The Express has had so much to say about the value of narrow gange railways in Western Texas that public attention is being attracted to them at last. Even the Kerrville Frontiersman, which seeme incredulous in regard to this matter six months ago, is now becoming enthused on the subject. The Houston Narrow Gauge railway, which the present editor of the Expanss labored five or six years to write into existence and action, has begun to move westward at last, and the Profiereeas, hoping, and very justly, that it will penetrate that fine country, has taken up

the subject in earnest.

The Frontiersman says that it may be news to some of its readers, and provoke a smile of derisive incredulity from others. to be told that a railway through this country is not only projected but that work on it is actually going on -a railway which starts from a growing commercial city, which has connection direct with the Gult shipping, and by other lines with the bertie; - railway whose ambitious line is to stretch across Tuxas, connect at El Paso with a similar narrow gauge road which Californiane and citizens of Colorado are now building to that point, and which will be, in time, a Southern Pacific railway w not if not in name.

This is known as the Houston and Western Marrow Gange. The Houston Narrow Gauge railway, which the present editor of the Expanse labored five or six years to write into axistence and action, has begun to move westward at last, and the Frotiere man, hoping, and very justly, that it will that fine country, has taken up

'Yes,' said another, the Sioux Indians must vacate. They have murdered our people in cold blood,

Le ey at their hands. It was an awiul massacre, but not as big a thing as the Chivington slaughter of redskins during the war.

That was a horrible affair, remark ed the reporter. The Indians, too, were friendly under the protection of the American flag, and living at a reservation where they had

been placed by the Government with the assurance of protection.

A small, compactly built deputy, with keen black eyes and a sear on his forehead, who had been listening to the conversation and saying nothing, now spoke up: Chivington was a trump. He

led his men to the Indian camp, and the only order he gave was, There they are, boys; go for them! And the boys did go for 'em. There wasn't one of them left to tell the tale except old Black Kettle, who was the fastest runner of any In. dian on the plains.

'I once heard an account of that fight,' said the reporter, has it was related by Fitzpatrick, the Indian agent, about twelve years ago. He pronounced it a cold-blooded massacre, Do you know anything about it ?

'I ought to know something about it. I was one of Chiving ton's men, although but a boy. I was a bugler, and was considered a good artiflery man.

Will you give me some account of the fight as you remember it? Was it as bad as reported at the time? Did you actually kill all the women and children, rip them open and mutifate their bodies after the Stoux fashion !

'Yes, we killed them all; that was the order, and we split 'em open and cut 'em up to teach the Indians a lesson.' Chivington was a Methodist preacher, was he not ?

Yes; he could preach like helt and fight like his devil. His regi-ment was the lat Colorado Volun-teers. and well armed two of the com-panies were nundred day men, called out by Gov. Evans; about 500 men in all. You see, the rebel. lion was going on, and they wanted all the men they could get in the East, and could not space any to protect us from the Indians. Chive the officer with a glow of pride the officer with a glow of p cases, they kept him diered Moonlight was out there with his Kansas troops, and he/didn' landw kay thing about the ways of redskins.

Chivington told him, if he didn't mind, he would be left afoot, he was so estelled in camping. And, sure enought he woke ap one morning and found all his horses had been stolen, and his men had to take their saddles on their shoulders and foot it to the fort."

sacre ocent ? It was in November, 1864. The regiment rendevouzed at Fort Lyon, on the Arkansas, 200 miles from the foot hills of the Bocky Mountains. The Indians were on Sand Creek, forty miles away, and were under Black Kettle, War Bonuet and other chiefs of the Cheyennes and Armanhoes. We marched around to their rear, had took them by summiss. took them by surprise. It was a very cold morning, with some drifts of snow on the ground, and. quite windy. We came in sight of the Indian village at the break of day. The sun was just coming up, when the order of fire was given, We had four twelve-pounders, and

opened upon them with grape and canister. The Indians were asleep, but soon woke up, swd some of them fought desperately. The fight lasted until 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon. We killed 800 worriors and 500 squaws and paposes. We took no prisoners but made a clean
