TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Associated Press Dispatches. DOMESTIC. NOON DISPATCHES. GOLD. Galveston, July 20.—Gold 124-1/2.

Chicago, July 20.—The following official report from Gen. Sheridan was received at Military Headquarters today: Red Cloud Agency, July 18, via Fort Laramie.

As indicated in my last dispatch, I moved by forced marches to the main north-western trail on Indian Creek. In thirty-five hours made about seventy-five miles, reaching the trail Sunday evening about nine o'clock.

At daylight yesterday morning, I started to move on the trail towards the agency. At the same time a party of seven Indians were discovered near the command, moving west with the intention of cutting off two companies who were approaching Sage Creek.

After scouring the country thoroughly, in our vicinity, we moved towards the Agency. At a distance of 25 miles, to the northwest of the Agency the Indians broke camp and fled, and we did not succeed in catching any of them.

I have just received your dispatches of the 15th inst. I will have, without delay, move to join Crook. My men and horses are very much tired, but a few days of reasonable marching with full forage will make them all right.

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CIVIL TROUBLE.

Alexandria, Egypt, July 20.—In consequence of the refusal of the government to permit the execution of the judgments against M. Holkman, the President of the Court of Summary Justice declared in open court to day that he would refuse to hear any actions whatever, and that the law was clear the court. Great excitement prevails. The Judges are deliberating upon the question.

London, July 20.—The shooting for the Elcho Shield began today at Wimbleton. The conditions are that each team shall be composed of eight men, who shall fire fifteen rounds each, at 300, 200 and 100 yards, using any rifle they may select.

Later.—The Elcho Shield was won by the English eight.

Washington, July 20.—David S. Goodlove was appointed today for Pension Agent at Lexington, Ky.

Terre Haute, Ind., July 20.—The Greenback Convention held here today nominated O. P. Davis for Congress.

Portsmouth, N. H., July 20.—The Buckingham Dime Savings Bank closed today.

St. Louis, July 20.—The shooting tournament, under the auspices of the St. Louis Gun Club, commenced yesterday.

Sheriff's Allowance.—The row set in relation to the allowance of Sheriff's fees that the Sheriff shall be paid out of the county treasury for the support and maintenance of each prisoner in his custody in the county jail, such amount as may be allowed him by the Commissioners' Court, not exceeding fifty cents a day for each prisoner during the time said prisoner is fed by said Sheriff, while in jail or in the custody of said Sheriff, is to be allowed upon the account of the Sheriff, verified by his oath.

That, owing to the confusion of existing legislation on the allowance to be made Sheriff, exorbitant fees are being paid to Sheriff, to the great injury of the country of this State; therefore, that this act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and that all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this act be and the same are hereby repealed.

COIN AND WHEAT...

The report of the Department of Agriculture for the month of May and June, of the current year, gives an exhibit of the quantity and distribution of the various cereals by State, in a decidedly new way...

Quite a number of maps, of a large size, indicating by the tint and the depth of shading the amount of certain crops grown in States or sections of States, were prepared for the Centennial...

During the five years ending with 1876, the average production of corn was 992,258,000 bushels, and the total, 4,961,294,500 bushels. During the same period there were consumed in the United States 4,745,892,370 bushels, and 62,833,002 bushels were reserved for seed.

The wheat chart for the same period is also a surprise. The total yield during the five years was 1,395,079,600 bushels, the consumption was 836,911,652 bushels; while the amount retained for seed was estimated at 169,270,064 bushels. The export of wheat as flour was 83,878,210 bushels, while as grain, 294,019,374 bushels found their way to a foreign market.

ISRAEL'S TRIBUTE.

ORIENTAL VELITATIONS TO AMERICA FROM THE JEWS OF PARIS.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—The following was addressed to the President by the members of the Universal Israelite Alliance of Paris on the occasion of the Centennial celebration:

PARIS June 3.—Mr. President, the United States are about to celebrate the centennial anniversary of their independence by a grand and magnificent festival, which unites all nations in the sentiment of universal sympathy in the celebration.

As long as a century ago, while the countries of Europe subjected the Israelites to laws of exception, America invited them as brothers to the equality of political and private rights. Under the protection of such laws we see them creating large places of worship and grand institutions for the purposes of charity and instruction.

INDIAN NEWS.

CHEYENNE, I. T., July 17.—The following was received via Fort Fetterman last night: Crook's Camp, Cheyenne, July 12.—Three soldiers, carriers from Gen. Terry, at the mouth of the Big Horn, have just arrived. Gen. Terry's dispatch to Crook confirms Custer's fate, and implies very plainly that had Custer waited one day longer, Gibbon would have joined him. Terry is anxious for Crook to join the force, make plans and execute them regardless of rank.

The Indians are still hovering about the Little Big Horn river, one day's hard march from here. They are around camp every night of late, and have tried to burn it out by setting the grass on fire all around. On the 6th, Lieut. Sibley, of the Second Cavalry, with 25 men as scouts, went on a reconnaissance. They were discovered, surrounded, and followed into the timber in the Big Horn Mountains, where, by hitting their horses to trees and abandoning them, the men were enabled to escape on foot by way of a ravine in the rear.

The Snake Indians, 200 strong, joined us yesterday, but unless the Utes come also soon, no offensive operations will be likely to take place until the arrival of the Fifth Cavalry from Cheyenne crossing. Wagon train and additional infantry are due from Fort Fetterman. The health of the command is good. Gen. Gibbon's reserve force were met by the victorious Sioux, dressed in Custer's men's clothing, and mounted on their horses, and who fired into the soldiers. The Indian village possesses evidence of white men's presence, kegs, whisky, etc., being found. Signal fires supposed to be in reference to the incoming wagon train, are visible to the east of Crook's camp on the extreme south waters of the Tongue River.

A MONUMENT.

The New York Herald in urging the erection of a monument to the memory of the heroic Custer says: The Urimona war is almost forgotten, although it happened only twenty years ago, and its results have been dispelled by diplomacy and the march of events. But the Light Brigade has an eternal freshness in the memory of Englishmen. Men have long ceased to ask, "Was Lincoln careless?" or "Was Custer rash?" They remember only that an English brigade in the high pursuit of duty did not hesitate to ride into the batteries of an army. "This

is magnificent," said Bosquet, looking on, "but it is not war." It was something higher than war. It was the utter consecration of one's life to his duty, the sublimest thing man can do. This is why the blood of Englishmen always leaps in many adoration when it thinks of the charge of Balaklava. And yet it is in no sense disparaging to that noble achievement to say that the charge of Cardigan was not as daring a deed as the charge of Custer. There was the chance of captivity, of gentle, considerate treatment, of kindness and tender care in the event of wounds. Many returned from that charge to be honored by their countrymen, to see their names blazoned all over the world. But the charge of the Light Brigade was a victory or death. From it there could be no retreat, no escape, no captivity. The men knew if they failed there would be no rescue, no safety. If they fell into the hands of their enemies their fate would be a lingering torture such as no tongue can describe. When men, therefore, in the discharge of a duty, calmly, firmly and even with enthusiasm, ride upon a fate like this, we say immortal honor to their name.
