A LESSON.

Had the charter, before it was forwardmight read it and decide upon its merits as contrasted with those of the old charter, it would undoubtedly have met with much greater tayor at the polls, and would probably have been adopted, but only a few hundred copies of it were printed in pamphlet form, and that after it had come from the Legislature, and distributed about the city.

The main objections were the powers which the new charter bestowed upon the Mayor and Council, and all sorts of bad talk about it grew from the rumors put afloat by some of the few who were ortunate enough to be furmshed with a copy of the instrument. Many people went to the polls and yoted- against the charter simply because of the unfavorable impression created by the talk of those who had read it and found objections. Hundreds did not vote at all, for they did not want to vote in ignorance. We need a new charter very badly, but it must be gotten up differently from the manner in which this one was gotten up, and should be published in all the city papers at least a month before it is forwarded to the Legislature, which would give the people time and opportunity to discuss it. PROP. HUXLEY ON AMERICANS.

Prof. Huxley attended the meeting of he American Scientific Association Baffalo, New York, recently. He was inreduced by the President, Prof. Rogers. Prof. Huxley in reply made some very sting and striking remarks. Among other things be said :

I have heard of the degeneration of your stock from the English stock. I have not perceived it. Some years ago one of your most distinguished men of letters, equally loved and admired in England and Ameriloved and admired in England and Ameri-ca, expressed an opinion which touched English feeling somewhat keenly that there was a difference between your women and ours after reaching a certain age. He said our lynglish women were "beety." That is his word, not mine. Well, I have studied the aspect of the peocle that I have met here in steamboats and railway carriages, and I meet with just the same faces, the main difference as just the same faces, the main difference as to the men being in the way of shaving. Though T should be sorey to use the word Hawthorne did, yet in respect to stature, for fine portly women, I think the average here fully as great as on the other side. Some people, talk of the injurious influence of climate. I have seen no trace of the "North American type." You have among you the virtue which is most notable among savages, that of bospitality. among you the virtue which is most notable among savages, that of hospitality. You take us to a bountiful dinner, and are not quite astisfied unless we take away with us the plates and spoons. Another feature has improved itself upon me. I have visited some of your great universities, and meet men as well known in the Old World as in the New. I find certain differences here. The English certain differences here. The English universities are the product of govern ment; yours of private numificance. The among us is almost unknown. Th general notion of an Englishman when be gets rich is to found an estate and benefit his family. The general notion of an American when fortunate is to do some-American when fortunate is to do something for the good of the possile, and from which besefits shall continue to flow.
