No man was more generally and favorably known than he, and none seemingly more prosperous and happy. In our daily prambulations, we frequently passed his place of business on Main street, and always noticed him in the most pleasant and happy mood. He was a man of a very lively temperament, and one who showed the greatest love and care towards his family, and knew how to truly esteem a friend. It was therefore a shocking surprise to us yesterday to learn that Mr. Scheidemann had been shot dead, and upon learning the sad intelligence, we hurried to...

The boy was in Gregg's melon patch, but it is said, by consent of the owner, Gregg was arrested, but escaped. JULY 4 TO JULY 6. HOUSING CENTENNIAL FESTIVITIES AT NEW BRANFLETS PROTRACTED TWO DAYS BY DANCING. (Special to the Galveston News.) New Braunfels, July 6, 1876. The Centennial celebration, under the direction of the committee, and H. Seale as president, was a grand success. On the night of July 4, at 10 p. m., a salute of thirteen guns was fired. At 5 o'clock a. m. on the fourth of July the citizens were aroused by the firing of guns and the playing of national airs. Thousands of people from the country filled our streets. At 9 o'clock a. m. a procession was formed, representing first Christopher Columbus with Ferdinand, in the costumes of the period; band of music, Gen. Lafayette, Steuben, DeKalb, Koenigs and Polaski. Next, a squad of Continental soldiers, with a party of British soldiers as prisoners. Next, Liberty Hall, in Philadelphia, with the Continental Congress, dressed in the costumes of 1776. After that Liberty Hall, a wagon with 38 States (little girls representing them); next Weimar band of music; next school children. Next was the capital figure of the procession, an immigrant wagon with Prince Selim Brannfels and his adjutants, immigrants, Indians and soldiers guarding the wagons. Next a beautifully decorated wagon of the New Braunfels Turn Verein. After this a wagon with a team, representing the New Braunfels Woolen Factory. Then came the editor of our paper, E. Riband, with a press printing Jayward Taylor's poem of 1876, and distributing the same among the people. Following was another band of music, and the singing club of Houston. The procession was a half a mile in length and moved through the streets to East New Braunfels, where, at a cost of \$1200, a floor and stage had been erected to accommodate the people. Dancing was kept up from July 4th to July 6th, and was a grand affair. CHAR IRM.—Col. W. J. Lock, who lives on the Olmos creek about seven miles north-west of the city, informs us that the corn and cotton crops in his section look better than ever before. He says that fifty bushels will be the minimum average of corn raised, while some will produce upwards of seventy-five bushels. He mentioned one farm which had received no attention at all—the corn had simply been farrowed in and left to the fates of the season—which would produce at least fifty bushels to the acre. We defy the world to beat our crops this season. The city has at last advertised inviting bids to build the two long-lacked, much squabbled about and greatly needed iron bridges, and we trust the hard part of the work is done, and that these public conveniences and necessities will shortly be in the hands of busy contractors and pushed to completion. The County Court was made a very interesting institution by the Constitutional Convention. In passing the Court House new-days, we frequently hear the echo of some pleading attorney's voice, and observe an assemblage of lookers-on, in an elegantly furnished apartment, which used to be the very seat of melancholy and inertia.
