Row at Brackett.

Free Use of Fire-arms with But Little Damage.

Brackett, August 31, 1876. A party of men from the Neece river attending a theatre at this place last night, became disorderly, and at about half-past eleven o'clock commenced talking in loud and insulting language to all the ladies in the house, when a Mr. Robinson, a citizen of this place remonstrated. One of the intruders pulled his pistol and fired at Robinson. The ball missed him, but the powder from the cartridge burst his eye severely, the pistol being so close to his face. Robinson then knelt the man down before he could fire again, when all the party compacted firing at Robinson, who then pulled his revolver and returned the fire, and drove the party off. One of the party is supposed to be badly wounded.

WASHINGTON ITEMS. Washington, August 31 - The naval review at Fort Royal will commence early in October. A large pleasure party will visit there from this city leaving about October 1st. GOLIAD TO THE FRONT.

The day after the recent bank robbery in Goliad, the citizens of that place and county assembled in mass-meeting in order to consider measures of self-protection. The citizens of Victoria county, adjoining, have also formed a "self-protection company." The Goliad meeting adopted the following: Resolved, That we hereby express our unqualified disapprobation of the course of Gov. Coke in vetoing the bill known as the "Sheriff's Bill," and in making known to the Legislature his objections to the bill organizing a company of fifty men to protect the people from lawless bands, and compelling the Legislature to change the law to suit his own personal and peculiar views; that, in his message to the Legislature on vetoing the "first named bill," he showed not only the spirit of the damage, but an apology for the outlaws of our country; that although it is the sworn duty of the executive to see that the people are protected and the laws enforced, he has shown an almost wanton disregard of their appeals.

VOUL MURDER.

St Louis, August 31 - Advice from Decatur, Texas, says Rev W G England, Methodist Minister, his wife, step-daughter and four step-sons were murdered at their home, six miles from Montague; last Saturday night, by a party of disguised men. No particulars of the British affair have been received, but it is supposed that the butchery was committed for money, as the family was rich.

PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE OF THE BUFFALO.

The time was, and that within the memory of the "oldest inhabitant," when the region of country represented by the EXPRESS was as abundant in buffalo as it now is in long horned cattle; and as they are passing away from the State, and ultimately from the country, it is interesting occasionally to chronicle the progress. Like the Indian, the buffalo once roamed over all Texas, and over all the country now covered by the United States and the British Territories; and like the Indian, and keeping step and company with the Indians, they are gradually disappearing never to return. The theory says a recent and well informed writer on the subject, is that the buffalo and the Indian will perish together. Though the Indian is in constant pursuit of this noble game, the buffalo never avoids his savage persecutor. On the contrary, the Indian will establish his camping ground, and then actually drive the buffalo to within a short distance of his wigwam before he kills him, thus avoiding any extended transportation of the raw hides to the place where they are dressed by the squaws. Now, on the other hand, the buffalo, like the Indian, seems to have an instinctive aversion to the white man, and when the emigrant wagon and the railroad car shall people the West and Northwest, the buffalo will seek new and more inaccessible fields; and finally, when he is surrounded on all sides, he will lie down and die. Men now living will remember when the Pacific slope was one vast buffalo range, while to-day there is scarcely a buffalo to be seen west of the Rocky Mountains. But it is admitted that it may be a long while before the last buffalo shall pass for a vast range of country spreads out between the Missouri River the Saskatchewan, which is a natural feeding-ground for the buffalo, and there is perceptible diminution of the prodigious herd that roams over this space. The same writer says that the buffalo ranges are annually becoming more circumscribed, and they can only be found in about three localities. One herd ranges along the head-waters of the Arkansas and Platte Rivers; a smaller one browses among the Big Horn Mountains and the valleys and plains in that region, while the great mass make their home north of the Missouri and spread themselves to the Saskatchewan and westward to the Rocky Mountains. Formerly, too, it was supposed that the buffalo spent the winter on the plains of Texas and the southwest, but lately the buffalo have changed their habits, and the immense herds north of the Missouri stay there all the year round. There seems to be no difficulty in securing forage in the North during the winter, for the buffalo killed in January are as fat as at any other season, while the meat is much better in winter than summer. The buffalo, with their feet and horns, scrape the snow from the prairies, and eat the dried grass with a relish. Mr. Eastman says that domestic cattle in Montana also run wild, and live through the winter unprotected and unharmed, for in the spring are found in comparatively good condition. St. Paul, Minnesota, is the centre of the vast trade in buffalo robes. There are collected annually at Fort Benton alone about 120,000 robes, nearly all of which are taken from the great Northern herd, and yet the Indians and

traders find no greater difficulty now in getting them from their original owners than they did years ago. The buffalo may, perhaps, succumb to the inevitable, and perish from the face of the earth, but the evil day is so far ahead that it don't trouble the present generation of St. Paul merchants and manufacturers, who are doing a thriving and profitable business in accumulating the hides of the noble monarchs of the prairie, and manipulating them into all sorts of useful articles for the comfort and convenience of man.

THE HARDWOOD TRAGEDY.—The Gonzales Index says that Albert Dean, one of the parties captured in the late fight at Harwood with the sheriff's posse in which Nave, one of the posse, and Edward Parker or Wilson, one of the robbers, were killed, had a preliminary examination before Justice W. V. Collins on Thursday of last week, and was remanded to jail, bail having been deemed sufficient. The evidence was deemed sufficient by the Justice to warrant his being held on the charge of murder. Wilson, who was wounded and captured at the time, is slowly recovering. His wounds were much more serious than first reported, the ball having passed through his lungs.

NEWSPAPER DISUNION.—Not long since the two newspapers in Gonzales, the old Inquirer and the new Index, were united, and the Inquirer-Index was the result. But the disobedience to the scriptural injunction not to put a "piece" of new cloth into an old garment" has brought about its punishment. Both parties were dissatisfied and unhappy, and now they have separated, and each will hereafter appear as before. Success to both of them.

WACO IS STILL MOVING in the matter of securing a railroad connection with the International railroad at Palestine. San Antonio and the counties between here and Austin might secure the early completion of the International railroad to this city, by proper effort. We need it badly.

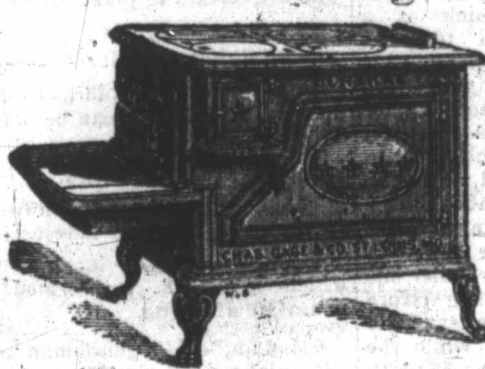
