Myasthenia Gravis Public Information Forum Is Tonight

A public information forum will be conducted in Muleshoe tonight Thursday, at 7:30 p.m. in the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum. The subject of the forum will be Myasthenia Gravis, a neuromuscular disease, which has no known cause and no cure.

MG causes weakness and easy fatigability, varying from mild cases that do not progress to very severe cases, which are fatal.

Speakers for the forum will include Dr. Hugh Wilson Jr., Hale Center, Dr. George Payne, Levelland and a local MG patient, Mrs. Fred (Margaret) Clements.

The forum is being conducted without charge for persons interested in learning more about the disease.

Two Wrecks Injure Three On Tuesday

Tuesday afternoon, back to back accidents sent three persons to West Plains Medical Center, where two persons were hospitalized, and one treated and released.

The accidents started around 4:32 when a report was received that a boy on a bicycle had been struck by an automobile in the 200 block of West 18th Street.

Jeffery Whatley, age nine, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Whatley, was hospitalized at West Plains Medical Center for treatment of injuries received when his bicycle was hit by a car.

Driver of the auto was Peggy Burnett of Muleshoe. The accident was investigated by the Muleshoe City Police.

The first accident was followed ten minutes later, at 4:42, by an accident approximately one-half mile south of Muleshoe on Highway 214.

From the accident, Webb Perry of Clovis, was hospitalized at WPMC for treatment of injuries received in a truck-pickup accident. Perry was a passenger in a Glover Meat Co. truck being driven by Dean Ginn of Clovis.

Ginn said a pickup being driven by Tommy Marlow of Muleshoe was attempting a U-turn on the highway when he struck the vehicle with the truck. The bumper of the front of the

truck broke and the wheels could not be turned.

The cattle truck spun off the highway and into a tree which removed the top of the cab on the truck. Both Ginn and Perry were in the cab at the time it struck the tree. Perry received a back injury in the accident and Ginn was treated for hand lacerations and injured ribs.

Colin Tanksley was fourth in the lightweight Duroc class and Sherri Bessire received seventh in the heavyweight crossbred class.

Friday, thirteen 4-H members exhibited 26 steers at the junior steer show. All but one of the steers placed in the competition. Alan Harrison exhibited the Reserve Grand Champion of the Show and the Reserve Champion Crossbred Steer. Jerry Gleason exhibited the Reserve Champion English breed steer. Jodi Wheeler, Jamie Wheeler and Greg Young placed the second, third and fourth place steers, respectively, in the lightweight English breeds.

Now Employed For Coliseum

During a meeting Tuesday of the Bailey County Commissioners Court, Joyce (Mrs. Wayne) Holmes was formally approved as new manager of the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum.

Mrs. Holmes began her new duties at the Coliseum immediately on approval of commissioners court.

She replaces Tommy Black who had been employed by commissioners court as the manager on March 15, after he resigned as manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

When the facility was completed just over a year ago, the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture had entered into an agreement with the county to operate the Coliseum, however, after Black resigned to become manager, the CoC was moved from the building.

Freshwater shrimp farming operations possible in Texas


COLLEGE STATION — After four years of experimental testing, a Texas A&M University researcher says shrimp farming operations are possible in Texas.

Using a breed of freshwater shrimp related to those found in some rivers, Dr. Robert Brick believes small-scaled shrimp culture for supplying bait, recreation or a supplement to the family diet is technologically and economically feasible.


A basic knowledge of good pond management and a good supply of water are essential to start a shrimp farm, Brick said.

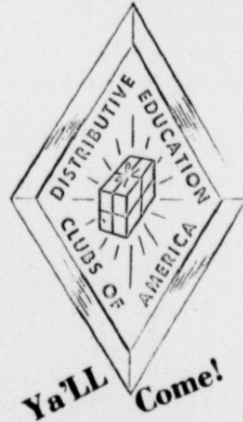

Different & Unusual People & Places

Last year, when Nick Tutt and his family moved to Bailey County, the Canadian farmer brought with him the only Belgian Blue cattle that can be found in the United States.

Tutt has a heifer and a bull calf on his farm four miles west of Muleshoe and hopes in the future to have a herd of the muscled cattle that produce up to 20-25 percent more meat than conventional United States beef cattle.

A doctor in Canada has a heifer, for the only other head of Belgian Blue cattle on the North American continent, explained Tutt.

He said the cattle (blue/white Belgian) descend from imported beeves. One of the characteristics of this breed is that they produce more 'doublet' (double muscles of the hind quarters) than any

other breed.

One of the advantages to this breed, according to Tutt, is the marketable percentage that is higher than in any other beef cattle breed, for instance between 66 percent and 72 percent from bulls and cows of approximately 1100 pounds. He said that of this percentage, 77 percent is lean meat; 10 percent fat and 13 percent bone.

Growth of the cattle is reported to be very good, and the Canadian farmer said he has found that his Belgian Blue cattle weather very good in the hot South Plains summer weather.

Most cattle gain from three to four pounds per day for bulls and are an average of 1200 pounds in one year. He said fully grown doublet-type bulls weigh between 2800 and 3300 pounds, and cows average between 1800 and 2000 pounds.

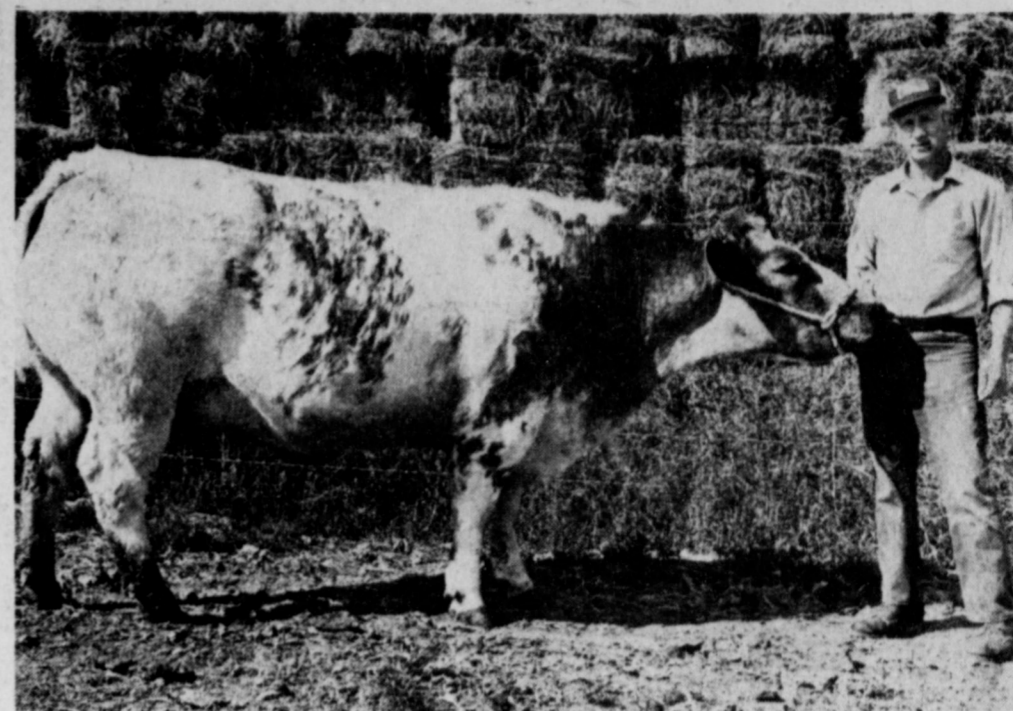
Tutt, who moved to Bailey County from the Pecos area where he resided for a year, said the quality of meat is first class and the muscle fibers are short, the texture excellent and the meat very tender.

Most of the meat is sold in Europe for approximately twice as much as for conventional beef, according to information obtained by Tutt.

A drawback is that the Belgian Blue is difficult to breed, but when bred, often by inserting embryos into a substitute mother, the young calves are strong and robust, and tend to survive well.

Tutt, who is an alfalfa farmer, said his heifer is due to drop a calf in November, and with the heifer, bull calf and new calf, he hopes to be on his way to having his own herd.

He, his wife, Clara, and their four children will be residing in a new home on the farm four miles west.

Reese AFB Graduates First Women Pilots

The graduation of Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) Class 79-08 marked another significant milestone in the history of Reese Air Force Base, Texas.

Counted among the classes 36 graduated were the first three women to complete the UPT program at Reese.

The women graduates are 1st Lieutenants Cathy A. Caseman and Jane K. Robinette Klingenberger, and 2nd Lieutenant Linda L. Martin.

Lieutenants Caseman and Klingenberger have both been assigned to fly the KC-135 Stratotanker for the Strategic Air Command. Lieutenant Caseman will be doing her flying from Wurtsmith AFB, Michigan; while Lieutenant Robinette

Klingenberger will be doing her flying from Plattsburgh AFB, New York.

Lieutenant Martin has been selected to remain at Reese as a T-37 instructor pilot. She will begin those duties following completion of the Pilot Instructor Training (PIT) program at Randolph AFB, Texas.

With the awarding of the silver pilot wings to Reese's three women UPT students, the number of women pilots in the U.S. Air Force has risen to 30.

Presently there are 15 women undergoing pilot training (four of them at Reese) and 12 undergoing navigator training at U.S. Air Force training bases. There are 12 women navigators serving in flying assignments with the U.S. Air Force units. Four more women are scheduled to

begin pilot training at Reese when class 80-08 begins training on October 11, 1979.

Reese AFB already has one woman instructor pilot, 1st Lieutenant Stephanie A. Wells, who began her duties as a T-37 flying instructor in July 1979. Women comprise 6.96 percent of the military working force at Reese.

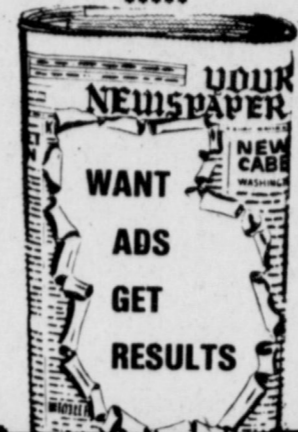
