FIRE. Elizabeth, Md., August 28.—Last night six pieces of the Central railroad docks in this city were destroyed by fire. Seventy-five loads of coal, loaded on the dock, were all destroyed; 250 tons of coal were burned or thrown into the water; two hundred loads of water were also burned; the loss is estimated at between forty and fifty thousand dollars.

TUESDAY MORNING, August 29, 1876. TROUBLE AT NEW LAREDO.

A Brownsville telegram to the Galveston News says that on the 22nd the Revolutionists evacuated New Laredo and attempted to carry off with them J. J. Haynes, United States Commercial agent at that post and son of Hon. John L. Haynes, Collector of Customs of this District.

San Antonio, Aug. 22.—To the Commanding Officer of Fort McIntosh: It is reported that the Revolutionists at New Laredo hold Jas. Haynes, United States Commercial Agent, as a hostage for Quintana, and propose to carry him off. Use your whole command and cross, if it be necessary, to prevent the outrage.

There was great excitement at Brownsville over this news, and while the excitement was at its height Canales (revolutionist) made a faint attack on Matamoros.

The cause of the arrest of Haynes at Laredo was that he had received a wounded officer at his house, (Col. Quintana), when the revolutionists attacked that place on the 8th instant, and after they took the place they attempted to take Quintana away, to which Haynes objected as Quintana was very weak from loss of blood.

WHIPPER WHIPPED.—Gov Chamberlain has issued a proclamation regarding the threatening effort of the negro Whipper to take possession of the Charleston Judgeship by force. The Governor says any such attempt by W. J. Whipper and those who may aid and abet him, may be regarded and treated by him, not only as an unlawful and riotous disturbance of public peace, but also as an outrage upon the judicial authority not to be tolerated in a civilized State.

STATE OF THE NEXT SENATE.—Of the Senators holding over or already elected, thirty are Republicans and twenty-three Democrats. Of the States to elect the following are regarded as certainly Republican: Illinois, Kansas, Maine, Minnesota, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nebraska, South Carolina, Colorado. These States elect ten Senators, swelling the number of Republicans to forty. Both of Carolina is now acting with that party, making the number forty-one. The other States to elect are Georgia, Tennessee, West Virginia, North Carolina, Oregon, electing twelve members in all, which would give the Democrats but thirty-five, if they secured all the last named States.

KERR COUNTY.

A correspondent in the Kerrville Frontiersman, having paid a visit to the Guadalupe mountains, most of which lie in Kerr county, gives the following graceful description of the rugged region: "If we look on the height of these mountains from the intervening valleys, they rank only as hills, but when the general elevation of the country is considered, we find an altitude of nearly four thousand feet, or about three-quarters of a mile, which makes a notable difference in the climate. The air is nearly always cool and bracing, the nights almost cold. The mountains are green with covering of grass and trees, and what gives a very refreshing appearance to the near scenery are the grape vines, which literally clothe the hill-sides and hang about the cliffs, clustered with fruit that does not mock with false appearance, for the sweet grape of the mountains has no superior. In a day's journey your horse will not step but his hoof will clatter on stone. The valleys follow each other without intermission in whatever direction you go; deep and rugged valleys which descend rapidly into wild ravines and canyons, overhung with frowning cliffs. Down in these are the most beautiful springs of clear and cool water gushing over the rocks and rippling over the pebbles. There are small plots of good land in some of these ravines; the mountaineers have built their cabins and turned the spring (for there is always a spring at their houses) to water the little fields. We started deer out of almost every valley, and occasionally a bear went gliding into the grape thickets. We clambered about the cliffs in search of bee caves, and explored several curious caverns of great size hung with glittering stalactites. It is needless to say we feasted on venison and honey. These rough mountains will always remain a wilderness, a kind of reserve of nature; a public game preserve. They are accessible from all the lower country by private conveyance and at trifling cost. Any man who can own a two horse spring wagon can visit this country with his family and spend a month or two in the mountains in a cool and bracing atmosphere.

VICTORIA ITEMS.

The Advocate says that the largest excess of corn raised in that country this season will be utilized in fattening cattle for the New Orleans market. Several gentlemen of this city intended to go largely into this enterprise during the approaching winter. Those who invested in the undertaking last season made handsome profits.

We learn that the people now residing at Indianola will all, or nearly all, remove to Lavaca until after the September equinox has passed. Lavaca is twelve miles further up the bay, and being on main land in a high location, is much more secure against gulf storms.

For some cause the county of Victoria, with an ample revenue, seems never to be out of debt. There is now a large number of outstanding warrants with no money in the treasury to pay them, when at the same time taxes are being collected every day, and revenue from fines and other sources are coming in constantly.

Sheriff Thurmond was notified on last Friday of the arrest in Dallas of Hugh Stapp, the escaped desperado from this county. On Tuesday deputy sheriff Pala left this city in order to return Stapp to the county jail at that place. If would prove a wise precaution to leave this prisoner in the Galveston county jail for safe keeping. Stapp is awaiting an appeal to the Supreme Court upon a conviction for a term of five years to the State penitentiary.

From Mr. Stadler we learn that the Secretary and Treasurer of the Gulf, West Texas & Pacific Railroad, Mr. Monserrate, has been served with notice of protest for interest on six bonds issued by the road. These bonds are held by parties other than Morgan, and the effect of this proceeding will be to force a sale of the road under the stipulations of the deed of trust, without the ordinary process of a formal suit.
