One hundred head of horses have been stolen within the last 4 weeks, days from various parties.

We have neither the law nor the military force to protect us.

Shooting through houses is a common practice almost every night.

The country is in state of terror, and everybody expects to be shot.

Gonzales was not killed as previously telegraphed, though the Indians had been under arms for some time.

A scout from the post, who had been sent to meet Capt. Murphy, has been wounded. Gonzales was shot three times, but is still alive.
