RAILROAD ACCIDENT. St. Louis, September 2.—The northern bound train on the Kansas road struck a wagon containing six persons; two are dead, one is dying and the others are seriously hurt.

YELLOW FEVER. Savannah, September 2.—The official report of the yellow fever, published yesterday, shows 256 cases since August 21.

FOREIGN.

THE EASTERN WAR. London, September 2.—The Standard's Belgrade special says there has been no fighting around Alexina since August 26th.

Constantinople, September 2.—All the Turkish Ministers remain in office. Representatives of all the powers received identical instructions to wait till day after official steps to secure an armistice.

St. Petersburg, September 2.—Subscriptions to the new Serbian loan is eagerly taken.

DOMESTIC.

MIDNIGHT DISPATCHES. GOLD AND SILVER COINED DURING AUGUST. Washington, September 2.—The coinage for August at the Philadelphia, Carson and San Francisco mints foot up as follows: \$211,000 in double eagles, \$521,000 in trade dollars, \$2,592,000 in half dollars, \$4,105,000 in quarter dollars, \$1,589,000 in dimes. Total \$7,118,000.

Postmaster General Tyler has gone to Deer Park, but will not return early next week. Secretary Robeson will return Monday and after a few days will go to Long Branch.

The 4 per cent bonds meet rapid absorption at home and abroad. Officials at the Navy Department deny the report that an extensive naval review will be held at Port Royal on October 1st, and also the statement that Secretary Robeson is to leave here in the U. S. steamer Dispatch, with a party of friends, to witness it. They say that the vessels of the North Atlantic States will assemble there at that time and be thoroughly inspected by Admiral Trenchard, who succeeded Rear Admiral Leroy a few days since. These vessels have been kept north during the summer to keep their crews away from the ravages of the yellow fever. The inspection will be preliminary to their distribution on the gulf coast of Mexico.

A dispatch from Boston to the N. Y. Herald asserts that the commutation of the sentence of the boy murderer, Pomeroy, is to conciliate the Massachusetts sensationalists and save the State to the Republicans.

RAILROAD MATTERS. Savannah, Ga., September 2.—The Central Railroad announces that steamers will leave this port twice a week for New York, landing outside the city limits at the railroad wharves, so that there will be no stoppage in moving cotton or return freights.

POSITIVELY DECLINES. Utica, New York, September 2.—Hon. Scott Lord and other prominent democrats went to Deerfield this morning and received from Gov. Seymour a refusal to withdraw or modify his absolute declaration to allow the use of his name as a candidate for Governor.

MEETING OF COTTON BROKERS. Savannah, September 2.—At a large meeting of members of cotton exchange held to-day at 10 o'clock, the following preamble and resolution was unanimously adopted.

Whereas, Specie are on the way and nearly due in Savannah on the land with cotton for European ports, and Whereas, We are assured that the Central railroad will continue to send two steamers a week to New York, and that the banks and bankers can and will buy all the northern sterling and exchange offered, thus enabling exporters to fill their contracts, and factors to sell their cotton, therefore be it

Resolved, That notice be given to all concerned, through the Savannah newspapers and the Associated Press Association, that no interruption of the cotton business at Savannah has occurred, and that, in the opinion of this exchange, none is likely to occur.

SCHLEICHER'S RE-NOMINATION.

On Friday evening last, Hon. Gustavo Schleiher was re-nominated for Congress from this, the Sixth Congressional District, by a unanimous vote of the delegates to the Convention. "When we say that this act was a proper and a just one,—that Mr. Schleiher abode all other men of his District, was the man to send to the 45th Congress, we but re-echo the will of four-fifths of the people of Western Texas.

By a handsome majority Mr. Schleiher was elected by the Democratic party of the Sixth Congressional District to the 44th Congress. He was placed on trial as a Representative, and during the long term of nine months which witnessed the most interesting business, we may say never transacted by an American Congress, he held his own nobly to himself and faithful to his people. On the complex and vexing measures which devolved for settlement upon the 44th Congress, Mr. Schleiher proved himself to be a man of superior ability, coping with the brightest intellects of the nation. His efforts ever just, his conduct gentle though dignified, his course conservative though Democratic, won for him the love and esteem of the best men in Congress, the great admiration of his State, and a reputation national in the excellence of its nature. He returns home to meet friendly greetings, honors on every hand, by all, regardless of party feelings. We have no admision for him, for his course has truly been an excellent one. We are a little surprised, however, at what he has accomplished as our Representative, for seldom, indeed, is man so successful as he has been. As remarked in his speech, he was "new in the Congressional harness, but he wore it with grace, and never slackened his traces, ever pulling hard in the right direction. It was as little as could be done to re-nominate him to the position he honored in the 44th Congress; and as his election to the 45th is assured beyond peradventure, still greater results may be expected from his future labors.

As to what was the truth and your duty and aim in respect to the South, but repeat no later of acceptance when I say that all the people must be made to feel that when once peace is restored they will be secure in the enjoyment of the rights the constitution and laws require, and that he is a dangerous enemy of his country who would arouse or foster sectional antagonisms. It is but common sense to the uneducated and death between the races, and in these States alone—Louisiana and South Carolina—is the Republican party dominant. In every other State in the South the people have recovered and restored the American right and power of self government, the negro race has ceased to be the tool of partisans, and peace and harmony prevail, and prosperity is rapidly returning to all.

Gov. Hendricks spoke of the restoration of harmony in Arkansas and Mississippi after the overthrow of the Republican administration therein. He said the same story tells the history of North Carolina, Texas and Alabama. Then why not restore Louisiana and South Carolina to the blessing of good government, and black and white alike together may dwell under the mild influence of peace and harmony as wise men and patriotic citizens? I ask you, Judge, what is the right expedient to continue men in power who make political power by violence and bloodshed?

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SPEECH.

Delivered by the Hon. Gustave Schleiher, in San Antonio, on Friday Evening.

Judge F. W. Ware introduced the speaker to the audience. Mr. Schleiher said: Ladies and Gentlemen: Before entering into any remarks, I wish to address myself to the delegation of the convention which met to-day and honored me with a nomination to Congress.

Regarding matters particularly interesting to the people, much could be said, but I have not the time to go into elaborate details. I am, however, bringing an official report to you.

The Republicans did not intend that any credit for their services should be given to the contrary powers and influences of the Republican administration.

The only way to pay our national debt, was to be strictly honest. Congress must not work to evade its duties, and the must not delay in settling up.
