TILDEN. [From the Utica Observer.]

I have been intimately acquainted with Mr. Tilden for nearly forty years, and though I have often differed with him politically, some times even lamenting his strong reliance on party agencies. I have never had the slightest occasion to suspect his absolute integrity of purpose and sincerity of conviction. In all relations of private life be is purity itself. At the same time he has always been a public spirited citizen, taking an active part in whatever concerned the welfare and progress of the com-munity in which he lived. His devotion, indeed, to public affairs, began while he was still a youth, and his early discussions of intri cate questions of finance attracted the attention of maturer minds by their singular penetration and

Professionally, he has taken rank with Van Buren, Brady, Miss Kate Rublee, daughter of O'Conor, Graham, Evarts, Kirk-land, and other foremost lawyers, and in a peculiar class of cases—the transfer of the 15th ult., after two days' illuess heavy and complicated railroad from diphtheria. This union of theoretic insight with practical capacity has been singularly shown in his administration of the affairs of this state. DETAILS REGARDING THE RECENT PIGHT AT NEW LAREDO.

Editor Express: Being in possession, through an witness, of the leading facts, stems and occurrences of the last demonstration of Revolutiopista ys, Mexican Federal troops, New Laredo, Mexico, a telegraphic ascount of which appeared in your issue of the 9th inst., I have thought that a brief transcript of memorands taken on the spot would be of interest to your readers.

On the 8th of August General Estrada

one of Dias' commanders, appeared before New Laredo, Mexico, (opposite New Laredo and Fort McIntosh, Texas) with 250 men and summoned Col. Valle, the Federal commanding officer to a capitalation offering him free escort for himself with all men and horses, only to leave arms and munition behind. Col. Valle treated him with the utmost disdain, even going so tax as to fire on the last flag of truce. At once General Estrada proceeded to a succeeded in carrying the position by as sault. Both parties tought well, better, indeed, than is our conventional idea of Mexican fighting. The losses on the Federal side were heavy, about sixteen killed and many wounded. Col. Valle, the Federal commander, was seriously wounded in the left arm and right leg, and is at present in the U. S. Post Hospital at Fort Mo-Intoch as a patient. Col. Puble Quintana a former commander of Federal troops in New Laredo, could not be found when General Estrada entered the Plaza. It has been insinuated subsequently that he was upearthed from under a bed in the house of a prominent resident. Mayor Arriola, a revolutionist, was shot through both thighs, but his wounds are not considered fatal. An inoffensive citizen. Sr. Anoyra, a merchant of New Laredo, was fatally wounded in the head. It is said that General Estrada is acting towards his prisoners with the generosity becoming a brave soldier. He at once permitted Col. Valle to be brought to our side, and subequently released all wounded prisoners who would have easy access to their homes for treatment. It is doubtful as to the line of treatment that will be extended to Col. Quintana. Had he, by chance, been in command at New Laredo at the time of this attack, there is resson enough to compel a belief that he would have pronounced for the Diaz party before offering resist
