No man ever went before a Convention with so many opponents and showed such strength as did Tilden at St. Louis. Hendricks, Allen, Fayer, Howard, Boyd, Thurman, six opponents in all, and every one of them fit and able to administer the duties of the highest office within the gift of the nation. The Democratic rule of two-thirds majority to elect, governed the convention, and still, over and above all his opponents, as the first ballot, Tilden received, out of a vote of 728, a simple majority of 39; Tilden received 323 votes, the combined votes for his six opponents being 234. On the second ballot, Tilden's vote was 523, or 52 in excess of the number necessary to elect by the two-thirds rule.

The general desire of the delegates at St. Louis was to elect the strongest man, and they were to have elected upon Tilden with hardly any opposition. Individual and national things on the part of delegates from the Southern States, were unknown, at least were not manifested in the Convention's proceedings. No doubt the delegates from such States as Virginia, the Carolinas, Texas and Louisiana, sympathetic with Hendricks, but they were free from national animosity or prejudice, and prepared to accept Tilden, Hendricks, Hancock, Fayer, or any other man whom they saw to carry the day in November. This yielding attitude of the Southern delegates—their attitude of their intellect, to admit the victory of the North and the West—was a spirit uncharacteristic, and which will stand the test of the Republican press of the country; if the personal animosity of that press were its honest sentiment. While the Southern Democrats in the present Congress have made over statements of their position, and have gone beyond the limits which they were chosen to discharge, manifesting an existence, still, of the old feeling here, during the election; while they have opposed the Republican men and their measures of the Republican party, they will not go so far as to deny the right of the North to elect the President of the United States.

THE CALDWELL SWAP—AN INFAMOUS AFFAIR.

OVER THE STATE.
The Houston Stock Journal publishes the law book of Henry Townsend & Heron in its latest issue.
Mr. Ledwith, the deputy surveyor of Brazos county, was drowned in Peck Bayou, during a recent rise, with two other men.
A few days ago, while Mr. Frank Miller of San Saba was attempting to bridge a mile, he became entangled in the stake rope, when the mule took fright, and ran, dragging Mr. Miller about 175 yards, and breaking both limbs in an instant.
The Insular Advocate of the 29th states that the highest estimate placed upon corn this fall in Brazos county is from 25 to 30 bushels per acre, and for the cash crop, 200 acres could be engaged at the former price.
The San Saba News of the 27th says: "A number of persons, including the family of Mr. Lopez Hedger, proprietor of the Mason House, were poisoned last week, it is supposed by arsenic beans cooked in a 'black' skillet. The arsenic was discovered. He never thought that eating beans was so dangerous in what they were cooked, could ever poison John Randolph Hedger."

An old farmer has this to say in regard to corn planting: "If you plant the different varieties near each other, of course they will cross, and you will get a crop of mixed corn. It is better to plant the good kind up by the roots. If you cut it at the surface of the ground it will prevent the roots from being cut, and the corn will be better. It is important, but not in frosty or dry weather."
