If this be refused him, he must have been feeders to his trunk line. He must build a branch down the Sabine to the Gulf from Marshall, that St. Louis, through Denison and through Arkanene, over Scott's lines, may have another seaport on the Gulf, and this new road would reduce rates from Kansas City and St. Louis to Galveston perhaps one-half. Mr. Scott, if Congress do not serve him, will be forced to build branches from his present road to many interior towns, and now that Scott has seized the richest resources of the commonwealth it becomes our Congress press and people to co-operate in compel-ling him to administer the vast domain given him in such a manner that the greatest possible good may be accomplished for the State."

HON, JOHN HANCOCK AT HOME.

The State Gazette says that Judge Hancool has returned to his home in Austin and will soon be henored by his diond and furnished the opportunity of addr ing the public. He feels disposed to return good for evil; and has measures pending which he hopes to carry at the next session, of Congress, appropriating one hundred thousand dollars to the harbor improvements of Galveston. He is the recipient of letters from the leading citizens of that city, deploring his defeat before the Convention and expressing their high appreciation for his uniform support of the best interests of the folund City.


