CHURCH parties in Philadelphia have decided the German Centennial Commission, and justice with a nod of iron now waits to wrap the wrong.

Under the head, "Personal Intelligence," the last New York Herald has the following: "A Kentucky double-yoked ox landed on two wheels." We are not surprised at the editor of the Herald closing this item under a personal head, for he is decidedly a "chick" himself - grows louder than any rooster in America - his long-winded and false prophetic oracles.

Mr. CONGER of Michigan, one of the Republican members of the committee of the House of Representatives which is investigating federal lands in Louisiana, seems to have become a little shaky in his early faith. During the recent campaign of 1876, when he was elected to Congress, he had ridden at a certain election to a certain ticket for the best man, when Mr. Conger would be a "chick" himself, "I think one would be a little shaky if we all did that." This remark in Congress with the common sentiment of a large majority of the American people - with the sentiments of honest Americans, most decidedly.

We have received the first copy of volume No. 1 of the "Register and Journal of the Texas Land and Immigration Company," principal office at St. Louis, branch office at Austin, Texas. B. Gratz Brown, and other well known and wealthy citizens of Missouri, constitute the Directors in that State for the first year. Gov. Coke and State Treasurer Burn, of Texas, it is thought, will co-operate with the Missouri directors. If properly managed, this enterprise will prove of vast benefit to the State of Texas by the encouragement of immigration, and also pay well those interested in it to sell their lands. In the first number, we notice quite an extensive article from Dr. W. G. Kingsbury on stock raising and agriculture in Western Texas.

"Gen. G. J. L. Cook, formerly of the Confederate army, is chief interpreter in the Bureau of Information at the Centennial Exhibition. It is said that he speaks thirty-two languages. Doubtful, but you know anything of him?" - Philadelphia Correspondent Nac News.

We know the gentleman, until he wrote us his obituary from East St. Louis, and expired. While here, he represented Louisiana in glowing terms, as a legislator. General of the Cuban army, and considered himself every where in the shape of a hero, reading, "You, truly G. J. L. Cook, Late Brig.-Gen. Cuban Army," which was reported from Western Texas. It was understood to be with the intention of going to Cuba, but when he arrived at St. Louis, we received a letter in his own hand writing announcing his death. And he has turned up a prominent man at the Centennial.

BERNARD TERRY, Cook and Gibson are making a most successful war upon the Indians. No engagement has yet taken place, but that fact is one of the strongest indications of the ultimate success of their spoils-carrying expedition. If we can have the fact demonstrated that there are no Indians who care to fight our soldiers, the victory will manifestly be ours. And one more, every where our troops go, they are no Indians to be found. If any Indian was to be expected to wait for the approach of civilization it certainly was fitting that General Terry marched his column many a weary mile to the very spot where this mighty warrior was, and learned that he had not been there for six months. Similar success has attended the warfare of the other commanders. We are unquestionably doing the enemy at all points, and if we don't get ahead of them, it will be well. What might have been the issue of this expedition, if Cook had been allowed to lead it, is something too terrible to contemplate.

SEARCHING HAY IN BULL. - So many things have to be taken into consideration in calculating the weight of hay in bulk, it makes it difficult to get at its percentage. For example, hay now-mown hay, like red-top or clover hay, would probably require 100 cubic feet for the ton, Timothy, clover, etc., however mowed hay, 750 or more. After being stacked thirty days the bulk would be increased from five to ten per cent, possibly more according to the age of the stock and the moisture upon it. Again, hay will vary considerably in measurement according to the time it is cut. If this is done when it is just coming into blossom, as it always should, it will pack closer than when it is cut before. Then if left till the seeds begin to ripen and the stalks and leaves have become stiffer and heavier dry.

FANCY FARMERS. Under the above heading, a recent writer in the Chicago Times makes some very sensible remarks. The "fancy farmer" is he who after having gained sufficient means from a life of labor finds himself justified in using such means, with past experience, in improving ordinary productions - or, rather, in elevating his calling. The "fancy farmer" are the greatest blessing a country can possess, for it is by such alone that the great parents of agriculture and stock-raising are made valuable. The lack of this class is a serious drawback to the development of any country. Ignorant masses have been wont to ridicule this class more than any other for the ideas which its members entertain in regard to improving stock and farm, garden and orchard products, but the "fancy farmer" have sustained themselves, invulnerable to the attacks of their brethren of a second order.

It has been a source of gratification to us to realize the upward tendency, and the tendency to be "fancy farmers," on the part of many of the Western Texas agriculturists the past few years. Upon the introduction of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry into our section, farmers at once became infused with new ideas of what to do, when to do it, and how to do it. This was the first sowing of the seed of substantial progress.

We make an extract from the article above alluded to as contained in the Chicago Times, inviting every one interested in agriculture to its careful perusal. No class of men have been so highly regarded as those who are denominated fancy farmers. They have been in all times and countries, the benefactors of the men who have cultivated them with diligence. They have been to farmers what inventors have been to manufacturers. They have experimented for the good of the world, while others have simply worked for their own gain. They tested theories, while others raised crops for market. They have given a dignity and glory to the occupation of farming it never had before.

Fancy farmers introduced irrigation and under-drainage, grinding and cooking food for stock. They brought guano from Peru, and vitriol of soda from Cuba. They introduced and domesticated all the plants we have of foreign origin. They brought out the theory of the rotation of crops as a natural means of keeping up and increasing the fertility of the soil. They first sowed up grain and horses, and treated the latter with acid to make manure of peculiar value. They first analyzed soil as a means of determining what it would bear, and increased its fertility. They introduced the most approved methods of raising, and the distribution of water.

Fancy farmers or fancy horticulturists have given us all our varieties of fruits, vegetables and flowers. A fancy farmer in Vermont a few years ago originated the Early Rose potato, which added millions of dollars to the wealth of the country, and proved to be a most important accession in every part of the world where it was introduced. Another of these same fancy men originated the Wilson, silver-berry and another the Concord grape. It was the fancy farmer who brought the Orange orange from Texas to the Northern States.

Among the men in this country who were classed as fancy farmers at an early day, were Washington, Jefferson, Franklin and Livingston. The first introduced maize, the second the cultivation of improved rice, the third the use of land plaster, and the fourth the raising of lucerne. More than any other of their time they did to the wealth of the country. After them came another race of fancy farmers, who introduced Arabian horses, Spanish sheep and the improved breeds of English cattle and swine. These fancy farmers added immensely to the wealth of the practical farmers of the country.

What we want to develop the agriculture and horticulture of the country to their fullest extent is a large number of fancy farmers, men who work for pleasure rather than for private gain. These are the men who will perform experiments and give the world the benefit of them. These are the men who will bring in new grains, new fruits, new vegetables, and new varieties of animals. These are the men who will devote their time and money to the improvement of the varieties and the production of the best. The country is sadly in need of more fancy farmers.

ENGLAND AND THE PEACE OF EUROPE. The recalling of Lord Napier, of Magdala, the conqueror of Abyssinia, by the English government, from his responsible post of duty in India, to assume command at Gibraltar, can be regarded with no little significance, not only in Europe, but in American circles as well. The Gibraltar post has, of late years, been almost exclusively under the command of old and worn out officers - men whose best days had passed away - who were unfit for anything like active service. This change of the common order of things is therefore indicative that there is danger of the peace of Europe becoming disturbed, and that England anticipates a war, to which she will be a party.

Gibraltar can easily be defended again by the combined fleets and forces of the world. It is the most inviolable post upon the face of the earth. Constituting, as the ancient supposed, the western boundary of the world, a place where immense sums of money have been expended in fortification, a position, which nature and art combined would appear to have rendered literally impregnable; the powers of Europe and Asia have from time to time sought its possession, wrapping until it fell finally into England's power. The last attempt to possess Gibraltar was by the combined armies of France and Spain in 1782. The attack was planned by the best French engineers, and a floating battery constructed in such a manner as to be thought invulnerable. The most dreadful cannonading recorded in history took place, but England easily held her own, and she is likely to hold this post forever. In any ordinary trouble, the

presence of such a man as General Napier would not be needed to cover this point, and the fact that England will, at this juncture of affairs, turn over the keys of the Mediterranean to one of her first officers, surely has a meaning.

General Napier has not only won a soldier's honor, but a statesman's name - clear-headed, wise and prudent, as he is. He is discreet as well as valiant, and the very man England depends upon to meet the first shock of war, should a contest come between the "great powers" on the soil of Europe.
