#### THE PRAIRIES OF TEXAS.

From Bryant's Texas Guide. 1

As a general thing the Texas prairies excel in beauty and fertility of soil. Nature has done more for them than any other spot on the globe, swelling them up and apreading them out in successive undulations of rich, arable lands. We might say the fields have been cleaned to the hands of the farmer, and the day is not far dis-tant when shay will become the home of happy millions and the joy of the husband-

man.

The hardy pieneer of by gone days went into the heavy timhered forests of the older States with fire and ax in hand, and made his fields and fenced them. He

would be well to put out in the enclosure a targe peach orchard for a beginning. These are of very rapid growth, and will soon make a fine yield of fruit for lamily use or the market. Peaches are also excellent food for logs. Other rapid growths, such as the pride of china and the catalpamight be planted in the field. But the weastche, meaguite, black locust, honey locust, bold dare, toothache and other similar growths, may be planted outside the enclosure, for they are protected with thorns. The dead limbs and de-

caying trees of a peach orchard are excel-lest fuel. The mesquite and weekatche are indiginous to the Texas prairies, and are indiginous to the Texas prairies, and their beany seeds take passage in the digestive organs of animals, travel abroad, and germinate wherever dropped. It was by observing this the writer conceived the idea of securing a supply of timber for our vast prairies by planting thoray growths. A little switch of weatche in ten years will grow a wagon load of fire wood, equal in quality to sah or shell bark hickory. Seed men are now giving attention to seed bearing trees, and the market will amply supply every demand. A low years attention to timber planting on the prairies will give an abundant supply for every necessary want.

To enlarge and make permanent inclosures for pasturage and cultivation hedging and ditching must be resorted to.

To enlarge and make permanent incleaures for pasturage and cultivation hedging and ditching must be resorted to. Fonce posts of weeatche, mosquite, black locust and bois d'arc will hast many years. The same is said of catalpa. Enameled fencing is at a very low figure and very derable. To prevent the approach of stock cut an outside ditch about 2 feet deep, 2 feet wide at top and 10 inches wide at bottom. The wire between the posts should be braced with small slats of wood to prevent hogs passing. The ditch may be accured from washing by a growth of Bermuds, or carpst grass. In prairie fencing these grasses are destined to out a important figure. Those found when the country was first settled will not bear close grazing and tramping of stock. They soon succumb to such in thickly settled neighborhoods, and noxious weeds put in an exclusive appearance. A few years ago prairie weeds greatly discouraged grazing. But lo, in the late war the soldiers brought with their baggage the carpet grass seed, and this unsurpassed in Texas as hay and equally valuable for pasturage, has supplanted the weeds. This grase is easily subdued by the plow, but does not yield to the severest drouth, close grazing, tramping of stock or any other hard usage of the kind. Its thick set growth upon the surface of the ground gives it the name of carpet grass.

It is eafe to predict that at no distant day the dwellers upon these plains will eclypse all others in their rich stores of living and life comforts, not to speak of the ladecape scenery, more havely and beautiful than enters into the heart of man to conceive. BEES .-- We have often wondered why not more of our people kept bees. A ready sale for honey can always be found at from 25 to 50 cents per pound, which would certainly render the keeping of bees a profitable business. In Western Texas, we have no improved or Italian bees, the best honey-producing species, but rely solely for our honey upon wild bees which are caught and hived in the spring. A visit to the bee-sheds of Dr. Stiles, at Austin, where the workings of Italian bees can be seen in patent portable, glass hives, would astonish people who have never seen these industrious insects at their labors. Mr. Stiles has been engaged in the business only a few years, but his bees have multiplied, he has become fully conversant with their treatment, and finds the business to be exceedingly profitable. He extracte from the hives in the fall au average of twenty to twenty-five pounds of strained honey, which he neatly bottles and puts upon the market.
