THE TEXAS PACIFIC SCHEME—AN APPEAL TO THE LEGISLATURE.

We desire respectfully to make an appeal to the honorable members of the Fifteenth Legislature in behalf of what we have long considered the greatest interest of this State which has been committed to its charge.

The case is quite different now. Nearly all our valuable lands, with the exception of those have been granted away, and in many instances recklessly squandered.

To get the case in its strongest light, it is about as follows. We promised to give about five millions of dollars worth of lands, many years ago, to get a railroad through Texas to the Pacific ocean at least by the present time.

They have done nothing for us, nothing for the claim they have held on our lands, nothing to make these lands valuable; we have made these lands immensely valuable, and they have done nothing for us.
