leaders.

The changes to be made on the floor in the form of amendments in-

Repeal of all transportation taxes at the end of the calendar year, including those on express packages and the transportation of oil by sipe line.

Restoration of the capital stock tax, Repeal of the excess profits tax Jan.

1. 1922 as the bill provides, and not
as of Jan. 1, 1921, as many wished.

Elimination of the \$2,000 exemp-on of corporations, with adoption of 10 per cent corporation tax on pro-ts up to \$50,000 and 15 per cent ats up to \$50,000 and 15 per cent above that amount.

Increase in the maximum surtax wate from 32 per cent, as the bill provides, to 50 per cent, with reductions in the tax on incomes between \$6,000 and \$50,000.

Increased inheritance taxes, making the maximum levy 40 per cent instead of 25

\$2.40 to \$4 a gallon. Repeal of all, or mearly all. of the nuisance taxes, including those on admissions

DECREE MAY DELAY TRADE WITH RUSSIA

Riga.-Maxim Litvinoff, chief of Boyfet legations abroad. graphed the local Bolshexiki legation that Russia will make no exception to the new rule not to admit Americans unless they carry national passports. The State Department at Washington has made a regulation that such pass ports must be surrendered to American consuls, and Americans bound for Russia on legitimate errands are Russia on therefore, facing the choice of either violating the Washington ruling or staying out of the country.

Police officials of Riga claim to have instructions from American au thorities to stop any American at tempting to carry a national passport into Russia although the Washington regulation for the guidance of Ameri can border representatives are said to be of such a nature as neither to facilitate nor hinder the departure of Americans toward Russia.


Dallas Pastor Is Named Moderator.

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



MEN RUSH TO DALLAS IN AUTO-MOBILES BUT PLAN FAILS. OFFICERS ON JOB.

Dallas.-David Bunn, negro, indict ed for the sensational robbery of a camping party at Lake Worth and for sttempted criminal assault, remains in attempted criminal assault, remains in the Dallas County jail after two un successful attempts on the part of Fort Worth mobs to remove and lynch him. Rumors that a third party was forming at Fort Worth Friday, bent on taking the negro from the Dailas county jail were discounted by deputies of Sheriff Dan Harston.

Sheriff Dan Harston broke the spirit of a crowd of fifty men who attempt ed to storm the jail at Dallas at 2:26 Friday morning when he stood alone on the criminal courthouse steps and said coolly: "There's nothing doing The negro will appear for trial when his case is called in Fort Worth Oct

The crowd, chiefly made up of young men, many of whom wore service buttons seemed to lack leader ship and organization and was com plete'y broken up when Sheriff Hars-ton refused to admit a searching party and when a committee of six looked upon a machine gun which the Sherifi keeps in his office for safe-keeping.

The crowd was orderly, did not in dulge in loud talk and displayed no firearms. They remained in Dallas for some time, apparently waiting "reenforcements," which they expected
from Fort Worth. Additional men
however, failed to come, and the
crowd sought a restaurant after Police
Sergeant W. D. Williams warned a
number of them that they would be arrested and placed in the city jail in they didn't get off the city streets.

"I agree with you that the negre should be punished and he will be,' Sergeant Williams said when he call ed a number of the men to his auto mobile, "but there will be no lynching in this city.'
