The committe is expected to remain on the Pacific

of Congress.

THE Examiner says that the sagneity of Newfoundland dog saved Mr. Tom Selman's residence, near East Waco, from destruction by fire on Friday night last. About 1 o'clock Mr. S. was awakened by the furious barking of the dog at the window of the room in which he slept. He arose, and going to the door, looked out. but saw nothing. The dog ran to the rear of the house and was followed by his master, who discovered that a fire had broken out and was gaining rapid headway in the kitchen, which is attached to the main building. With a wistance from others he succeeded, with considerable difficulty, in extinguishing the flames, and no great mount of damage was done. The property was saved by the dog, for had he been silent, the inmates of the house would have known nothing of the fire until it had gotten beyond their control.

TRAIN ROBBING seems likely to extend into Texas, since stage robbing has ceased to pay. Mr. H. C. Caulfield informs the Waco Examiner that last week the South bound passenger train was boarded at Wortham Station, on the main line of the Central road, by two men, masked and heavily armed; other armed men stood at the depot, seemingly ready to spring on board. New York, Aug 24-Gold opened 1104. RAILROAD ACCIDENT New Orleans, August 24—General Sup-scrintendant Frost telegraphed the follow-ing in regard to the railroad accident near

Jackson:

An unprecedented heavy flood of rain fell last night in the region of eight miles north of Jackson, Mississippi, and a 12 foot culvert was washed out directly under the track. The Engine tender and mail car passed over, the baggage car, the smoking car and ladies coach went into the hole. The sleeping car did not get off the track. The passengers which were hart were in the smoking car and ladies coach.

The summary of casualties is as fol-ows: one tramp, stealing a ride, was killed; two passengers mortally injured, and ten injured, but none of them dau-

The rain was a light one on both sides of this valley in which the culvert was situated, and the storm seems to have concentrated all its force on this one

A special dispatch says Willie Brooks, colored, of Canton, Mississippi, and Al-phonse Villentuere, of Montreal, Canada, were killed. THE INDIAN WAR

Bismarck, August 24—A white scout named Borke, arrived here from the mouth of Rosebud river with dispatches from Crook and Terry. After resting they left the wagons on the tenth and took thirty-seven companies of cavalry and eight of infantry, making forced marches to overtake the Indians before reaching the Yellewsons river.

Later dispatches from Standing Rock say that the Indians from Sitting Bull's samp report a terrible battle between the Indians and the combined forces of Crook and Terry. The Indians were repulsed and scattered. Crook and Terry are reported to have sustained as heavy a loss as the Indians.

THE joint committee appointed by Congress for the investigation of the Chinese Immigration Question have finally arrived at an agreement that the first meeting of the committee for the purpose of investigation shall be held in San Francisco, on the 18th of October. The Senate nembers of the committee will meet in Chicago, on the 8th of October, and go out together. The House members will precede them, with the exception of Mr. Wilson, of Iowa, the Republican appointed instead of Mr. Kasson. It is stated that Mr. Wilson, on learning the circumstances under which he had been placed on the committee, and that he was given the position in order to spite Mr, Kasson for his speech against Mr. Tilden, determined that he would not take any part in the investigation of the committe. The committe is expected to remain on the Pacific

Coast until the time for the reassembling

of Congress. THE Examiner says that the sagneity of Newfoundland dog saved Mr. Tom Selman's residence, near East Waco, from destruction by fire on Friday night last. About 1 o'clock Mr. S. was awakened by the furious barking of the dog at the window of the room in which he slept. He arose, and going to the door, looked out, but saw nothing. The dog ran to the rear of the house and was followed by his master, who discovered that a fire had broken out and was gaining rapid headway in the kitchen, which is attached to the mainbuilding. With assistance from others he succeeded, with considerable difficulty, in extinguishing the flames, and no great amount of damage was done. The property was saved by the dog, for had he been silent, the inmates of the house would have known nothing of the fire until it had gotten beyond their control.

TRAIN ROBBING seems likely to extend into Texas, since stage robbing has ceased to pay. Mr. H. C. Caulfield informs the Waco Examiner that last week the South bound passenger train was boarded at Wortham Stations on the main line of the Central road, by two men, masked and heavily armed; other armed men stood at the depot, seemingly ready to spring on board. The conductor discovered them and signaled the engineer to start the train, which was done, and the masked men leaped from the moving cars. Evidently it was their intenpromptly, their plans was frustrated.

Waco is seeking another railroad connection, besides the connection she has by way of the Central. The Examiner says the proposed connection with the International at Palestine appears to be the most in favor, as yet, though this may be changed by the report of members of the committee appointed at the last meeting to confer with certain railroad magnates North. Waco and San Autonio ought to be connected by rail by way of Austin. Let Waco connect with the International at Round Rock, or still nearer home, if desirable and practicable, and then let the International build on from Austin to San Antonio. We merely suggest,

THE latest telegrams from the seat of that Russia will allow her subjects to. enter the Servian army, and that concequently, Servia will continue the war. The English Queen's speech, indicating mediation at an early day, may have had something to do with this action on the part of Russia. And Russia may have purposely waited until Servia was at the last gasp, that she may feel the move dependent on her great ally. Servian unexation would be more acceptable than Servian independence. We have all the time been unable to see how Russia could be reconciled to stand by and see Servis finally go down.
