St. Louis, July 1.—The following is part of an editorial published to-day in the Westliche Post, the newspaper which Carl Schurz is connected with. "Tilden and Hendricks! So reads the Democratic slogan for the presidency. It is an utter impossibility to compress in the space of four syllables, an account more perfidious to all principles, (of which Tilden has been made to be, and still is, the open representative) than that miserable policy of which, as the stubborn spokesman for years, Thos. A. Hendricks, of Indiana, has been rendered so notorious. We wish to emphasize the fact that Hendricks is one of the most prominent leaders and loudest spokesmen of the paper avindlers, and as such was their candidate for the first place on the Democratic ticket, but has been put off with the second place. Hang-bug! Thy name is Democratic gold and paper, corruption and inflation, reform and meddling. How many men of sense will be found to join the absurd chorus? Evidently, the nomination of Hendricks was a matter concerted beforehand; a bargain, a sale, here of all honor, full of shame. It was a blow in the face of all those who think the abandonment of honest reform. Such might be the case for the time being, but there is nothing in all this talk of reform on the Democratic side, and the millions who do not believe they can serve two masters, will have to look in another direction, and center their hopes elsewhere."

ROMANIZED FOR CONGRESS.
Memphis, July 1.—The Democrats of the 2d Congressional District of Mississippi nominated Van T. Manning for Congress. FOR THE CENTENNIAL. Richmond, Va., July 1.—A battalion of the 1st Regiment of Virginia volunteers, composed of Companies A, B and C, left this morning via the Chesapeake and Potomac Railroad, en route for Philadelphia to participate in the Centennial parade on the 4th. The battalion numbers 500 men and is commanded by Major J. J. Ordway, of the 1st Regiment.

THE CENTENNIAL.
Philadelphia, July 1.—The city full of excitement; flags, banners and transparencies are flying from every building and the streets are thronged with people. Independence Hall and Square are the chief attractions. The decorations opened at 11 o'clock by the reception of authors in the National Museum, who had been invited to prepare memoirs of some distinguished person prominently identified with our revolution, and deposit them in the archives. Others were received by ladies composed by the board of managers of the National Museum. After an exchange of courtesies, the guests were escorted to the Independence Chamber by a welcome by Mayor Col. Frank M. Rymaszewski, chairman of the committee on the restoration of Independence Hall. He then addressed the assembly, after which prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Whitham, and "The Centennial" sung by a chorus of 50 voices. The roll was called, and memoirs were presented and laid on table. This concluded the ceremonies, when the company was escorted to the stand in Independence Square. About 3000 persons were on the stand, and fully 50000 in the square during the ceremonies, which were opened by J. W. Wallace, President of the Historical Society.

break to see if any game was in sight. I discovered a small herd of antelopes feeding in a field from which the crop had lately been removed, and was about to take the glass from my eye for the purpose of reconnoitering the ground, when, in a remote quarter of the field, concealed from the antelopes by a few intervening bushes, I distinctly discerned in the grey twilight a pack of six wolves, seated on their haunches like dogs, and apparently in deep consultation.

"It appeared evident that, like myself, they wanted venison, and had some designs upon the antelopes; and, being anxious to witness the mode of proceedings adopted by these four-legged poachers, I watched their movements. I accordingly dismounted, leaving my horse in charge of the sowar, and, creeping as near the scene of action as I could, without being discovered, concealed myself behind a bush.

"Having apparently decided upon their plan of attack, the wolves separated, one remaining stationary and the other five creeping cautiously around the edge of the field, like setters drawing in a sly covey of birds. In this manner they surrounded the unsuspecting herd, one wolf lying down at each corner of the field and the fifth creeping silently down the center of it, where he concealed himself in a deep furrow.

"The sixth wolf, which had not yet moved, now started from his hiding place and made a dash at the antelopes. The graceful creatures, confident in their matchless speed, tossed their heads as if in disdain, and started off in a series of flying bounds that soon left their pursuer far behind. But so soon did they approach the edge of the field than one of the crouching wolves started up, turned them and chased two of them in a contrary direction, while his partner accompanied lay down in his place to seize upon a fresh burst. Again the bounding herd dashed across the plain, hoping to escape on the opposite side; but here they were once more headed by one of the crafty savages, which took up the chase in his turn, and crossed them till relieved by a fresh band from the opposite quarter. In this manner the persecuted animals were driven from side to side and from corner to corner, a fresh assailant heading them at every turn, till they appeared perfectly stupefied with terror, and cowering together like frightened sheep, began to wheel round in diminished circles.

"At this time the wolf which lay concealed in the furrow near the center of the field had never moved, and although the antelopes had passed and repassed within a few feet of him, and had, perhaps, even jumped over him, his time for action had not yet arrived. It now became evident that the unfortunate antelope must soon tire out, when it appeared probable that the wolves would have made a combined attack and driven the terrified herd towards the center of the field, where the wolf which had hitherto been lying in reserve would have sprung in the midst of them and secured at least one victim.

"At this period of the proceedings the spectator shot the nearest wolf, whereas the other five decamped and allowed the antelopes to escape. Here we have reason and power of combination for mutual action that would have done credit to human beings.

"The monkeys, especially the Cynocephali, who are astonishingly clever fellows, have their chiefs, whom they obey most implicitly, and have regular systems of tactics in war, pillaging expeditions, robbing, etc., etc.

"These monkey forays are managed with the utmost regularity and precision. A tribe, coming down to feed from their village to the mountains (usually a cliff to the face of some cliff) brings with it all its members, male and female old and young. Some, the elders of the tribe, distinguished by the quantity of mane which covers their shoulders like a lion's, take the lead, passing cautiously over each precipice before they descend, and climbing to the top of every rock of which may afford them a better view of the road before them.

"Others have their posts as scouts on the flanks or rear, and all fulfill their duties with the utmost vigilance, calling out at times, apparently to keep order among the motley pack which form the main body, or to give notice of the approach of any real or imagined danger. Their tones of voice on these occasions are so distinctly varied that a person much accustomed to watch their movements will at length fancy—and perhaps with some truth—that he can understand their signals.

"The main body is composed of females, inexperienced males, and young people of the tribe. Those of the females who have small children carry them on their back. Unlike the dignified march of the leaders, the middle go on in the most disorderly manner, trotting on and chatting, without taking the least heed of anything, apparently confiding in the vigilance of their scouts.

"Several inquiries have lately been addressed to me regarding the origin of this great Christian institution, we shall here briefly sketch the early history of Sunday-schools for the benefit of those who desire the information, as well as those who do not feel sufficient interested in the subject to investigate it.
