THE SENATE ON CRIME.

We reproduce from the telegraphic report of the Galveston News, the debate in the State Senate on the plans proposed for the suppression of lawlessness and crime in this State. We see that our own Senator, Mr. McHenry, is ready to support any bill within the constitution, that will effectually crush out the lawlessness that now afflicts the State.

As special order, Mr. Crain's bill denying the powers of sheriffs and other officers, a synopsis of which has heretofore been reported. Mr. Storey's amendment, authorizing sheriffs to use the extraordinary powers conferred for the arrest of criminals, and to prevent crime, also to prevent the escape of persons charged with crime was adopted.

Mr. Piner moved to strike out section 1, which would, without substituting something, be to fatally emasculate the measure. Mr. Crain deplored the condition of lawlessness and crime extant; insisted that discretion in extraordinary measures for repression must rest somewhere, but that the clause proposed to be eliminated was already in the law, but to be utilized under conditions not yet produced in the bill.

Mr. Crain defended the bill at length, citing authority in the constitution and precedents in the laws. It was intended as the basis of a law, to be perfected by the Senate. As it now reads, it will not cost the State a tenth of the amount that would support a State police or detective force. He ridiculed Boyd's idea that a force of a hundred men would protect the State.

prosive legislation, but his people living in a county where there was no complaint of lawlessness, and could not see the benefit of other localities, would object.

Mr. Ford called his attention to a time in the history of Texas when the whole military power of the country was called out to suppress lawlessness in that section.

Mr. Douglas explained that it was before he came to Texas. Mr. Piner spoke denouncing the Davis police bill, and holding that the tyrannical measures and bloody scenes perpetrated under it, would deter him from consenting to any measure of similar provisions.

Mr. Storey spoke strongly for some repressive action, and describing the condition of the country, rendering the adoption of extraordinary measures necessary.

MR. ORTH ON THE VENEZUELAN CLAIMS. Hon. Grover S. Orth was before the Committee on Foreign Affairs yesterday in relation to his alleged connection with Venezuela claims. He testified that his first knowledge of the Venezuela claims occurred when in 1870 the Venezuelan Government protested against their validity, alleging fraud in the Caracas commission of 1866.

THE INDIAN QUESTION. The present unsatisfactory condition of affairs at the Great Sioux Reservation, situated on the Black Hills, Every exertion is being made by the agents of the Indians to peacefully relinquish their right to that territory and accept a much preferable reservation farther south.
