HISTORY OF ALCOHOL.

[Baltimore Journal of Commerce.] Alchohol was invented 950 years Alchohol was invented 950 years ago, in Arabia. Ladies used it with a powder to paint themselves that they might appear more beautitul, and this powder was called alchohol. During the reign of William and Mary, an act was passed encouraging the manufacture of spirits. Soon after intemperance and profligacy prevailed to mak an extent that the cetailers of such an extent that the retailers of intoxicating drinks put up signs in public places, informing the people that they might get drunk for a penny, and have some atraw to get sober on. In the sixteenth century, distilled spirits spread over the continent of Europe. About this time it was introduced into the colonies, as the United States were then called. The first notice we have of its use in public life, was among the laborers in the Hungarian mines, in the fifteenth century. In 1751, it was used by the English soldiers as a cordial. the English soldiers as a cordial. The alcohol from Europe was made from grapes; and sold in Italy and Spain as a medicine. The Genoese afterwards made it from grain, and sold it as a medicine in bottles, under the name of the "water of life." Until the sixteenth century it was kept by spotbecaries as a medicine. During the reign of Henry VIII., brandy was first known in Ireland, and soon its alarming effects induced the governor to pass a law prohibiting its blacksmith's hammer.
