MIDNIGHT DISPATCHES.

London, August 28 - The Times has an editorial on Bulgarian affairs which con-cludes that Mr Barrings report and testi-mony of other officials will have a practical value during the negotiations which must follow the close of the Servian war. They will give the country a good opportunity of clearly defining the position it holds with respect to Turkey and the great Powers. The Turkish Ministers are careless of English remonstrances, be cause they think England must suppor Turkey, however flagrantly she may be misruled, and hence it is argued that she is indirectly accountable for Bulgarian massacres, but it is difficult to believe so baseless an idea can mislead those who direct the Turkish Empire. They know little of this country if they think it can countenance such atrecities. Like some other States, it has an interest in Turkey, and it would be desirable to see her streng, but she can not be strong without being well governed, and she will not be well governed until she has reversed many parts of her present system. This country will be ready to join other States to protect the Christian part of the population without regarding the convenience of the Porte.

West Texas has heretofore to a CARPETS. great extent, been deprived of the advantages and power of this mighty means of canal boats were also burned; the loss public action and progress. No railroads, estimated at between forty and fifty few mail facilities, small settlements long distances apart, and all the other disad vantages and inconveniences of a frontier country, have have prevented the development of a powerful home journalism in the West. There has not been support

enough to maintain such a journalism; and even now when the time has come for it, so many of the people of West Texas have learned to do without newspapers that a newspaper-reading public has almost, as yet, to be created. But it can be done and it must be done.

Every other interest can alone be ener getically promoted by the development of our newspapers. Railreads, immigra tion, agriculture, manufactures, education social refinement, the building of tasteful homes, the suppression of all ruffianism and crime, and the establishment of all morality and social order, are more de pendent upon the development of healthy, high-toned, sound, independent journalism in the West, than upon all things else combined. It is the agent and enginery, everything else. As the engine in a yast manufacturing establishment, so is journalism in the midst of all the inter ests of the country. We need good newspapers, edited by intelligent, honest brave, patriotic men, who understand their business and the wants and intereste A dispatch from Vienna report that the Porte demand that Milan shall address propositions for peace directly to the Turkish government. other journals they choose.

Railroads will soon penetrate as far in to West Texas as San Antonio, and then a new era will commence for all this region, and then the real history of West Texas journalism will begin. We have considered the papers in all the cases that have been brought to our notice. They areas in the following States: Virgins, West Virginia, Maryland, Tennesse, Louisians, North Carolina and South Carolina. In respect to some of these cases we have given particular directions, but for all other cases, the Joint Commission unanimously adopted the following rules for adjustments of adverse claims to Church property: Church property:
