He says they were swidently waiting for him, and he fears that couriers who were sent from Fork exterman on the 16th instant, with disphishes for Crook, have been intercepted, as he saw their trail this side of the river, but not beyond. His delay ran him out of rations, compelling him to fast two days. He left all quiet in camp. The heatile Sicux are believed to be north of George Creek, about four miles, and not far from the scene of the late massacte on the Little Big Horn River. They have not fired into the camp lately, mer attempted to burn it out, although the parched condition of the grass renders this semewhat easy; at least the animals may be robbed of their substance. The wagen train gives them a supply till October.
