August, August 5, 1876

The late trouble was supposed to be the House again to day, the gentlemen being on acceptance of resignation, and a proposal to resign from the House, and allow him to resume his seat. The resignation of four members, which gave notice yesterday of their intention to resign, was also accepted.

It is rumored that several other resignations will be offered, and there is some fear that the question will be looked temporarily at least. Hunter was retained from stress by a vote not calculated to displease members who still maintain a reservation from doing so.

Representative Weeks, of Illinois, presented a telegram from his constituents this morning, informing his constituents in regard to the industry, and requesting him to stand firm.

Members of the House who resigned today had ample time to reflect. Many arrangements in the case of applicants for admission to remain and inquiring the majority, were considered, but believing the action on the 21st illegal they would not participate longer. JEFFERSON DAVIS AND MISSISSIPPI REPUTATION.

We reprint from the New York Evening Post the following private letter in relation to a matter generally understood, even in the State of Mississippi.

My Dear Miss R. I had no more to do with the reputation by Mississippi of the bonds issued than either of you had.

Upon the question as a political one I opposed the doctrine of repudiation, insisting that governmentally, like individuals, when claims were made against them, had no right to make any other issue than one of fact.

For that publicly declared opinion the party of repudiators made war upon me in the beginning of my political life, using both stratagem and concentration of their forces to defeat my nomination for Congress in 1845.

About this time the new phase of repudiation presented itself in the form of a bill to cancel debts due the banks which had violated their charters.

These were distributed among the members when they met. The letter severely condemned the project as against good morals and integrity, even if it could be sustained at law.

I may here add that I never at any time held any civil office in the State of Mississippi.

When the Federal government sought to discredit the Confederacy in foreign markets, they sent to England to represent me as a repudiator.

To his misrepresentations, and to my defense, in your father's paper, of the honor of Mississippi, long after the act termed "repudiation" had been done, is, I suppose, to be attributed the current slander which has provoked our friend Mr. M.

With tediousness of detail I have given you the facts as they bear upon myself connected with the question, and you can give Mrs. M. as much or as little as you please.

THE SAN ANTONIO ICE FACTORY.

Thinking that our readers would probably like to understand something more of the manufacture of ice than can be learned by a simple visit and inspection of the ice factory, we took the pains yesterday to thoroughly study and investigate the method, and with the kind assistance of Mr. Anton Fontell, engineer at the San Antonio Ice Factory, are enabled to inform as follows:
A hasty inspection of the factory would impress one with the idea that the water used was converted into ice by boiling, for, while the process of freezing is progressing, a vast amount of heat is called into requisition to reach the desired result—and the water is really boiled, as the reader will subsequently observe, before the freezing process is applied to it.

DISPATCHES.

A Western man who visited the settlement of Austin, Travis county, goes to the Senate, says Gov. Hubbard, said him a greater man than he expected, concludes he would not like to have him down on him, seemed distressed, owing partly to the great heat and the fall bond sale. The process of manufacturing used by the San Antonio Ice Company is that of M. Carré, a Frenchman. The invention consists in the use of ammoniacal gas, liquefied by pressure, as the water-freezing agent. It freezes by abstracting and rendering latent the heat of the water necessary to its liquid condition. The manner of using the ammonia to effect the purpose is exceedingly ingenious, and apparently paradoxical, inasmuch as "heat is applied to produce cold," "fire is applied to make ice!" included in the claims of originality made by the patentee, also "the application of the power of absorption due to mutual affinity as a means of producing vacuum, volatilization, the removal of heat, and the consequent production of cold." The form of ammonia used is the concentrated aqua ammonia containing 26 per cent. of gaseous ammonia. There is a constant pressure in the apparatus, when in full operation, of from 120 to 200 pounds to the square inch.
