Alternessed is, Minn., Sept. 8.—The Pioneer Press and Tribune publishes an interview with an old trapper named Ridgely, who has been for a long time in the Yellowstone country and claims to have witnessed Custer's massacre, being a prisoner in Sitting Bull's camp, and easing every moreinent of the troops. He was taken prisoned lest March and kept in the camp of the Indians ever since. Until the Custer massacre he was kindly treated, his ways Sitting Bull organised, not to fight the whites, but to drive miners from the Black Hills. Previous to Custer's attack, mounted couries from Sitting Bull's camp had for eight days watched has forces, its division into small detachments being noted with mahifestations of extesse delight. Ambhecades were immediately prepared, and while the Indians stood ready for an attack, many of them elambered up the side of the hill overlocking Custer's line of march. The Indian camp was divided by a bluft, a point of which ran toward she Rosebud, and in the direction of one of the available fords of the river leading to the camp. Custer followed the trail down to the waters' edge. There were but 25 tepoes visible to Custer, but there were 75 double tepees behind the bluff not visible.
